The Royal National Mission to Deep
Sea Fishermen.

This Mission began its career four-
teen years ago, in London, England.
The Mission is interdenominational.
All Mission work is voluntary.

Its object was to reach the thou-
sands of fishermen connected with the
fishing fleets in the North Sea. These
fleets are permanently at sea, summer
and winter. Exposed to terrible
accidents, cut off from all the bless-
ings of the land, thousands of men
and boys lived with no effort made to
help them, until this Mission com-
menced its operations.

It commenced its work by sending
out one small fishing vessel to labor
among the fishermen.

To-day, the Mission fleet consists of
eleven fine vessels. Four of these are
hospital ships, with a properly qual-
ified staff of medical men. These
ships are the churches, temperance
halls, club rooms, and floating hospi-
tals of the North Sea. Beds at the
London Hospital are also secured for
special cases sent home from sea,
while branches are at work among the
Scottish, Irish, Maun, and Dutch
fishermen.

The results are evident to-day in
the improved fishing vessels; the
improved regulations of the Board of
Trade for preventing loss of life in the
prosecution of the calling; improved
assurance schemes for the benefit of
widows and children of men lost at
sea, the number of which averages
300 able-bodied men each year; the
abolition by international law of the
grog vessels, so well named the "Pi-
rates of the North Sea," from the
rates they continually entailed to the
bodies and souls of fishermen; the
closing from want of custom of num-
bers of low-class saloons along the
quaysides, where crimps formerly
snatched from the toiler of the sea his
hard won earnings; and thus the bet-
ter housing, clothing, and feeding of
the wives and children, until the chief
magistrates of the seaports have re-
peatedly testified to the improvement
in the whole of the fishermen's quar-
ters of the towns.

A social revolution has, in fact,
been quietly accomplished. Ignorance,
prejudice, lawlessness, irreligion
and cruelty have given place to the
peaceable fruits of the Gospel of
Christ, and now from the little cab-
ins of hundreds of fishing vessels
(thousands of vessels are regularly
engaged in the fishing), where oaths
and coarse jests were once heard,
daily hymns of praise and earnest
prayers ascend from hearts second to
none in their simple loyalty to HIM,
who, when Himself on earth, loved
the company of fishermen so well.

CANADIAN BRANCH
In 1891 the needs of the Labrador

fisherman came before the council of
the Mission, and one of their number
voluntarily visited Newfoundland to
gather information, with the result
that in the summer of 1892 the Mis-
sion Hospital vessel, Albert, sailed to
Labrador under the charge of Dr.
Greenfield. The report of the Chamber
of Commerce of Newfoundland of that
year thus alludes to the event:

"A new feature worthy of mention
in this report, affecting as it does,
more or less, the comfort of 20,000 to
30,000 of our people, was the appear-
ance on the Labrador coast of the
Mission to Deep Sea Fishermen's ship
Albert, outfitted by a philanthropic
society in England, non-sectarian in
its lines, and intended to afford skilled
medical aid, and to provide to some
extent for the mental and material
wants of fishermen. This essay has
been an unqualified success, and has
evoked from the recipients of its
bounty expressions of deep grati-
tude, while at the same time it has
engendered in the hearts of all who
are interested in the welfare and pros-
perity of the colony, feelings that
must strengthen the bonds which
bind this comparatively neglected
dependency to the Mother Country."

The report of the first year showed
that 300 patients were treated, while
manifest blessing rested on the simple
gospel services held on sea and land.

The following year, 1893, two small
hospitals were erected, 200 miles
apart—one at the entrance to the
Straits of Belle Isle, at Battle Harbor,
the other at Indian Harbor, on an is-
land in the mouth of Hamilton Inlet.
These sites were chosen as being the
centres for the fishing industry.

Dr. Curwen and Bobard, with
two trained Christian nurses, joined
the staff, and took charge of these
hospitals, while Dr. Greenfield visited
all along the coast in a new steam
launch, which was

The Elections.

The federal elections on Thursday resulted in a sweeping victory for the Liberal party.

Town Council Meeting. The regular monthly meeting of the Council was held on Wednesday evening, with the Mayor, Councillors, Tingley, Fitch, Duncanson and Wallace, and the Recorder present.

The chairman of the Streets Committee presented a verbal report of routine work done during the month. The Mayor called attention to certain complaints made by him of needed repairs on Highland avenue and Pleasant street, and requested the committee to attend to same.

Written reports were presented by the Poor and Sewerage Committees. The Mayor stated, on behalf of the chairman of the Police and License Committees, that during the week one license fee of fifty dollars had been collected from business in the town.

The committee on public sales reported, recommending that a site for a school be selected on the north-west corner of Highland avenue and Main street. The Mayor stated the cost of schools as \$62 landed in Wolfville, and probably \$25 would cover expense of installation.

A communication was read from the secretary of the Law and Order League, enclosing resolutions passed at the last meeting of the League asking the attention of the Council to the need of more efficient police of the town, and that action be taken to provide efficient police service for Thursday evening.

The League also called attention of Council to the apparent prevalence of incendiary fires in the town, and asking that a proper investigation be held.

Rev. A. Coburn, on behalf of the League, addressed the Council in support of the resolutions.

Mr. J. D. Chambers, who with quite a number of the other members of the League were present, also addressed the Council, along the same line, as did other members.

A resolution was passed authorizing the Police Committee to engage as many extra policemen as is necessary to maintain good order in town during Thursday evening.

Resolved that the Council authorize the Police Committee to engage an extra policeman to assist in keeping order in the town for such time as they deem necessary.

The following resolution was passed: Whereas fire has occurred in certain buildings in town from time to time, and in the opinion of some of the citizens these fires have been of incendiary origin; therefore

Executions and Elections.

Up to a quite recent period there was a general impression abroad in the county that the Municipal elections of this month would result in the return without opposition of the greater number of the members of the last council.

Since the recent execution in Kentville a demand has been continuously made for an investigation into the disorderly conduct said to have taken place on that occasion. It was felt that, if the charges were true, the blot on the fair fame of our county might be in part removed by the exposure and punishment of the guilty parties.

The persons whose official duty it would seem to be to initiate proceedings for such an investigation seemed strangely unwilling to take action. Recently it began to be whispered that when the accounts against the municipality for services in connection with that execution came before the council in January, an investigation would be demanded by that council before those accounts were passed.

Obituary.

MRS. PURLEY FLETCHER, B. A. The death of Edson Purley Fletcher a former graduate of Acadia and at one time well known in Wolfville, occurred at his home in Debert on Oct. 16th, in his 43rd year.

When eleven years old he entered the Halifax School for the Blind, and in due time graduated. He then taught music for a few years in Yarmouth, Digby and Lunenburg. After two years at Acadia College in the class of '89, he returned to the School for the Blind, and taught for two years. Resuming his college course he graduated with the class of '91. His superior abilities rendered study a delight, and his many and genial qualities as the College men of that day will bear witness. Secured the love of all who knew him. After receiving his B. A. he again returned to the School for the Blind, and for about three years had in charge the literary department. In the meantime he had not neglected his musical studies, and now in preparation for a long-cherished purpose he left the School for the Blind and placing himself under the distinguished Prof. MacLean, then teaching in Truro. For a year he gave himself unreservedly to music, practising from seven to ten hours daily.

On New Year's day, 1894, he had married Miss Christie A. McKenzie, of Pictou, who was then residing in Halifax, and at the close of his studies under Prof. MacLean, Mr. Fletcher and his wife removed to Brandon, Man., where he taught music for a living, and did his utmost in the furtherance of his great ambition, the establishment of a School for the Blind in that Province. He gave an object lesson by teaching a blind girl, who when Mr. Fletcher died the cause of the blind before the Cabinet Ministers of Manitoba was able to read in the second book, to the astonishment and admiration of the legislators. By untiring efforts he demonstrated the need of a School for the Blind in Manitoba, and removed prejudices and misconceptions in regard to it. But the time was inopportune for government action, owing to the bitter conflict concerning the separate school question. He remained five years in Brandon but in the last year his health gave away and in hope of improvement from a change they went to Victoria, B. C., where Dr. Hall, the specialist, performed an operation for appendicitis. After two years in Victoria, and still suffering from a complication of the diseases, which gave no hope of relief he returned to his old home at Debert. Though he suffered constantly his admirable courage and patience never took him, nor that cheerfulness that made him the ideal companion. Japs Are Silent Bridge Builders.

Near the camp of the correspondents I watched the pioneer company erect a bridge some two hundred and fifty feet long and seven feet above the water at the center. The battalions worked like a silent, well-oiled machine, and it took just four days from the time the men entered the sacred pine forest of deceased Chinese ancestors and began to fell the trees until the last plank was laid, and the guard rails placed and the bridge ready for traffic. The largest timber used was about eight inches in diameter. Axes played a very little part, and broad one-man Chinese saws and a linked or sectional folding crosscut saw took their places. The two-man folding saw is particularly interesting, consisting as it does, of sixteen lengths of thin spring steel, half an inch wide, linked or riveted, end to end. The saw-teeth are some size and set as in the ordinary crosscut saw. By girdling a tree with this saw and grasping a handle in each hand, one can easily cut down a tree, but usually it is used by two men. In one day all the piles, cross timbers and brace were cut in the forest.

A Pleasant Occasion.

The ladies of the W. C. T. U. extended an invitation to the Canning Union to meet them at a parlor meeting at the home of Mrs L. W. Sleep, on October 20th. The Canning ladies were unable to be present but a number of friends in the town joined the W. C. T. U. ladies and spent a pleasant evening. A dainty supper was served soon after six o'clock after which a programme was given. A hymn was sung and was followed by prayer by Mrs Geo. Fitch. The object of the meeting was then referred to by the president, 'The Mission to Deep Sea Fishermen.' Mrs Hammon then gave a resume of the mission and the President read letters from grateful sailors for the help they had received from the Canadian branch of the mission. Mrs Little and Miss Sleep followed with a piano duet, which was much enjoyed. Mrs DeWitt then tried to interest the ladies in making warm clothing to send to these poor fisher-folk, a box to be sent them in April. The evening was pleasantly and profitably spent. Two ladies present signified their desire to become members. The meeting closed with singing.

In addition to the spiritual and medical work, much other work had to be done. Among many families the poverty was so great that they were forced to face the inclemencies of a long Arctic winter in miserable hovels, both naked and hungry. Owing to the precarious nature of their sole source of revenue, to the wretched "truck system" which everywhere prevails, to the isolated condition of the people with the consequent high price of goods, and to the relentless barrenness of the soil, most pitious cases of absolute destitution were continually being met with.

To cope with this terrible state of things Christian friends, interested in the work, have, each year, collected bales of warm clothing, and these have been distributed by the nurses and doctors. To avoid encouraging a pauper spirit, work at cutting wood for the langes and hospitals has, wherever possible, been exacted in return for clothing. In this and other ways, many who, at this moment, would otherwise be suffering cold and hunger, if not facing absolute starvation, have been enabled to help themselves, and are clothed and warm. Beyond this, also, healthy literature has each year, been distributed broadcast along the coast, while the nucleus of a lending library has been formed at each hospital. Thus, in no small degree, have the cheerless lives of our brethren 'who do business in great waters' been cheered and brightened.

THE ROYAL NATIONAL MISSION TO DEEP SEA PEOPLE:
(CONTINUED FROM FIRST PAGE)
In 1894, through the generosity of Sir Donald A. Smith, who had spent many years of his early life in the Hudson Bay Company's service in Labrador, a small steamer, the Sir Donald, was presented to the Canadian Branch, while Dr T. G. Roddick, of Montreal, and formerly of Newfoundland, presented a sailing boat, the 'Grelia McKinnon,' for the use of Battle Harbor hospital.

It was now decided for the first time to keep one hospital open all winter, and Dr Willway was left in charge of it. From that day to this the doors of Battle Harbor hospital have never been closed.

In 1895 a new department was made by leaving one of the nurses also at the hospital all winter, while the doctor, Dr F. Robinson, travelled up and down the coast. In this way he visited all the stations from Blanc Sablon to Nakvak Inlet, near Cape Chidley, covering with his komatic and dogs some 2,000 miles during the winter.

'Vikings of To-day,' by Dr. Grenfell gives a most interesting account of Labrador, its natural history, its people and the work among them. 'Norard of the Dagger' gives a good idea of the inception of the work; and an excellent book for boys is 'The Young Trawler,' by the late R. M. Ballantyne.

A book entitled 'Labrador, Its Physical Features and People,' by Dr. Grenfell, is now in the press. This book is especially intended to guide visitors intending to visit Labrador, and gives the only public account of the attractions of this wonderful country to tourists, sportsmen, scientists and explorers. It contains accounts of some of the finest fjords and new maps of them.
