LOCKED HORNS - A specimen of the above in the shape of two pairs of Caribboo (or Rein D. er's) antiers which were found by Captain Chearnley, this last Fall, when on his aurual bunting tour in the Northern Moun ains of New-foundland, was briefly mentioned by us in a former number. On closer examination, these borns appear still more curious and wonderful. interlocked that we suppose the world could not produce such another specimen. They are so firmly interlocked that evidently it is a physical impossibility to separate them without breaking the anilers. The animals (from the Captain's statement) had evidently fought in the Rusting season of 1858, the year previous to the one in which they were found, and even at the time when they were discovered, the mossy bed of the moor bore marks of the violence of the struggle. The whole of the bones were perfect, a thing most unusual, as when a Deer dies from gun shot ounds, or otherwise, in those regions, the bears and wolves usually knaw and carry bones away. t appears that the remains of these gallant combatants had been held sacred. 
