Charlotte General Sessions,
April 15, 1868.
WHEREAS by the 7th Section of the Act for
regulating the sale of intoxicating Liquors the
Justices in Sessions, are authorized to make
such Rules and Regulations as they deem fit,
and to be observed by Tavern Keepers, and
whenever it has been found that the keeping of a
Billiard Table or other instrument for gaming in
any shop or place where spirits or wine li-
quors are sold, has had a very injurious effect
in leading young men and others who frequent
such places, into habits of gambling and other
evil practices.

Therefore it is ORDERED, That any shop or
room adjoining any shop in which such liquors
are sold or brewed, to be sold, on Billiard or
Baccarat table or other instrument of gaming
shall be kept or used, and if any person licensed to
sell liquor shall keep or use or allow to be kept
or used in his shop, or on his premises, any
such billiard table or other instrument, as afore-
said, such person on conviction thereof shall be
fined in the sum of Ten dollars and costs.
ORDERED—That no Barber shop shall be kept
in any place licensed for the sale of spirituous li-
quors under a like penalty as above ordered.
