

TELEGRAPH NEWS.

LONDON, May 15.
Late and important despatches received from Japan. Civil War vigorously prosecuted, and army of the Mikado arrived at a point near Tokio. A dispatch from Athens contains the following:—The Spakian mutineers claim that in view of conflict with the Turks the latter were driven to the sea coast.

New York, May 15.
An Ottawa despatch says Dominion Parliament expects to be prorogued on Saturday next.
Gold closed steady.

London, 15th—midnight.
In the House of Commons this evening, John Bright presented a petition from Nova Scotia, praying that Parliament would repeal the Act by which that province was united to the Dominion of Canada. The petition describes the Canadian union as an evil uncalculated for and unjust. The result of a surprise sprung on the people, and of fraud practiced upon parliament. After the reading of the document, the evening of twenty-sixth just, was assigned for debate on the subject.

Ottawa, May 15.
The Government brought down despatches from the Imperial Government in reply to an address passed during the first of the Session respecting the North West Territory. Despatch contains correspondence between the Imperial Government and Hon. Mr. May, and states that by Imperial Legislation the claims of the Company will be transferred to the Home Government on settlement of the Company's claim.

Holton, Doran and others represented the position of the Dominion Government as having nothing in being trusted to arrange directly with the Company without Imperial intervention as their address asked.

The despatch will be printed, and will elicit discussion which may prolong the session. Sir John stated intention to prorogue on Wednesday permitting.

Washington, May 15.
The Imperial Government of President Johnson came up at noon to day in the 11th article. The vote stood 35 for conviction to 19 for acquittal. The required two-thirds not being affirmative the President stands acquitted on the 11th article.
Immediately after voting the Senate adjourned to May 26th.

London, May 15th.
An ecclesiastical body waited upon the Queen at Windsor Castle yesterday, presented to her Majesty an address from the hierarchy of the Irish Church, giving their views in regard to the great change contemplated in the establishment. The Queen replied in vague terms not committing herself to the policy of either the Church or Liberal party on the question.

New York, May 15.
Gold unchanged.

Toronto, May 15.
It is stated that the council of Roman Catholic Bishops met in St. Andrew's, Quebec, last evening, Bishop Lynch of Toronto to be Archbishop of the Province subject to a final confirmation by the Pope.

It is also announced that Father Dowd of Montreal will be appointed Coadjutor Bishop of the Diocese in room of Bishop Lynch.

New York, May 15.
The acquittal of the President on the eleven article of impeachment caused considerable excitement among the Republicans and rejoicing among the Democrats.

Salutes were fired by the latter in various parts of the country.

It is thought the remaining articles of impeachment will not be voted upon.

Gold opened at 139½.

Ottawa, May 15.
In Senate, Campbell moved second reading of Bill relating to offences against the person.

In Commons Message from His Excellency was read, transmitting despatch from Secretary of State, in which latter is commended to give order for the appointment of Lieutenant-General Sir Robert Napier, K.C.B. G. C. S. I., commanding her Majesty's forces in Abyssinia, to be an ordinary member of the division of the first class, or knights grand cross of the most honourable order of the Bath.

A HORRID CONSPIRACY. The most fiendish plot that man's depravity could invent, was lately discovered in season to prevent the contemplated disastrous result, and cause the arrest of the conspirators. The New Albany, Ind., Commercial of April 22d. It seems that seven men entered into an agreement to wreck and rob the pay train of the Jeffersonville railroad. The plan, which was drawn up in writing, contemplated the throwing of a train from the track at a point some ten miles out from Jeffersonville, the murder, if necessary, of all those upon the train, and the robbery of the paymaster's safe of its contents, which it was thought would be from twenty-five to thirty thousand dollars. The article of agreement was of the most terrible character. It bound each conspirator to commit murder as well as robbery. It also stipulated that if any one of the conspirators were wounded in the affair so as to be unable to get away, his companions were to kill him, and thus put it out of his power to inform against them. It was further agreed

how the money was to be divided, the share of each being specified. The train was to be thrown from the track, by removing or loosening one or more of the rails. It was agreed also that if there were more than the usual number of persons with the train, that the conspirators were to fire upon them and kill them just as the train was reaching the place where it was to be wrecked.

Before the time arrived for the carrying out of their plans, one of the conspirators, being struck with horror, renounced and communicated the plot to the Superintendent. The information caused the arrest of the others, while the former will be retained as witness. It is said that the conspirators had solemnly sworn to kill any of their number who might betray the plot. Fortunately, the human nature of one of them revolted at the horror, and whole-sale murder and robbery was thus prevented.

SOME FURTHER PARTICULARS of the late accident at Bermuda are given in the Halifax Express. Lieut. Fletcher and his party were on their way from Port Royal to Hamilton to post letters for home, when the boat capsized, only 40 yards from shore, leaving the four occupants struggling in the water. An old woman who saw them, ran for assistance, but before it arrived they had all disappeared. The authorities set parties to work grappling at once, the boat was first brought up and it contained a lady's slipper and parasol. Eventually all the bodies were recovered. The same paper gives it as a rumor that the servant swam to the shore and then returned, in the hope of picking up his lady, and sank exhausted; but this does not seem to be fully verified.

SAINT ANDREWS, MAY 20, 1868.

The business of the Parliament at Ottawa is drawing to a close, and it is expected that the prorogation will take place this week. An Act constituting the Department of Customs was passed. The following Resolution is before the House:—

That it is expedient to repeal the tonnage duties now payable in the Provinces of Quebec, Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, on vessels entering Ports therein, for or towards defraying the expenses of the relief and medical treatment of sick or disabled mariners, and instead thereof to impose, for the purpose aforesaid, a duty of two cents per ton register on vessels arriving from sea in any Port in any of the said Provinces:—no vessel of one hundred tons or less, to be subject to the payment of such duty more than once in any one year nor any other vessel more than twice in any one year.

The Resolutions of supply were passed, granting the Lieut. Governors of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick \$7,000 per annum, and those of Ontario and Quebec \$8,000. The Ministers who are members of the Privy Council are to receive \$2,000 per annum. The Chief Justice of the Maritime Provinces are to receive \$4,000 per annum, the Equity Judges \$4,000, the Common Law Judges \$3,200, the County Judges each \$2,000 and travelling expenses not to exceed \$200. Retiring allowances to Judges of the Supreme Court after fifteen years service or permanent infirmity, equal to two thirds of their salaries are to be given. Marine Hospital, St. Andrews and other Ports in the Province \$2,400, St. John \$4,878. Militia Services New Brunswick \$80,000, Military pensions in New Brunswick \$700, and compensation to Pensioners in lieu of Land \$9,450. Construction of E. & N. A. Railway \$31,750, Western Extension, \$180,000 subsidy to ditto \$150,000, to meet subsidies on other lines in this Province \$141,000.

REMARKABLE DISCOVERY.—The greatest trouble has been experienced by scientific men in extracting all the gold from the ores in which it has been found; the methods adopted being expensive and attended with considerable loss, owing to much of the auriferous deposit being mixed with the quartz. Several experiments have been made, and various systems of extraction adopted, but with very little improvement. It remained with Col. Stevens, of New York, to discover a method by which all the gold would be extracted. A recent experiment was made with a quantity of gold bearing quartz by the common process, which yielded \$300 per ton; Col. Stevens' chemical substance called "flux" was tried and yielded \$1400 to the ton; the assayer was so surprised that he tried again with a like result.

It is probable that the "Colonel" will dispose of his newly discovered chemical agent, to those who require it for assaying gold, silver, and other precious ores, and that large quantities of the valuable metals will be secured, which otherwise would have remained in their native deposits, and that the flinty substances in which they are generally discovered will be utilized for other purposes. Col. Stevens' name will be heralded throughout those countries where valuable minerals are known to exist.

The heavy rains during the past week have

retarded farmers, particularly on low land; the grass however looks well, and the streams have risen sufficiently high to float the logs to the main river, and the mills are now busy sawing.

On Thursday Evening last, the Presbytery of St. John met in Greenack Church, in this town, for the purpose of inducing the Rev. Peter Kroy, A. M., Minister of the Church, consequent upon the resignation of the Rev. John Ross, from ill health.

Some four months ago, we announced that the Rev. Mr. Kroy had accepted the unanimous call sent him by the congregation, since which time he has been officiating here with much acceptability to the congregation, which is increasing in numbers. Indeed it is not out of place to state, that the Rev. gentleman is "a workman who needeth not to be ashamed," and that he is respected by all denominations.

The order of services in the church was commenced by praise and prayer, after which the Rev. Geo. J. Cair, of Portland, St. John, preached the Inaugural Sermon, from Ezekiel 3-17 verse, in which he pointed out the duties of a faithful Watchman or Minister; the questions and prayer by the Rev. J. M. R. spoke D. D., of Fredericton; address to the Minister by the Rev. Mr. Cair, and the address to the congregation by the Rev. James Kidd, M. A. The services were conducted according to the form of the Established Church of Scotland, and were solemn and interesting.

A correspondent "X" enquires "why the lamps on the Market Wharf are not lighted on dark nights?" He says that "the Town pays for their being lighted, and notwithstanding the wharf is frequently left in darkness to the great danger of men belonging to vessels falling over the wharf, as Mr. Serjt. Roix did on Thursday night last, severely injuring himself." We have noticed that there has been a want of attention to this matter and trust that it will not occur again.

RAPID LOADING.—As an instance of what can be done in despatching vessels at this Port we may state that the Schr. Daley, was loaded with 1900 railway sleepers in the short space of 7 hours; and the Emma Pemberton with 2400 sleepers in the remarkably short time of eight hours and a half! If this is not "quick dispatch" we should like to know what is.

The President's virtual acquittal on the eleventh article of the impeachment, the strongest of the number, gave great dissatisfaction to the Republicans, who were as demonstrative in their ire, as the Democrats were in their approval. The vote was a close one, so close that one vote would have placed Mr. Johnson in a dilemma which would have ruined him in all coming time. The Senate adjourned until the 26th inst.

A native of St. Andrews who has been absent for several years in California and Utah Territory, Mr. James Haley, returned here this week. He was acquainted with the late Dr. Robinson of St. Stephen, who he speaks of in the highest terms; and paid the last tribute of respect to his remains, by attending his funeral.

As usual there are several cleverly written articles—"Under the wrong Flag," is a capital paper, it points out clearly the evils which the Dominion labors under from the constant drain upon its population, by the "number of young men who cross over into the United States from the various Provinces." It shows "that few Canadians in the United States are doing better than they could at home." We have only space this week to notice briefly another article upon "Manufactures," written with great clearness and perspicuity, and with a power which will lead to the establishment of manufactures in the maritime provinces. We can discover in this article the style of a powerful writer whom we can say is an esteemed friend. He promises future articles to advocate the propriety of establishing manufactures; in previous numbers he contributed valuable papers on the Fisheries.

The Sackville Borderer says the Herring fishery along the Gulf shore has proved very successful this season. From the same paper we learn that several cargoes of hay have been shipped from Baie Verte to Miramichi, during the past few weeks.

London, May 18th.
In the House of Commons to night the Scotch reform bill was under consideration. Mr. William E. Baxter moved to add to the number of Scotch members of the House by taking the franchise from some of the small English boroughs.

Mr. Bowyer moved that the rating clause in the Bill be thrown out.
The Government opposed the motions and on a division in the House were beaten in both cases. Mr. Disraeli after the result of the last division was known, rose and said the ministry must now consider their position.
