The important part that chemical science plays in the general welfare of the people was well illustrated by the lecture which was last night delivered in the Institute of Public Health by E. in the Institute of Public Health by E. G. Sturdevant, associate professor of chemistry in the Western University. There was a good attendance, and Prof. Sturdevant's remarks were illustrated by a series of interesting experiments and a number of lantern slides showing diagrammatically how various substances are extracted from the atmosphere and put to commercial uses. As the lecturer pointed out, the atmosphere is composed of four-fifths nitrogen, and the separating of this constituent from the air and utilizing it in the manufacture of nitric acid is now carried out on a very extensive scale. the manufacture of nitric acid is now carried out on a very extensive scale. He explained in a very lucid manner the many ways in which nitric acid is employed—in the manufacture of fertilizers, in the making of dye stuffs, in the composition of explosives, and in innumerable other directions.





Ottawa, Feb. 25 .- Canadian Press .- Total imports for consumption in Canada during the 12 months ending January, 1921, were \$1,305,-593,895, against a total importations valued at \$970,779,210 during the previous 12 months. Canada's total exports for the 12 months ending January, 1921, were \$1,263,221,401. This was a decrease of \$28,791,786 from the total exports of merchandise during the previous 12 months. The figures for the year ending January, 1920 were \$1,291,013,187, and for the 12 months ending January, 1919, \$1,269,318,344. Of the exports during the year ending January 1921, the exports of Canadian goods reached a total valuation of \$1,235,621,584. These showed a decrease of almost \$7,000,000 from the figures of the previous year, but the greatest decrease in the grand total of exports was in foreign goods, where there was a decrease of well over \$20,000,000.

Of goods imported in the period ending January, 1921, \$875,809,039 were dutiable and the amount of duty collected was \$195,008,401. Duty

free goods imported were value at \$429,783,956.

The United States led the countries in shipping goods to Canada. Our purchases there during the 13 months ending January, 1921, reaching the total value of \$898.984,675 against \$754,652,222. There was a striking increase in the purchases from Britain in the period just ended. Total imports from Britain were valued at \$226,248,605, against \$97,396,449 in the previous 12 months.

BRITISH SYSTEM OF TEACHING GEOGRAPHY AN EXCELLENT ONE

In Opinion of Public School Inspector V. K. Greer.

Regret that the British system of beginning the education of boys and girls in geography and map reading is not in use here, was expressed today by Public School Inspector V. K. Greer, when his attention was drawn by The Advertiser to remarks alleged to have been made in an address to the Hamilton Teachers' Institute yesterday by Professor G. A. Cornish. Toronto.

Professor Cornish is reported to have scored the present methods of teaching geography and the maps provided for that purpose which he said "it could be readily seen had been prepared by school teachers." He declared that ter times too many names are crowded on to the maps and that thereby details of the country which should be taught are covered over.

Inspector Greer agreed with Professor Cornish that there are altogether too many names on the maps used in the schools and referring directly to the construction of maps, he said, "it is a pity that the system of teaching map reading used in the British Isles is not in vogue here."

There, the first thing that a child learns about a map is that it does not represent, as it appears to do, a flat surface, but a convex surface, the outside face of an arc or section of a round body, the globe or earth. By this method the child when looking at a map realizes that it is looking at a distorted presentation of the surface of the earth, and that it cannot use the same scala presentation of the surface of the earth, and that it cannot use the same scale to measure the distance from Halifax, N. Financially the roofs are just as high as ever. And there are just as many pretty girls, and just as much jazz—probably more jazz—and the girls come right down among the tables—right down where you are sipping your ginger ale or, licking your ice cream spoon, so you feel that you are very devilish and are "seeing life," and you have something to talk about when you get back home. So the roof shows are still popular.

George Bernard Shaw, the well-known press agent for George Bernard Shaw, the dramatist, has put over a new one. He has written to the New York Theatre Guild complaining of the manner in which rude persons laugh right out loud during performances of George Bernard Shaw plays. "Imagine," he says, "what a first performance of a symphony by Elgar would be like if the audience at every stroke of instrumentation, every fortissimo or pianissimo that pleased them, were to break into noisy applause, compelling the players to put down their instruments and the conductor his baton until silence was restored. Would the symphony be a symphony under such circumstances. Yet that is what I have to put up with, and what the players who interpret me have to put up with."

The Producing Managers' Association, Mr. Harris declares, "cannot possibly recognize any form of closed shop, and, therefore, the officials of the Actors' Equity Association are deliberately forcing upon the Producing Managers' Association a controversy which, on June 1, 1924 (the date when the present agreement expires), can result in nothing but a long period of strife, unemployment and distress."







The announcement was received with loud cheers from the Opposition benches and in dead silence by the Government forces.



He announced that he had dropped the idea of doubling the tax on trust companies, as they had made representations to him.

It was such a small amount that he thought it could not possibly acrease the cost of transportation, he said. He said he was not increasing the tax on railways beyond those obtaining in other provinces. He estimated that he would receive about \$40,000 extra this year by

Sandwich Pastor Is Acquitted On Charge of Manslaughter.

CLOSELY GUARDED

Precautions Taken Against Any Possible Demonstrations.

[Special To The Advertiser.] WINDSOR, Feb. 24.—While he has ot had time to make plans for the future, Rev. J. O. L. Spracklin, freed by a jury today on a charge of manslaughter arising out of the death of Beverley Trumble, may, it is understood, secure an extended leave of sence from his church, take a vacation to recuperate, and later engage in a lecture tour in the cause of tem-

a lecture tour in the cause of temperance.

This much was intimated tonight by Rev. Arthur Spracklin, brother of the acquitted minister.

Clesely Guarded.

Immediately following the trial Spracklin was taken away by relatives and friends to the home of his parents, where he intends remaining for a short time. Precautions are being taken by the Sandwich police for the safeguarding of Spracklin against any possible demonstration by friends of Trumble, who might take revenge into their own hands.

During the three days that Spracklin has been on trial on a charge of manslaughter, excitement has been at fever heat, and the old courthouse at Sandwich has housed the most eager crowd of spectators ever assembled at a court case in Essex County.

addresses and charge being concluded, the jury left the room at 2:20 p.m., and 55 minutes later they returned and reported that after considering all angles of the case and all evidence submitted they had come to the decision that "the fighting parson" was justified in what he did, even though a man's life had been sacrificed in the doing thereof. "It is not denied, it is admitted, that the prisoner shot Beverley Trumble," said Chief Justice Sir William Mulock, in his charge to the jury. "The question is, was it an unlawful or a lawful act? In this case, the prisoner pleads self-defence in justification of his action in killing Beverley Trumble.

"I would for a moment refer to the prisoner's presence in the hotel at this time. I instruct you as a matter of law that he was lawfully in the hotel, and he was there up to the moment of the shooting of Beverley Trumble. Now, he pleads self-defence, and the burden is upon any man who kills another to show sufficient reason in law for his act. If he is unable to do then the law assumes him guilty.

"Human life is sacred, and if any man takes the life of another he is immediately upon his defence. He must show justification. If he falls in showing justification, then he has done a wrong, It is for you to decide then whether in this case the circumstances have been shown that the prisoner shot Beverley Trumble, and you should aproach the consideration of this case from the standpoint that the prisoner killed Trumble, and is in law responsible for such killing unless circumstances appear which satisfy you that he was justified in killing Trumble."





FRENCH COMPANIES TO DEVELOP COLONIES

Formed to Exploit Forests, Fisheries Oll and Cotton.

NEW YORK, Feb. 24.—Within less than a year, according to advices received by the Bankers' Trust Company of this city from its French information service, some 25 new French companies have been organized for development of France's colonial wealth. The capital of these companies ranges from 50,000 francs to 75,000,000 francs. Specific aims

of the new corporations are general trade, the exploitation of forests, fishproved navigation and transportation. According to M. Sarraut, minister of the colonies, French railroad companies propose to secure necessary timber from the forests of equatorial Africa, and have combined to capitalize an organization for this purpose up to 75,000,000 francs. A concession of 100,000 hectares (about 250,000 acres) has been granted by the Government. The railroads plan to import the timber in their own ships. to import the timber in their own ships.

M. Sarraut has suggested a comprehensive program for development in the colonies which proposes the creation of a technically trained force for the work. His program would involve an outlay of 3,000,000,000 francs—2,000,000,000 for railroads, 400,000,000 for ports, 400,000,000 for improvement of waterways and irrigation, 150,000,000 for medical service and 10,000,000 for wireless installation. \$700 First Prize


