New York, Oct. 20.—The log of the City of Paris, which arrived here yesterday morning, shows the passage from Queenstown to have been made in 5 days 14 hours 24 minutes. The distance traversed was 2,782 miles. The day's runs were 148,508,503,505,530, and 288. This beats the record for a westward passage. The record up to this voyage was 5 days 15 hours and 58 minutes, held by the City of Paris.

A Russian Rumor.

LONDON, Oct. 21.—A special from St. Petersburg published in Berlin reports the following extraordinary news: "It is rumored at court that the Ameer of Afghanistan, with an escort of 50 retainers and high digaltaries, will arrive here with the beginning of November to personally consult with the Czar. As the Ameer was to meet Lord Roberts at the time mentioned, the matter is wholly inexplicable. Berlin politicians and diplomats refuse to believe it, and say there must be a mistake somewhere."

Almost a Casualty. London, Oct. 21.—The Archduke Charles Louis, oldest surviving brother of the Louis, oldest surviving brether of the Austrian Emperor, was in a carriage with his wife, the Archduchess Maria Theresa, returning from Wiener-Neustadt. The night was dark and the coachman lost the way. The carriage toppled into a ditch and turned upside down. The Archduke was stunned in the wreck, and the Archduchesswas severely injured about the lower limbs. The coachman was badly wounded about the head. The Archduke, as soon as he came to his senses, assisted his wife out of the wreck, and they made their way, to a railway station, some distance off, to a railway station, some distance off, where they received medical attention. The Archduke is the father of Franz Ferdinand, the heir to the Austrian throne.

Posed as a Prince. LONDON, Oct. 21 .- The pretended Prince f Teck, who has been personating Queen Victoria's son-in-law in a way that indi-cated unsoundness of mind, proves to be an American, whose real name is Heidlebourg, and a son of worthy parents in the United States. His swindling has been of such a clumsy character, and his assumption of and a son of worthy parents in the United States. His swindling has been of such a clumsy character, and his assumption of princely title so obviously begus and extravagant, that the authorities are inclined to accept the plea of his friends that he is insane. When arraigned on an indictment at the Old Bailey to-day the bogus prince pleaded guilty. He was represented by counsel engaged by his relatives, who surgested that the prisoner was a lunatic and should be treated as such. It was shown by the prosecution that the prevended prince had been previously convicted of fraudulent practices at Liverpool, Sentence was deferred in order to enable curther inquiry to be made as to his antecedents and mental condition.

Cream's Last Chance.

LONDON, Oct. 20. — The prosecution closed to-day in the case of Thomas Neil Gream, the alleged poisoner of Matilda Clover and other girls. Mr. Geoghan, Clover and other girls. Mr. Geoghan, in his opening argument for the defense, said that he would not call any witnesses. He commented on the small quantity of strychnine found in the body of Matida Clover and asserted that the death of the women was due to her excessive indulgence in drink.

Counsel also commented on the weakness of the identification of Neill Cream as the man who had been with the Clover woman just previous to her fatal seizure, and dilated upon the relationship that had existed between the Clover girl and the prisoner was a blackmailer.



THE CRIME OF MURDER.

As a consequence of recent tragedies, good deal of discussion has arisen with regard to the question of carrying dangerous weapons and as to what constitutes murder.

It is unlawful for any person-except officers of the law or individuals who have procured certificates of exemption from a justice of the peace-to carry a pistol or air gun elsewhere than in his own dwellinghouse, shop, warehouse or counting-house. The penalty for this offense is a fine of not more than \$25 or less than \$5, or imprisonment for one month, and invariably the weapon is confiscated. An interesting case under this law was decided in Hamilton a few years since. A Buffalo man came over to that city at a time when a disturbance was threatened about the lecturing of Wm. O'Brien, the Irish M. P. He was followed into a notel and arrested by a detective on hotel and arrested by a detective on a charge of earrying a revolver which was found in his pocket. The magistrate dismissed the charge, holding that a man's hotel is his "dwelling house" for the time being. From the frequency with which tramps and rowdies resort to revolvers when they find themselves in a tight box, we is forced to the complexion that the one is forced to the conclusion that the penalty is not stringent enough. Any man found with a loaded revolver in his posses sion, and unable to show a reasonable cause for his preparedness, should be sent to the penitentiary for a long term. Such a one is a murderer in his heart, and will not scruple to shoot down any one who op-

Any one is criminally guilty of the murder of another if death takes place within one year and a day of the cause of death, and culpable homicide becomes murder in each of the following cases:

1. If the offender means to cause the

death of the person killed.

2. If the offender means to cause the person killed any bodily injury which is known to the offender to be likely to cause whether death ensues

leath, and is reckless whether death ensues 3. If the offender means to cause death,

o. If the ellender means to cause death, or being so reckless as aforesaid, means to cause such bodily injury as aforesaid to one person, and by accident or mistake kills another person, though he does not mean to hurt the person killed.

4. If the offender, for any unlawful observed.

4. If the offender, for any unlawful object, does an act which he knows, or ought to have known, to be likely to cause death, and thereby kills any person, though he may have desired that his object should be effected without hurting ony one.

It has been asked whether or not a person is also guilty of murder who counsels another to commit the crime. The Cana-dian criminal code is clear on that point. ates that every one is a party to and guilty of an offense who (1) actually mits it; or (2), does or omits an act for the purpose of aiding any person to comcommission of the offense; or (4), counsels is always dangerous, and has been known mit the offense; or (3), abets any person in or procures any persons to commit the offense. There is no mistaking that explanation of the responsibility of the acces-

sory to crime. some instances, culpable homicide, which would otherwise be murder, may be reduced to manslaughter if the person reduced to manslaughter if the person who causes death does so in the heat of passion caused by sudden provocation. Any wrongful act or insult of such a nature as to be sufficient heat of passion caused by sudden provocation. Any wrongful act or insult of such a nature as to be sufficient to deprive an ordinary person of the power of self-control, may be provocation if the affender acts upon it on the sudden and before there has been any time for his passion to cool. These, however, are questions of fact that shall be decided by the evidence. No one can be held to give provocation to another by doing that which he had a legal right to do, or by doing anything which the offender incited him to do in order to provide the offender with an excuse for killing or doing health.

In Great Britain, Walpole served his country as Premier from 1721 to 1742, 20 years and 10 months—the elder Pitt was Premier from 1783 to 1801, a period of 17 years and 84 days; and the Earl of Liverpool was head of the Government from 1812 to 1827—in all 14 years and 319 days—when death cut his career short. No other British states—was when head head of company was to the states. nan who has headed governments in the last 100 years ever enjoyed a continuous term of office extending into double figures. There are various reasons for Sir Oliver's

niform success. Chief among these is the uniform success. Chief among these is the fact that the people have faith in the honesty of his administration. No scandal has been developed under his regime, and though some of us believe that he moves a little slow in some matters, it has generally appened that he has advanced quite a fast as the people were willing to give effect-

ive support to his legislative measures.
Sir Oliver, though well up in years, enjoys physical and intellectual vigor superior to many who are his juniors. That he may live to equal the age of Gladstone, and continue to serve his Province in the capacity in which he has done her such good ervice in the past, is a wish that will be ndorsed by the large majority of the elect

A RIGHTEOUS VERDICT.

While the rascal temporarily sojourned in this city, some 15 or 16 years ago, a girl that came under his care died, and the newspaper men who investigated the affair had little doubt that he murdered her; but legal evidence was wanting and he escaped. Since that time, this utterly unscrupulous scoundrel is believed to have killed at least a dozen women. For many years he escaped his just deserts, but he has been enmeshed at last. His exposure and conviction give small comfort to those who may be tempted to follow in his footsteps. At the time when he thought himself most secure, a righteous retribution overtook him, and his misspent life must end in ignominy.






