ANADIANS CLEAR ENEMY FROM SLOPES OF VIMY RIDGE

CANADIANS CLEAR FOE'S TROOPS FROM BOTH SIDES OF VIMY

Boys From the Dominion Foil Counter-Attack and Hold Safely Ground Won Yesterday-Germans Reach the Support Trenches Near Ypres, But Are Promptly Ejected-9,000 Prisoners and 40 Guns Taken Monday.

London, April 10.—The British offensive between at ons and St. Quentin, with which the spring operations have been opened and which is still in progress, has proved even more successful than the earlier accounts indicated. Gen. Sir Douglas Haig today reports that yesterday's captures exceeded 9,000 men, while 40 guns fell into the

hands of his troops SLOPES ARE CLEARED.

The Canadians, who had one of the hardest bits of the front to contend with, are now in complete occupation of the famous Vimy Ridge, even the eastern slopes of the ridge having been cleared of Germans. The Canadians

also have repulsed German counter-attacks. These reactions by the Germans indicate the importance they attach to this position, whence the conquerors look down over the plain of Douai. With Vimy ridge, gone the whole German line covering the French towns and industrial districts to the north becomes a wavering one, and any leisurely retreat the Germans may have planned is made uncertain and precarious.

TIGHTENS THE CHAIN. With the capture of the famous ridge the British made a considerable stride along the road to Douai, while the capture of the high ground northwest of St. Quentin tightens the chain which the Anglo-French forces are draw-

ing around that town. A German diversion southeast of Ypres, according to Gen. Haig's report, met with no success.

The Germans succeeded in reaching British support trenches but were immediately ejected.

HUNDREDS LOSE LIFE BY RAZING OF GREAT PLANT

Pa., Destroyed by an Explosion.

WOMAN AND GIRLS KILLED

Loss of Life Is Reported To Be Very Heavy and May Total 300.

Chester, Pa., April 10 .- A terrific explosion at the great plant of the Eddystone Ammunition Corporation at Eddystone, Pa., a mile from this city, is reported to have killed from 125 to 250 persons and injured at least 300 more. A railroad official asserts that nearly 300 were killed, but this estimate cannot be con-

Chester, Pa., April 10.—An explosion occurred in the Aetna plant of the munition works at Eddystone, near here, Many persons are reported to have been injured, and doctors were rushed from this city and surrounding towns to the scene of the accident.

Two Explosions.

There were two explosions shortly after 10 o'clock, and in about ten minutes a third explosion occurred, heavier than either of the two preceding blasts. One building near the Delaware River front of 'he plant caught fire and was still burning at 11:15 a.m.

The Chester Times reports that fifty persons were killed and many injured. Physicians are flocking to the scene.

The president of the Baldwin Locomotive Works denies stories of death and injury. Heavy Loss of Life.

The greatest confusion prevails, and no one is allowed to approach the plant in which the explosion occurred. The trolley line to Eddystone is not running because its wires were destroyed.

Latest reports make the loss of life very heavy, between 75 and 150 being the last figures given. The little Chester morgue is filled with bodies, and they are piled upon the sidewalk outside the building.

It is stated the building in which the explosion occurred was used for making time fuses for shrapnel. The workers were mostly women and young girls.

BRITISH DRIVE ALL ALONG LINE PRESSING HOME NEW OFFENSIVE; MUCH BOOTY CAPTURED TODAY Haig's Troops Are Smashing Enemy's Line

Hindenburg's Bastion Gone By Canadians' Victory

London, April 10.—One military critic, commenting on the present battle, thus describes the importance of Vimy Heights:

"They are admittedly the bastion of the enemy's western line. Whatever else has been allowed to go, he held Vimy Ridge with grim resolve, and lavished upon it all the arts in fortification and defensive skill that the war has taught him. Upon it hinges the whole strategy of the enemy's rereat in the west. With Vimy firmly held, he can swing his enemy's rereat in the west, until each part of it reaches the position where he has a mind to stand, and he can cover the French industrial London, April 10 .- One military critic, commenting on the present where he has a mind to stand, and he can cover the French industrial districts upon which he depends so much for supplies. But with Vimy gone, the defence of these districts can hardly be maintained, the pivot of the whole retreat shifts and gives backward, and is in instant risk of fracture."

THE WAR SITUATION

As a result of the offensive begun yesterday along the line from Lens to Arras the British have captured and hold apparently firm possession of Vimy Ridge, carried by the Canadians, and considered the pivot of the German retreat in Northern France.

The German lines along the Scarpe, northeast of Arras, have been penetrated as far as the town of Fampoux, a distance of 3½ miles in one of the most forceful drives of the war.

More than 9,000 Germans were taken prisoner in one day's fighting and forty guns captured.

Further south the battle is progressing favorably to the British, who have drawn closer to St. Quentin, taking commanding ground to the northwest.

It is urged that there is no possible voluntary element in this re tirement, and that there can be no dispute as to who took the initiative.

So much booty was taken in the first rush of this new assault that it has not all been reported, but it is believed a large number of guns were captured.

SURPASS SOMME GAIN Yesterday's fighting and gains far surpassed the first days of the battle of the Somme last July. The Canadians today command the Vimy Ridge and are reported to be well beyond it at some points. More villages were captured today in the direction of Cambrai, and the fighting

RECORD BARRAGE FIRE.

Clearing weather yesterday afternoon permitted the airplanes to detect German trains moving toward the rail head, apparently for a counter-attack on Vimy Ridge. This fact was reported to the artillery, and all long-range guas for ten miles around were concentrated suddenly on the indicated point in what probably constituted a nev record for long-distance barrage fire with heavy guns. Thus the plans for a counter-attack were absolutely destroyed before the reserve troops could detrain.

OFFENSIVE EXTENDING. Correspondents at the front report the fighting continuing keenly throughout last night, with the British offensive gradually extending northward, there being fighting his morning in the direction of La Bassee, MANY OFFICERS TAKEN.

Some 150 officers are among the prisoners already taken, these including five battalion commanders. Al though forty guns captured is the official count thus far, the number is expected to reach three figures, while quantities of trench mortars, bomb-throwers, machine guns and ammunition also have been captured. The Germans destroyed great quantities of supplies at the last minute to prevent their capture.

The weather continues bitterly cold, with snow flurries, but the British forces are clad in sheepskins and are being kept well fed.

Liberty For Women Demanded in Russia By Bassett Digby, in Chicago News

PRUDENCE BRADISH.

"Is all of Russia or only half of Russia freed?" women suffragists have asked the Government in a concise but thorough schedule of demands for a remarkable charter of liberty for women. They are embodied in a

manifesto, which I have seen and country. Otherwise let the Government subsequently quashed, the abolit which was composed a few days ago by a congress of the influential Moscow League of Equal Rights for Women, in collaboration with representatives of working women and labor deputies. The manifesto was sent to the Governnt in the name of the women of Russia. It read:

"Congratulating the new Government on the complete wrecking of the old regime and the institution of a new and free national organization, this congress prays the Government to adopt the following passed resolution:
"1. Women must be extended full all statute texts, in which are formu-

inserted for clearness and precision the words 'for both sexes.' Equal Pay Demanded by Women. "2. Women's work must receive pay-ment equal to that of men for the same task. Protective measures for child workers must be introduced. "3. Full equality of rights for both

man and woman peasants in all future agrarian reforms. "4. The abolition of all discriminative laws concerning the social evil that de-grades the human dignity of women," This is taken to signify a demand for the abolition of vice segregation and the requirements that fallen women register with the police and carry a special yellow passport.) 5. The ministries of the interior, jus-

tice, education, trade and industry and agriculture promptly must appoint wo-man commissioners intrusted with guidance in all questions connected with the interests of women. "6. In all towns and villages woman commissioners must be promptly ap-

ointed for the fulfillment of state and public duties. "7. Women must be promptly ad-mitted to the rank of factory inspectors, lawyers, notaries, and, in general, to all branches of the public service"

HOW TO SAVE MONEY FOR FUTURE WAR LOANS

There has been called to our attention a plan for saving money which has been in successful operation in the United States for years. Briefly it is this:

Anyone can start a bank account with just ONE CENT and increase the deposit with only one cent per week for 49 more weeks, and these amounts added together will make the astounding sum of \$12.75. The largest deposit to be made (the fiftieth week) will be only 50 cents.

Start with two cents and increase the deposit two cents for 50 weeks, and in 49 weeks this amounts to \$25.50.

Start with five cents and increase the deposit five cents for weeks and this amounts to \$63.75.

Start with ten cents, and increase the deposit ten cents for 49 weeks, and this amounts to \$127.50. In addition to this the banks pay the customary rate of in-

terest paid on saving accounts. That the plan is a success is beyond question. In one American

city the size of London, one bank opened within 60 days nearly 6,000 new bank accounts which at the end of the year averaged In Boston, one new bank opened in less than two month

20,000 new accounts. The plan takes with the people in the United States; the plan

will take with the people in Canada. Why not?

It is just as natural for people to save their money as it is for squirrel to put away his nuts. Then women and children only need to be shown by the banks HOW to begin banking with small amounts. Then they will do it. The people of Canada are not different in regard to saving money from the people of our allies -the people of the U.S.A.

In the States the banks advertise to give anyone who comes in a bankbook free. In this bankbook are shown the different amounts with which a bank account can be opened-one cent, two cents, five cents, ten cents, or more. The bankbook also gives the dates on which the deposits are to be made and the amounts to be

The banks also carry on in the newspapers a progressive campaign of publicity to stimulate people to open accounts and encourage them to keep up their payments. The number who do not keep up their payments seems to be negligible.

Since it is a well-known fact that this plan has worked out such unprecedented and wonderful results in the banks of our neighboring country, it would seem to be up to our Canadian banks, which are awake to our present grave situation, to investigate this modern method of encouraging our own people, young and old, to bank their money.

If only one-fourth of our people-2,000,000, say-would deposit on an average only \$50 during the year, this would amount to \$100,000,000. In five years this would amount to half a billion dollars raised by Canada alone, and we would never miss the

We also need to do more work to counteract the evil influences in the world which the kaiser has set loose. Nothing is more moral economically than saving money. Who knows but that we shall be at war for three or five years more? We have not made such marked headway in the past three years as to make this improbable. Who knows how much this war will cost? Even with the assured co-operation of the U.S.A. to the finish, we must not fool ourselves and underestimate the strength of our pernicious foes. If the war goes on, such a move as outlined above is a necessity; if the war stops sooner than we now have reasonable grounds for expecting, it will be a good work well done-this teaching our citizens the banking habit.

One or two of our Canadian banks in the larger cities have adopted this plan for Christmas Clubs. The accounts, when properly kept up, provide the depositors with ready money for Christmas spending. But there seems no good reason why the plan may not be generally used to teach more of our people to save regularly in this way.

DISTRIBUTION OF FOODSTUFFS

In a previous article on the production of foodstuffs it was pointed out that here were many indications that the world is fast consuming all surplus food upplies and fast coming to one or more breakdowns that may mean starvation for many countries.

This is directly because so many millions have been taken out of productive occupations and are spending all their energies and the product of a large part of those left at home in highly destructive work.

Is there not a suggestion for our Government at Ottawa in the following letter, or, now that we are allies, would it not be good business to co-operate in the conservation and distribution of foodstuffs so that the surplus for export our other allies will be larger and better? The following letter to the Mayor's Food Supply Committee, New York,

worth consideration: "Dear Sir,-I have made a study of the food supply question for some years, and have written to the press, also consulted with local organizations. I do not elieve that such legislation as is suggested will be of any affect, as long as resent methods of distribution are in existence.

"I have frequently called attention to the methods of the United Fruit Company, which through their selling department have a perfect system of disribution. As a result, bananas are for sale at Roberval, in the province of Queec, at Victoria on the Pacific Ocean, and in every crossroad store between these points, which are the extremes of the railroads of the continent, and all the population south of these places.

"When one bunch of bananas is nearly gone, another is ready to take its place, and the price of three for five cents is nearly universal. I have urged that the same be done for such staples as potatoes, of which, of course, larger quantities are used than bananas.

"A large operator, known as the Potato King in Colorado, stated in an article in the World's Work magazine some years ago that Colorado would be satisfied with a permanent price of 40 cents per bushel for potatoes.

"This would leave a good margin for any distributing company to handle them on a basis of 75 cents per bushel, or 20 cents per peck. They could be sent from distributing centres, in bags containing one peck, made of cheesecloth, and properly labeled and dated.

Three years ago, when potatoes were selling at \$1.00 per bushel in New York, the new crop was so large that potatoes were being burled from the previous crop, near Rutland, Vt., from whence they could easily have been shipped to Troy or Whitehall, and sent to New York by cheap water carriage.

"A company could be organized for handling this product, following the

methods of the fruit company. This could be followed by other staple articles, either by the same or different organizations. "I call your attention to the fact that our expensive department of agriculture in Washington, with its thousands of correspondents, is not able to give prompt eply to the inquiries as to the supply of food products in different parts of the J. S. A call for such information should have been made, and the result taballated within three to five days. A similar lack of system exists in the depart-ment in New York State, but of course there is no such expensive outfit, nor so

many sources of information. is ludicrous, with this means of adding to our knowledge 'on tap,' that the Federal Trade Commission should be called upon to 'investigate' conditions at a cost of \$400.000, when one of the most expensively-equipped departments of the Government is in existence for that very purpose
