

TRAPPED WHEN ON THE TRAIL

Estimated That Two Score Were Drowned Seeking a Haven From the Flames.

Porcupine, July 18.—South Porcu pine and Pottsville today stand blackened and smoking ruins. There are over one hundred lives lost at a conservative estimate, and the mone tary less runs into many thousands Prospectors coming in from outlying sections tell of narrow escapes and more will be necessary to complete anything like a correct list.

An estimate of the number drowned in Porcupine Lake while at tempting to escape from the fire runs from twenty to forty. At Redstone River, five are reported dead on the trail, and possibly twenty on the trail to Mattagami. Juvenile Charged With Burglary, Slips Out of Woodstock Jail.

Woodstock, Ont., July 13. — By crawling through a stoveplpe hole a 14-year-old lad named Webb made a sensational escape from the Woodstock lock-up last night. The lad was wanted in Watford on a charge of stealing \$70 and a hores and buggy, and he came to Woodstock with the Orangemen. An officer from Watford recognized the boy, and handed him over to the police, who put him in the lock-up. Webb climbed to the top of the cell, and, removing a metal covering from a stovepipe hole, and tearing away the metal surrounding it, he crawled through, and emerged into the corridor. He sprang the lock of the outer door and has not been seen since.







THE CROP REPORT IS SATISFACTORY

Although Winter Wheat in This Province Shows Decrease.

NUMBER OF LIVE STOCK

Excellent Uniformity Shown Throughout All the Provinces.

An Excellent Uniformity Snown.

Ottawa, Jaiy 14.—A builtetin on the crops and live stock of Canada was Issued today. The condition of the fleid crops of Canada for the month ending June 30 as compiled in the pensus and statistics office from the reports of a large staff of correspondents is, on the whole, quite satisfactory, although on account of the uneven rainfall, it is not uniform for all the provinces. Even in parts of the same province, as in Ontario, there is a considerable inequality. For the most part, in the province excellent reports are made, but there are districts in which the grain and hay have been badly affected for want of rains in May and June. For the whole of Canada the condition of winter wheat is only 75.26 per cent, as compared with 100 for a full crop. This is 10 per cent less than last year, 2 per cent less than last year, 2 per cent less than three years ago. In Ontario it is only 73 per cent of a full crop, as compared with 94.29 last year, 78.6 in 1909 and 88 in 1908. In Alberta the only other province in which winter wheat is largely grown, the condition this year is 83.22 per cent, compared with 63.62 in 1910, 65.65 in 1909, and 95 in 1908. Spring wheat in all the provinces this year is given the high average condition of 94.78 at the end of June, which is better than in 1910 by 12.65 per cent, better than in 190 by 8 per cent, and better than in 1908 by nearly 15 per cent. Ontario and British Columbia are the only provinces in which the conditions are under 90, and in Sas-katchewan and Manitoba it is close to katchewan and Manitoba it is close t

The average for barley is 93, which is six to ten per cent, better than in the preceding three years. It reaches close to 95 in the Northwest pro-vinces, Prince Edward Island and vinces, Prince Edward Island and New Brunswick, and over 90 in Nova Scotia and Quebec, a point below 90 In Ontario, and only 84 in British Columbia. Oats show an average of 94.46 for all provinces, which is high-er than any year since 1908, and is 95 or higher in Prince Edward Island, New Brunswick, Quebec and the Northwest provinces. In Ontario it 4s close to 90 and over 90 in British Columbia.

Rye, peas and mixed grains are given a condition of about 90 for the Dominion and are higher than in any year beginning with 1908. Hay and clover and alfalfa are both below last year's condition, and pasture is a point higher. In the three North-West provinces the condition of pasture is over 100.

The feature of late creals is the increase of area in flax, which is nearly 300,000 acres more than last year. The largest increase of flax is in Saskatchewan, where this crop in recent years has grown in great favor.

REFUGEES TELL OF THE HORROR

Survivors of Porcupine Catastrophe Arrive at Toronto.

THRILLING EXPERIENCES Newspaper Man From Guelph Amongst the Dead.

Toronte, July 14.-Further details o awful disaster in Northern On io with additional estimates of the ad running from 100 to 500, were brought to Teronto last evening by miners and prospectors, who arrived from the north on the Grand Trunk train from North Bay which reached Toronto at 11:15. Every man who was seen expressed the opinion that the death list will run up to at least 300. Many of those who stepped from the train last night were without any clothing except that which they wore, and most of them had no coats. Their boots were scorched white, showing where they had walked over the hot ground. Many auxious friends were waiting for the arrival of the train, and as the survivors stepped to the station platform they were at once surrounded and hurried away some to hotels, some to private residences, and others hurried to Turkish bathouses.

Mr. J. J. Moss, a mine operator from Reno, Nevada, was among those who saved their lives by standing shoulder deep in the waters of Pormpine Lake until the fury of the lames subsided. He said that fully 400 people fied to the lake, and ex-pressed the belief that twenty or thirty in his vicinity had drowned. "In addition to the people who were on the ground when the fire broke out," he said "there were 300 prospectors who had arrived on Saturday and Sunday, and they were all going into the woods. They must have perished. On Wednesday night 55 people slept in a Pullman car at Cochrane, while others slept in the T. and N. O. station, in day cars, box cars, and cattle cars. tation, in day cars, box cars, attle cars. They were glad to cattle cars. They were glad to get thywhere in order to snatch a few hours' sleep." When he left the north 17 bodies had been taken from the Dome Mine. Five or ten more were a sight, but had not been taken out. in sight, but had not been taken out. Coming down from Englechtrough a section of the country which is burned over, and the heat from the ground was so intense that both side of the coaches were scorched. 


