

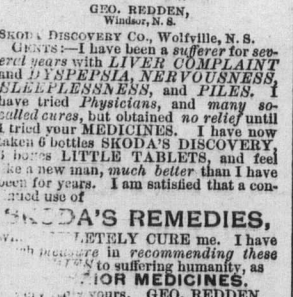

The Bee Keepers' Convention.

The second meeting of the Bee Keepers' Association was held in Harrisburg, N. S., on Wednesday, March 14, at 2 p. m.

The report of the committee on constitution and by-laws was called for and read, when it was taken up clause by clause and passed with few amendments.

The subject of "Foul Brood" was then brought up by Mr. McGregor who explained the nature of the disease and the importance of stamping it out at once if it should be discovered as it was highly contagious and had destroyed many large apiaries in the United States and Ontario.

In answer to a question by a member, Sec. Beeler said "Foul Brood" might be detected by a depression in the covering of the cell, if opened, a fetid smelling,ropy substance will be found instead of the living embryo.

A question was asked as to the best books for beginners, and Root's A. B. C. of bee keeping and Hutchinson's Advanced were recommended.

The annual meeting of the stockholders of the above company was held at Middleton on the 14th ult. The following report was read by the secretary:

The discussion was continued for some time by J. R. Woolaver, Hantsport, J. W. Hutchinson, Morris-town, A. J. Ebbington, A. J. Woodman and others, eliciting a great deal of practical information on the subject, showing the value of a quiet situation with ample protection from wind, and a southern exposure for the apiary.

Considerable discussion then took place on the sales of honey and the variation of the different local markets, and the amount imported into the Province.

It was stated that one firm in Halifax imported over two tons last season, and that they had admitted that the Nova Scotia honey when properly extracted and put up was much superior in flavor and purity to any that they could import, and would sell for better figures.

An Association brand was talked of and the necessity of preserving absolute purity of goods insisted upon; and that efforts should be made to educate the people to use purchased adulterated honey. It was considered that 20 cents per lb for best clover comb. honey, was a fair price, and that 12 cents for best extracted would be about equal.

Subjects for discussion at the next meeting were then handed in and adopted as follows: 1st.—How does Bee Keeping compare with other pursuits upon which to depend for a living?

2d.—Should a beginner procure bees in ordinary box hives and wish to transfer them to the improved hives, how shall he accomplish it? and how many should he get to start with?

3d.—What are the essential points in the locality of an Apiary and in what condition should it be kept to obtain the best results?

All that portion of the tea that can be dissolved is extracted before the expiration of ten minutes; the infusion is then at its best; from that time, if allowed to stew, it loses its flavor and becomes dull and bitter.

King's County Baptist Ministerial Conference met in the Baptist Church, Kentville, last Tuesday morning. In the absence of Rev. E. H. Howe, of Kings-ton, the regular chairman, Rev. E. B. Kempton, of Canada, was called to the chair. Besides quite a number of lay delegates, there were present the following clergymen: Rev. F. O. Weeks, Kentville; Rev. S. B. Kempton, Canada; Dr. Higgins, Wolfville; Rev. E. C. Baker, Biltown; Rev. Mr. Bancroft, Aylesford; Rev. E. O. Reed, Cambridge; Rev. James Read, Long Point; Rev. A. Cohoon, Secretary of the Home Mission Board and Rev. E. E. Daley, Berwick, Secretary of the organization.

The report of the Department of Agriculture for the calendar year 1892 has been laid before Parliament. It is signed by Hon. Mr. Angers, and shows the import of live stock into Canada last year to have been 4,025 cattle, 33,439 sheep, 107 swine and 2,260 horses. The horses were all brought in at Manitoba and Northwest points, as were also 3,931 of the cattle. Of the total sheep imported 29,053 were brought in at Victoria, B. C. The importation of stock for breeding purposes at Point Levis quarantine showed a slight increase on the year, amounting at Point Levis to 1 bull, 909 sheep and 19 swine, compared with 13 cattle, 938 sheep and 4 swine in 1891. At Point Edward, Ont., there were imported 94 head cattle and 33 swine, at Halifax 46 cattle, and at St. John 1 bull and 1 swine.
