Patriotic Association Decide to Ask For More Newfoundland Volunteers For the Front

A meeting of the Reserve Force Committee, appointed at the last meeting of the Patriotic Association, took place at the Board of Trade Rooms last evening.

Those present were Sir Joseph Outerbridge, Chairman; Dr. V. P. Burke, Secretary, and W. J. Higgins, M.H.A., J. A. Clift, K.C., W H. Rennie, Lt.-Col. gomerie and Lieut. E. Ayre.

Begin at Once.

A committee consisting of Lt.-Col. Conroy, J. A. Clift, Capt. Montgomerie the chairman and secretary, were appointed to draft a proclamation.

Volunteers will be enlisted at St. John's and the various outports, and a recruiting office, with Capt. Montgomerie in charge, assisted by an officer from each of the four brigades and a number of members of the Rifle Club will be opened at a date to be announc ed later.

All applicants will be drafted by the Reserve Committee to one of three units, which shall be under the direction of the city brigades, who will u dertake their preliminary training in conjuncton wth the members of the Rifle Association.
