MONTREAL MARKETS.
FRIDAY, September 27, 1839.
Throughout the whole of this week, business has
been very brisk. The number of Upper Canada
Merchants in town is considerable, and as they
are all anxious to get their Fall supply sent to the
canal, before Tuesday next, in consequence of the
freight advancing on the first proximo--the demand
for merchandise of every description has been good.
We have very little alteration to note in country
produce this week.

A slight advance has taken place upon
our last quotations since the arrival of Mr. Majesty.
Pots have been sold this week in small parcels
from 2s 6d @ 30; and several holders are not in-
clined to sell, even at that rate. From the late
account of the state of the English Markets, we do
not see how shippers can pay so much unless they
anticipate a considerable advance upon the
last quotations. Pearls continue as last quoted, the
demand on the other side not being as good by a
"long chalk" as for Pots.

FLOUR--The quantity which has arrived from
the United States this week and the latter end of
last has been very justines the same, viz 300
3d per barrel, for fine, at which rate it is now no-
minal.

The general impression among the knowing ones
seems to be that no reduction upon present prices
will take place for some time to come. We also un-
derstand that several speculators here are buying
up all they can lay their hands on, in order to
secure a rise; if this is really the case, (we it
not that the Bakers make little or no reduction on
the price of Bread, let flour be ever so cheap) and
were we, what we would wish to be, a "righteous
man" whose prayer we are informed "availeth
much," we might be disposed, (however unchristian-
like it might seem) to add to our usual petition to
the Throne of Grace "give us this day our daily
bread," and withhold it for a time from those who
wish to "grind the faces of the poor" by monopol-
izing the "staff of life." We trust, however,
that there is no foundation for the report; but at
the same time, would recommend dealers in this
article particularly, "to live and let live."

sold for cash at 30s 3d.

PROVISIONS--Prime Pork has been sold within
the last few days as high as 817, but only in small
quantities. Butter was sold today on the market
at 10 @ 10 for ex't in firkins, from the habitants,
and 9d @ 10 from the English farmers. One small
lot of Upper Canada was sold in the early part of
the week at 5d each, viz --2s 1d @ 2s 2d.

SEAMS are still on the rise.
TEAS are in statu quo. The prices for the last
fortnight have been only nominal at 3s 2d for Young
Hyson and 2s 9d for Twankay; other descriptions
are in proportion.
