## **RUSSIAN REPUBLIC WITH** AN AUTONOMOUS SIBERIA

### By Courier Leased Wire

London, July 11 .- The obje ets of the new Siberian Government include repudiation of the Brest-Litovsk treaty and the establishment of a Russian repu blic with an autonomous Siberia, according to a declaration made by a member of the new Govern-ment to the Vladivostok corresp-ondent of The Nichi Nichi Shimbun, says a Tokio despatch to T he Daily Express. It is also proposed to rehabilitate the army a nd send troops against Germany. Russia's national debt would be acknowledged, Siberia assuming responsibility for her share.

Allied Airmen Unquestionably and Clean-Cut Masters of the Air-Enemy Objectives are Being Effectually Bombed.
