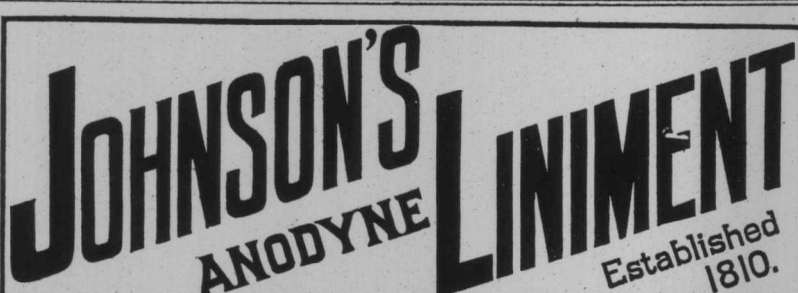

HORRORS OF WAR.

General Abbot, in his recent article in the Forum on war under new conditions, makes the suggestion that the spectacle of battle will be more trying to the nerves even than it is at present. The constitution which in her sacred situation England has slowly evolved cannot be transferred to the continent. France has tried all kinds and has failed to arrive at a finality. Germany, a new empire, is a parvenu intruder in the European family. In the midst of our mighty neighbors we need a strong monarchy."

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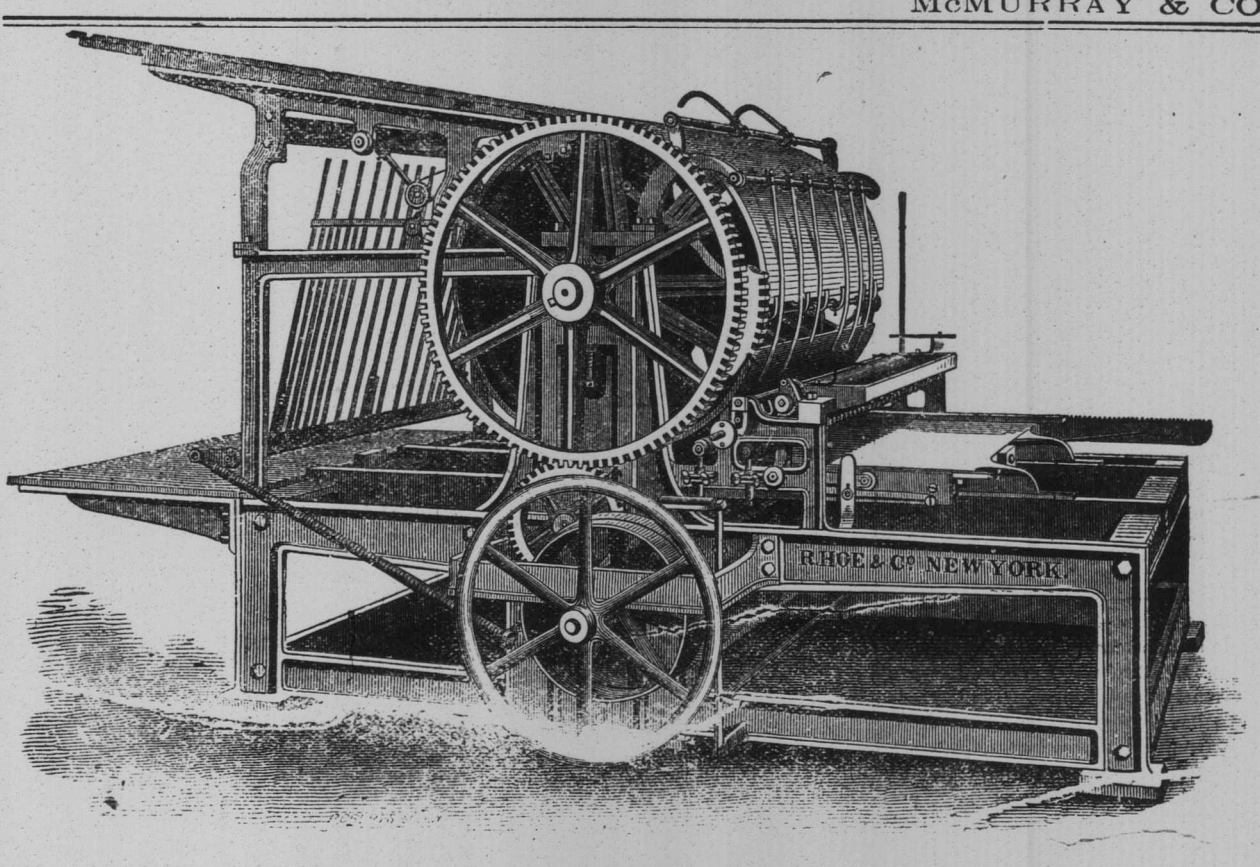
