INCREASE IS SLOW IN POPULATION

Half the City Will Not Show Gain of Much More Than 150.

LONDON'S CENSUS FIGURES

Are Not Any Too Reassuring, But Assessment Is Going Ahead at Rapid Rate.

The assessment commissioner has not yet completed the returns Ward 3; but the work will be finished

So far as can be learned the reports are satisfactory so far as the assessment itself is concerned, and a subtantial increase, amounting to per-haps \$200,000, will be added to taxproperty in that ward. The population figures, however, are

not extremely encouraging, the population showing but a small increase. The figures are not complete as yet but it was stated today that the crease would be between 75 and 100. Ward 4 showed only 41 more in population than last year, so the increase in half the city is not 150.

It is quite likely that Ward 1 will not show much growth in population, although there has been a healthy increase in South London, but Ward 2 will not show more population than iast year, so it looks very much as if the population of London will lack the necessary 600 increase to make the population 50.000.

A MONSTER ENGINE.

Montreal, June 15 .- The Canadian Pacific is just completing the biggest locomotive ever built in Canada, which was designed by Mr. H. H. Vaughn, and built at the Angus shops. This monster locomotive is 70 feet from end to end, and, with the loaded tender, weighs nearly two hundred tons. The boiler, which is about the size of two ordinary boilers, contains the equivalent of 4.000 feet of heating surface, and will develop 2,200 horse-power. The engine is of the Mallet articulated type, and is practically two engines under one big boiler.
