## ARRIVAL OF THE PERSEUS.

St. John's, N. F., Nov. 3.  
The Royal Mail steamship "Perseus," from  
Liverpool, Saturday, 27th, via Queenstown  
arrived off Cape Race at 9<sup>th</sup> A. M. Sun-  
day.

Affairs in Italy remain unchanged.

The Warsaw meeting terminated on the  
26th. A vague but unreliable report pre-  
vailed that the principles of an European  
Congress were agreed upon.

The position of the hostile forces in Italy  
was literally unchanged.

Some details respecting the voting on the question  
of annexation follow the previous reports  
that the result was almost unanimous in fa-  
vor of annexation.

The British Legion in Italy had a smart  
encounter with the Bourbons at Capri, and  
were victorious with a loss of six killed and  
thirty wounded.

Spain had withdrawn its Embassy from  
Turin, leaving its affairs in the hands of a  
Viceroy.

The text of the Russian note to Savoia,  
voicing against her course in the affairs of  
Italy, and ordering her Legation to retire,  
published. It is strong in its tone.

It is stated that the English Admiral is  
going to Trieste for the purpose of protecting  
the flight of the King of Naples.

An Imperial decree raises the price of to-  
bacco in France 20 per cent.

The Emperor Napoleon held a military  
council relative to the formation of a new  
army of reserve. All the Mar-  
shals attended.

The *Paris-Nouvelles* caused consider-  
able sensation in all quarters by publishing  
an article denouncing the Warsaw meeting as  
nothing but a conspiracy on the part of the  
Government represented there against  
France, and also charged England with being  
a "go-between."

The same journal gives a report, that the  
Government of Austria proposes to negoti-  
ate with France for a pacific solution of the  
Italian question. She will resort to arms  
with the countenance of her new allies.

The Warsaw meeting abruptly adjourned  
on the 26th, owing to the illness of the  
Emperor of Russia. The royal parties  
and their Ministers had a conference on the  
25th.

Nothing authentic transpired, but a state-  
ment was afloat that the principle of Euro-  
pean Congress was adopted.

VENNA, 26th.—An order has been issued  
to prepare for the coronation of Francis  
Joseph as King of Hungary next Spring.

Warlike preparations are being exten-  
sively increased on the Mincio.

The Paris Bourse was dull. The three  
parties closed at 68<sup>1/2</sup> 86<sup>1/2</sup>.

Lincoln and Hamlin will therefore guide the  
destines of the United States for the next  
four years. Never has a similar election  
been contested with greater vigor.

Every effort which it were possible to  
make; every guile which it were possi-  
ble to invent; every expedient which could  
be devised, was used by the supporters of  
the different candidates opposed to Lincoln  
to secure his defeat, and their own success,  
but in vain. Notwithstanding all the uni-  
ons and fusions which could be and were  
invented, Lincoln and Hamlin, supported by  
the undivided and indissoluble phalanx of  
the Republican party, has over-ridden all  
opponents. At one time it was supposed  
that owing to the number of aspirants, the  
election of President would be thrown into  
Congress; but those whose breasts braked  
this expectation have been egregiously  
deceived.

**GOLD IN CANADA.**—The Quebec Chro-  
nicle says that some of the habitants have dis-  
covered gold deposits in Lower Canada.—  
Recently nuggets of the value of over \$50,  
of wonderful purity, were sold to jewellers  
in that city. Of the positive existence of  
gold in Canada, the Chronicle says:

"We are informed that native gold was  
found in Canada upwards of thirty years  
since. The first large nugget weighing over  
three ounces, was picked up by a young  
girl washing clothes in a brook emptying  
into the Chaudiere River, in the Seigniory  
of St. Francois. This nugget remained sev-  
eral months in the house of the habitant, be-  
fore it was known to be gold. It seemed  
soft and a piece was cut off with an axe. A  
patent was obtained by the Seigneurs, Mes-  
srs. DeLery, from the Government, and after  
some years, a lease of the patent was  
sold to a company of gentlemen of this city  
and Montreal, who worked the rivers and  
streams of the Seigniory, on all of which  
more or less gold was found. The greatest  
quantity collected in one season was sold  
for about nine hundred pounds. The difficulty  
of finding honest laborers and the great cost  
of superintendence, made the speculation  
unprofitable, and the different associates sold  
out to one of their number, Dr. James Dug-  
laz, who now owns the patent rights. A  
company was formed, who also work another  
stream, the Duloupe, to the south of St.  
Francois. This company, consisting of Mr.  
Duglaz, (brother of Sir William,) the late  
Sir George Simpson and others, washed out

several pounds one season. At the Crystal  
Palace Exhibition, a box containing a large  
quantity of Canadian gold was shown, and  
attracted the notice of Her Majesty, who  
examined the nuggets with great interest.

It is said that several ship carpenters and  
others from St. Roch's have been making  
good wages this season in washing gold."

## Melancholy Accident.

The following particulars relative to the  
melancholy death by drowning of Henry G.  
Simonds, Esq., son of the late Hon. Charles  
Simonds, are taken from the *Freeman*:

On Thursday the race between the rath-  
erette and Aurora was to take place on the  
Kennebecasis. The *maiden* was said to  
be \$200 a-side, and there were other bets  
also. The horse appointed for starting was  
John P. M., and it was said that they were  
to start at that hour, however the weather  
may be. The Aurora went up on Wednes-  
day. On Thursday it blew almost a hurricane,  
and the general impression was, that  
there could be no race. But Mr. Simonds,  
whose yacht had not yet gone up the river,  
was determined to get to the starting place  
and his crew did all in their power to  
wreck the little vessel up to no avail.—  
It is said that they even attempted to tow  
her with a small vessel belonging to Mr.  
Mullarmin the Pilot, but in this they also  
failed. After spending the day in these  
efforts they were at length compelled to  
anchor the "Petrel" near the Island, below  
a place called Barlow's Bluff. Mr. Simonds  
then determined to cross over and make  
some new arrangements about the race, and  
he with four young lads named  
Bridges, Stone, Sprout, and Mullin, all  
accustomed to boating, they all got into a  
small boat belonging to Mullarmin. They  
pulled up the river some miles under the lip  
of the Island, and turned to cross the river  
nearly opposite Appleby's Wharf. When  
nearly mid-stream the young men say that  
Mr. Simonds ordered a salto, so that the boat  
could hardly live as it was, and if any sail  
was set they would be lost; that he insisted  
and the sail was put up but scarcely was it  
hoisted when they found it was swamping  
the boat, and the called out to him to let go  
the sheet, and they endeavored to let mast  
and sail go overboard. The sheet was not  
loosed sufficiently, and it is thought that it  
must be in the very effort to get rid of it  
that the boat was upset by the mass's catch-  
ing under one of the seats, as the sail drifted  
in with the boat. All five were thrown into  
the water. Mr. Simonds, who did not know  
how to swim, made but a few struggles, and  
disappeared almost instantly. It is said that  
he caught one of the young men by the trous-  
ers, and that the piece tore away in his  
grasp. The others succeeded in laying hold  
of the boat and they drifted down until they  
reached the shore near Torryburn. About  
5 o'clock some persons saw them when they  
were near land, and told those who had gone  
out to see the race and were staying at Torry-  
burn that there were some men on a log  
in the river. The party all went out imme-  
diately, and met young Bridgeman walking  
towards the house, the others they found  
lying in the bushes near the shore numbered  
and helpless. They took them to Torryburn  
House and by means of warm applications  
soon restored them. The young men say  
that the boat upset and Mr. Simonds was  
drowned about three quarters of a mile from  
the shore, and that they were in the water  
about an hour and a half, and drifted three  
or four miles, but they must have been  
misled as to time and distance.

On Friday morning a steamer and a large  
number of boats and men were engaged in the  
search for the body, but all their exertions  
so far have been unavailing.

The water is said to be twenty to thirty fathoms deep

where the body is supposed to be.

In connexion with the above, we cannot  
omit praise to the several persons who assis-  
ted in restoring the survivors, among whom  
was Mr. William Austin, who immediately  
proceeded to the spot where they landed  
and had them conveyed to his house, from  
which, after being properly attended to, they  
were brought to the City.—[Courier.]

**DESPERADO IN CANADA.**—The Chatham  
(C. W.) *Planter* has an account of the  
appearance in that place of a desperado char-  
acter, Mark Galbraith, from Kansas, who  
had promised to induce four girls to promise to  
elope with him. Two of the girls were  
sisters. One of them was observed by the  
mother busily packing up her clothes, who  
made inquiries; and thus obtained a clue to  
what was going on. This being made pub-  
lic, and the girls being respectable though  
poor, it was determined by young men of  
the place to summarily punish the fellow.

During the night eight of them, disguised  
as women, laid in wait for Galbraith, who was  
out with a friend.

He was captured and compelled to strip.  
This he declined to do, and drew a bowie knife and attacked  
the party.

One man was badly cut on the eye  
and a third was wounded in the groin, prob-  
ably fatally. The fellow was then knocked  
down, stripped, and a coat of feather and  
feathers applied. He was also severely beaten  
and ordered to leave the place. But his inj-  
uries were so severe that he was unable to

walk.

Naples Correspondent of the London *Times*, under date of Sept. 26, says:

"The greatest wonder of the day, and the  
fact which inspires the greatest hope for fu-  
ture of this country is that the Bible and  
the New Testament were exposed for sale in  
Tolosa yesterday. I have never seen them  
before, though they may have been lying  
there for some days; but the 23rd of

September, 1860, was written in letters in  
the history of the Two Sicilies as the day when  
the true light of freedom was shed in this  
country—Modestus' *Bible* selling in the  
streets of Naples? Who could ever believe  
it? They were English editions, and in the  
same form and were a marvels sight  
for the Neapolitans, for I have no doubt  
that not one man in a thousand has ever  
seen a book—vast numbers could not have  
read it, though the kingdom is teeming with  
priests who assume to be the lights of the

world.
