Netorious Fentan Dead.

In Dublin, at the age of 77, John O'Leary, the famous leader of the Fentan brotherhood, has passed away.

At an early age O'Leary joined the Young Ireland party, which, full of passion and fine poetical ideals, early drifted into rebellion. When in 1849, Queen Victoria wisited Ireland, O'Leary joined James Fintau Lalor in a wild scheme to capture the Queen, convey her to some fastness in the Wicklow Mountains, and there hold her prisoner until ransom was paid, in the form of Irish freedom. Fortunately, this mad conspiracy was frustrated by the illness of Lalor, without whom the other plotters could not act.

In September, 1865, O'Leary, became editor of the "Irish Poople," and was arrested and sentenced to 20 years' penal servitude for treason. He was amnestied in 1870, and after passing the remainder of his sentence in earlie in France, returned to Dublin, where he devoted himself to journalism and literature.







The committee objects strongly to the action of the admiralty in contracting for the construction of the armored cruisers Invincible, Inflexible and Indomitable, without competition, although the admiralty officials explained that they wished to keep the plans secret.

The committee finds that the builders of the battleship King Edward VII. secretly patched up a defectively cast rudder, which the government was obliged to replace. The builders gathered together a few of their employes on a certain Sunday and by electric welding concealed a huge fault in the rudder.

The report of the committee says:

"We hope it will not again be our duty to investigate a case where a British firm, for commercial advantage, will callously hazard the lives of hundreds of their fellow-countrymen."





Ruins of Ancient Hall.

Rector Joins In Romantic Quest In Ruins of Ancient Hall.

The ruins of Bradley Old Hall, Derbyshire, which were discovered recently, are being unearthed, and a large extent of the foundations has been laid bare. As yet, however, the cellars have not been entered, and a subterranean passage, that for generations has had a reputed existence, has not been discovered. But the archaeological interest in the investigations is completely dwarfed locally by the idea that hidden treasure may be found. The story goes that Prince Charlie sent a company of his followers from Derby to Bradley to seize a valuable collection of plate, and that they found some, but not the whole of it. The legend that a valuable hoard escaped their notice, and remains buried in the ruins of the old hall, has a tenacious hold in the digtrict, and only the most careful search will dispel it. The Rector of Bradley (the Rev. R. H. Tomlins) is an enthusiastic archaeologist, and is taking a working share in the digging out of the foundations. The rector may be found, spade in hand, some feet down among old walls and mullioned windows. In the midst of his work the rector told an interviewer that they had discovered a curious chamber, four or five feet square, the use of which was not quite clear. "We had to cut through the bricks—and such bricks—before it was revealed.

The party had a carousal in the cellars, and eventually the Highlanders decamped, leaving their companion helplessly drunk. Sparks was discovered the next day by the Loyalists, taken before a magistrate, and committed. He was ultimately removed to York, there tried for high treason, condemned, and executed in 1746. Locally it is argued that the Highlanders did not travel from Derby all the way to a remote place like Bradley, with the Duke of Cumberland's army in hot advance, for the sole purpose of indulging in a drunken orgie. Was it the treasure they were after, and, if so, did they get away with the whole of it? Hutton's history states that before the Prince commenced his retreat northward from Derbyshire he had replenished his war-chest to the extent of some thousands of pounds.

King Promotes Official.

The King, according to a recent issue of The Gazette, has given the Master of the Horse—the Earl of Sefton—s tremendous step in the order of precedence.

Hitherto the Master of the Horse has ranked between the comptroller and the Vice-Chamberlain of the Horsehold, in the table of precedence.

For the future he will take precedence of the Speaker, the Lords of Appeal, the bishops and barons, viscounts, earls, marquises and dukes, and will come immediately after the Chamberlain of the King's Household.

The Master of the Horse has charge of all matters relating to the sovereign's stables and horses, and has the privilege of using any of his master's horses, pages or footmen. His processional place is next behind the sovereign.
