





Field, however, didn't seem to ap-

preciate very highly the gift the crown conferred upon him, for on Aug. 27, 1802, he transferred his property to one Thomas King, of Montreal, who is described in the quaint legal phraseology of the time as a yeoman. Vo consideration was named

Ship's Carpenter Got It. On May 6, 1808, Thomas Knight and Puncan Cameron, his attorneys, sold o Joshua Leach for \$121 50 a portion of the property 208 feet along the north side of King, with a depth of 104 feet. This included the Janes lot at the corner. Leach held on all through the war of 1812, feeling no doubt when the Americans landed here and burned the parliament buildings and the fort that he had been very foolish to invest his good English gold in a dinky little town like York. But on June, 1814, he saw a chance to get out right; and when a ship's carpenter by the name of John Dennis offered him £400, or about \$1,-944 for his property, he took it quick.

John Dennis died, but his son, Joseph, held on to the lot till June 15, 1836. PROF. DEARNESS TELLS OF COMET

People of Danger to the Earth.

NEXT

At Present It Cannot Be Seen With the Naked Eye - Some Interesting Facts Concerning the Phenomena.



Today Halley's comet, the cen tre of all interest for months and appearance the greatest astronomical event in many years, is portant point in its circuit.

An Advertiser e presentative had an interview today with Vice-Principal Dearness, of the Normal School. Mr

Dearness is well qualified to speak on the subject, and gave some very interesting data regarding the comet. He said: "Today, April 19, is the most important in the comet's 75-year trip.

It is at its nearest point to the sun, only 60,000,000 miles distant, and it is going at its most furious spurt, 1,900 miles a minute. "April 1st its distance from earth was one and a half times the earth's distance from the sun, but the earth and comet have been rapidly

drawing towards each other for the past fortnight. See It in May. "It may be expected to be worth the trouble of early rising to see it, in the first two weeks after the 18th of May, when it passes between us and the sun, and will be visible in the evening. It should be at its grandest

about the 21st to 24th of May, but the bright moonlight will dim brightness. "It has been reported to be tailless but Prof. Barnard, who has been making regular measurements of its tail, reported that appendage to be 5.000. 000 miles long on Feb. 3, and rapidly increasing. Comets' tails lengthen as they approach the sun. On the 27th of February the tail had become long enough to reach from where the comet

"The newspapers are full of statements regarding the comet, and keep the public pretty well in touch with its movements," continued Mr. Dearness Asked as to whether he had as ye seen the comet, Mr. Dearness replied morning now people will report see-

ing it.
"The comet is travelling very fast." said Mr. Dearness, "and drawing rapidly nearer. Travelling at the rate of almost 1,900 miles a minute, or 1,878 miles a minute, to be nearer exact, it can easily be seen that 24 hours will make a great difference in its proximity to the earth.

90,000,000 Miles Away. "At present the earth is something over 90,000,000 miles from the comet, that is about as great a distance as eparates the earth and sun. The comet will be at its closest on May 18, when its distance from the earth will be somewhere between 12.-000,000 and 15.000,000 miles." Mr. Dearness was asked as to whether he thought it possible to see the

comet now.
"It might be possible with a rair of good binoculars," he replied. soon, however, it should be visible to the naked eye, because its tail is at its greatest length.

No Danger Mr. Dearness characterized the talk of danger to the earth as nonsense. "The tail of the comet will be projected away from the earth, but the earth and the comet are not in the


