# Dr. Stevenson Sweeps City In Race For London Mayoralty

SIX HOTELS MUST GO VERDICT

Slate Is Carried to Victory and Will Insist On Resignation

Popular Doctor Makes Remarkable Run in Three-Cornered Fight and Defeats Would-Be Fourth-Termer, Transforming Latter's 704 Majority Into Defeat.

London yesterday elected Public! Utilities Commissioner Dr. H. A. Stevenson as its mayor by a plurality of 232 over his two opponents. and a majority of 672 over C. M. R. Graham; put a successful crimp in the fourth-term aspirations of Mayor Graham; decided to go back to the ward system of electing aldermen; voted to reduce the number of liquor licenses in the city by six: expressed willingness to abide by the board of control system of city management, and turned down a bylaw to issue \$40,000 debentures for the construction of a bridge across the Thames at the foot of Richmond street. It also expressed sympathy with the idea of extending the franchise to married women by passing that bylaw by more than 1,300 votes.



'Discovers" City Company No Lives Lost In Bombard-**Using Natural Product and** Investigates.

PUTS KINK IN SERVICE

Municipal Aides Uncover Not Plot, But Plug and High Heaven Smell.

Everyone will remember that with high hopes and the expenditure of much money, a natural gas company laid pipes to the city limits on Ridout street south. The citizens objected, not to natural gas, but to certain noxious odors that came with it, which have since been removed at a special purify-

Parallels "Natural" Mains. Recently the City Gas Company laid new mains of the "booster" type on Ridout street to replace the old mains. These old mains ran to a point just outside the present city limits, par-allel with the natural gas mains for some distance, but on the opposite side of the street.

The City Gas Company did not know that it was suspected of having linked up its mains with the natural gas mains, and of plping the purified gas to the homes of citizens.

Paris, Jan. 2.-The Belgrade correspondent of the Havas Agency, in a dispatch dated December 31, describes the bombardment of the Servian capital by four Austrian monitors, which, he says, took place on Wednesday. His message follows:

"Yesterday at noon the enemy's guns fired several shots on Karabourana. One shell fell in the city, damaging a house. Towards 6 o'clock in the afternoon four glass and fore-and-aft peaked cap.

May Be First of the Enemies' Formidable Sent To Bottom B y Mine or Submarine-Light Cruiser Rescues Eighty and Trawler Picks Up Se venty.

LONDON, Jan. 1.—2:14 p.m.—The British battleship Formidable was sunk this morning in the English Channel

by either a mine or a submarine, according to an announcement given out by the official information bureau. The text of the bureau's statement follows:

"The battleship Formidable was sunk this morning in the Channel, but whether by a mine or a submarine is not yet certain.

"Eighty survivors have been picked up by a British light cruiser, and it is possible that others may have been rescued by other vessels."

LONDON, Jan. 2 .- 3:42 a.m. The Daily Chronicle states that survivors of the battleship Formidable report that the vessel was torpedoed both fore and aft early Friday morning and sank almost immediately, giving the crew hardly time to escape.

The Chronicle's Brixham correspondent, who is authority for the above, says the captain of the trawler Providence, which rescued seventy survivors who had escaped from the battleship in a cutter, states that other fishing boats were close at hand. The captain expresses the belief that other survivors have been rescued and taken to Dartmouth. He saw no other boats belonging to to the Formidable, however.

The Chronicle's Chatham correspondent says that the Formidable left that port on Thursday morning.

The British battleship Formidable had a displacement of 15,000 tons. She was 430 feet long and carried a complement of 750 men. She was heavily armored and carried four 12-such guns, twelve 6-inch guns and sixteen 12-pounders. She was provided also with four submerged torpedo tubes.

The Formidable was launched in 1898, and was a sister ship to the Irrespitable and the Implace ble.

The Formidable had assigned to her, according to the British navy list for December, various fleet officers and consequently she undoubtedly was acting as a flagship at the time of her destruction. Her captain was Arthur N. Loxley and her commander Charles E. Ballard. Captain John C. Deed was in command of the marines on board while the fleet surgeon was Godfrey Taylor and the fleet paymaster P. J. Ling. The chaplain is given as the Rev. George D. Robinson. On board the Formidable were also sixteen midshipmen.

# YEAR SPLENDIDLY

Loans Easily Negotiated In United States-Few Business Failures.

[Canadian Press.] TORONTO, Jan. 1.-The aggregate of Canadian borrowings abroad last year was less by almost one hundred million dollars than in 1913. The total Government, railway, public utility and municipal issues were \$252,650,000 as against \$351,408,629 in 1913. This estimate indicates that a strained position is being relieved by the ease with which Canadian borrowers of quality are financing their requirements in the United States. Loans by Canadian corporations would have fallen much further below last year but for the interest in Canadian securities manifested by financial centres in the United States in the final months of the year.

Canadian railways in the year borrowed \$54,000,000 in London and \$12,-630,000 in the United States.




