

Seven peers were created in honor of the birthday of King George, which was celebrated on Thursday, although the King was born on June 3rd. The new peers include Sir Walter Foster, the noted physician, Sir William Dickson Pearson, and Sir Christopher Furness. Among the Barons created is Harold Hammworth, a brother of Lord Northcliffe. The list of Knights include A. T. Quiller Couch, the author. On the same day the King created the Duke of Cornwall Prince of Wales and Earl of Chester. It was the sixteenth anniversary of the Duke's birthday.

An alarm of fire sounded shortly before two o'clock last Wednesday morning, brought the fire apparatus to the Queen Hotel, where a blaze was found in the carriage barn at the rear. The fire was discovered by the proprietor, Mr. Sterns, who was making his usual rounds to see that everything was safe. He found under the barn floor a number of blazing newspapers which had been saturated with kerosene oil, and among the papers an empty bottle smelling of kerosene. Part of the floor was burned before the fire was extinguished. Evidence of incendiarism were quite plain and an investigation is going on.

Bertram McKenna an Australian, will design the coronation medal and the new coinage. He is the first overseas Briton to do so.

At the Richmond horse show in England the other day, Crowe and Murray's horse, Confidence, took first prize in the high jump, clearing a foot 1 inch.

Millions of dollars damage has been caused by forest fires in the Athkoke District near Fort William Ont. where McArthur's Lumber mill was destroyed by fire early last week.

June 21st of next year has been fixed as the date when the census will be taken throughout Canada. The work will be done in time to bring the redistribution for the session of 1912.

It is stated that the immigrants to Canada since January 1st, from Europe, number almost 112,000; considerably more than for the whole of last year.

R. E. Walker, South Africa, defeated E. L. Kandel, University of Pennsylvania in a 100 yard dash at Charity Sports in England in ten and one fifth seconds.

For having illegally in its possession 78 Otter 165 leavers and 1900 muskrat skins, the Hudsons Bay Co., through R. C. Wilson, factor at Montserrat, in the Thunder Bay District of Ontario has been fined \$9447.08.

A Spanish sailor washed ashore the other day at Penzance claims that he is the only survivor of the steamer Faina from Bilbao for Newport. The sailor says the steamer, furnished with her crew of 23 men off Land's End, England, on Monday night.

In the Imperial House of Commons on the 23rd, the Postmaster General said that Imperial Penny Postage now entailed a loss of 150,000 pounds which would be increased to 400,000 pounds if penny post were extended to European countries.

The Ottawa Naval Department, co-operating with the British Admiralty, is preparing plans for the first ten vessels of the Canadian Navy. In the course of a month the Department will submit plans to shipbuilding firms for their private consideration.

Deranged by the heat, Mrs. Mary E. Cooney, 64, of Holyoke Mass., leaped from a window on the third floor of the house at 75 Bond street to the yard in the rear late last Thursday night and received a fracture of the spine, from which she died without regaining consciousness an hour later.

The steamship Prinz Oskar, of Canada Line which left Montreal on Saturday 18th, for Rotterdam, with 20 passengers and a general cargo, went ashore near Point Amour. The passengers were transferred to the Allan Lister Sicilian, which stood by all night but later proceeded to England.

Earl Grey according to recent reports has stirred England's business men to the commercial possibilities of Canada. The Westminster Gazette says: Earl Grey is back in England on a holiday of the School of Business vice-regally. He had landed when he was preaching the possibilities of Canada.

A lightning storm, accompanied by a cloudburst with a tremendous down-pour of rain converted Main Street Moncton into a river last Wednesday night. Several places were struck. George Wilbur and a child named Chappel were stunned. Two inches of rain fell in three quarters of an hour.

It is practically arranged that the King's Coronation will take place about the middle of May next. Immediately after the coronation the Duke of Connaught will proceed to Canada to assume the office of Governor General. So say London advices.

The I. C. R. station at North Street Halifax, and a half dozen passengers and freight trains lying in the yard came dangerously near being destroyed at midnight Thursday by a fire that completely wiped out the oil shed and badly damaged a number of cars. Had it not been for the fact that the wind was blowing away from it, the station would have been wiped out.

The Heard property on Queen St. was sold by auction on Friday by Mr. W. A. O. Morson, Master in Chancery. The store occupied by Beer & Goff was sold to Mr. F. H. Sellar for \$8,900; that occupied by Moore & McLeod to Mr. Geo. Moore for \$9,505 and Giff Bros store to Mr. Frank Harris for \$11,010 making a total of \$29,215.

After the most prolonged and intense heat spell in the history of the Red River Valley, heavy thunderstorms last Wednesday night gave wholesome relief at Winnipeg and in most of the districts of Manitoba suffering from heat and drought. Reports show that one half to three quarters of an inch of rain fell.

Attorney General Bowers of British Columbia has completed the execution of his various Legislative duties of embodying the guarantees granted by the Province to secure the construction through British Columbia of the Canadian Northern Pacific Railway, as a portion of the transcontinental system to the Pacific terminals on Barkley Sound.

A Telegram to the Chicago Daily News from Paris says that Dr. Doyen, the celebrated Paris surgeon, who has made a special study of successes, takes a serious view of the illness of Emperor William. Dr. Doyen is quoted as saying that if the Kaiser's doctors did not succeed in eradicating the infection it might become general, in which case a fatal issue was possible.

LOCAL & OTHER ITEMS

The parishioners of St. Mary's Church, Souris, have chosen Thursday, July 21st as the day of their annual tea.

The Italian Chamber of Deputies, on Saturday, unexpectedly voted the expenditure of 100,000,000 lire (about \$1,100,000) for dirigible balloons for the army.

The June term of the Supreme Court opened at Charlottetown yesterday morning, the Chief Justice presiding. The docket is small.

At the first meeting of the cheese board on Friday last, all the cheese boarded, 1917 boxes, was sold to R. E. Spillert at ten and nine sixteenth cents per pound.

In a by-election held at Hartlepool, England, on the 23rd, the Radical candidate was elected by a majority of 106, as against 777 last January.

Watson depot, Sask., was struck by lightning Monday and was wrecked. The station agent and another man sleeping in the office were badly burned but will recover.

A heavy thunder and lightning storm, accompanied by heavy rain prevailed Monday night, continuing from about 11 o'clock till six in the morning. The rain continued almost constantly all day yesterday. No news of any damage has been received.

Sir Sanford Fleming, Ottawa, has received word from the Prime Minister of New Zealand that the Government of that Dominion has decided to contribute a sufficient amount to have a New Zealand granite block placed in the Halifax memorial tower.

The House of Representatives at Havana, Cuba, has passed a bill granting a thirty year concession to an American Company to operate bull fights, cock-fights, horse races and gambling generally at Buenavista, a suburb of Havana.

With fifteen hundred excursionists on board a steamer caught fire on the Mississippi River and was burned to the water's edge. The Captain's promptness in beaching her saved everyone, only one woman who was lost in the rush to the shore.

In the regatta Friday at Kiel Germany, the American yacht Westward, owned by Alexander Cochran, New York won the Krupp prize, beating the Emperor William's American built Messor, with the Emperor at the wheel by half an hour over a 23 mile course.

The militia of this Province went into camp yesterday for their annual training of twelve days. The Infantry are camped on the naval grounds at Brighton and Victoria Park. The Light Horse are at the Exhibition grounds. The Army Medical Corps are at Sussex, N. B. this year.

A terrible cyclone struck the south country, sixty miles from Moose Jaw, Sask., on Thursday last, and was followed by a terrific hail storm which swept a strip of the country a mile wide. Every house in the path of the storm was destroyed. Three persons were killed and seven injured.

In the inter-university athletic meet at Sydney, Australia, Sydney University defeated the American college men in Rugby 48 to 27. Sydney University defeated the All-American team made up of the University of California, Stanford and University of Nevada men, football 10 to 9.

The general Provincial elections in Manitoba will be held on July 11th, nominations a week earlier. The 11th had been selected by Sir Wilfrid Laurier in his western tour; but since the Roblin Government have chosen that date for the elections, Laurier's meeting is slated for the 12th July.

The serious condition of an Italian laborer struck by an automobile operated by Robert Taft, President Taft's son, has caused a change in the plans of the President's family, who were preparing to leave Beverly, Mass., for New London. The family will remain in Beverly until there is an expected change for the better in the man's condition.

The thunderstorm which passed over the Province on Wednesday evening last, was severely felt, especially in the western part of the Province. So far as learned the only damage reported is the destruction of his meeting place, owned by D. B. Campbell. The lightning struck the building and it was soon burned to the ground. Some stock within escaped. Some damage was also done to a barn belonging to Mrs. Joseph Bull, White Sands.

An Ottawa despatch of Monday says: Mr. R. L. Borden concluded his highly successful political tour of Ontario at Finch, Stormont County, on Saturday. He leaves for Nova Scotia on Wednesday, and after a series of meetings in his native province, he will return and make another political tour of Ontario in the fall. He has tentative programme mapped out which will keep him busy until next general election.

The fine new house in course of erection by Mr. Michael Burgis, of Five Houses Lot 42, is notable among the improvements inaugurated by the progressive farmers of this locality. The building is a handsome one 30 feet by 24, with an ell 21 x 16. It has large bay window and two dormer windows on the roof. A piazza will extend along the front, and it will be a complete up-to-date dwelling with modern improvements. Automobile Disaster.

Mrs. J. W. Andrews was killed and her husband so badly injured that his name is on the dangerous list at the hospital as the result of a collision at Leominster Mass., between a tandem motor cycle on which they were riding and an electric car, Sunday night. The motorman of the car, Arthur Gauthier, is under arrest charged with criminal negligence. Mr. and Mrs. Andrews had been out for a spin on the machine and were re-

turning to their home on Church Street. As they approached Merriam Avenue, on which the street car line to Fitchburg runs, their view was shut off by a high hedge and without seeing the car they ran their machine directly in its path. The motorman shut off the power and reversed as soon as he saw that a collision was imminent, but could not stop the car in time and the couple were struck with considerable force. Both were dragged a distance of nearly forty feet. The woman died at the hospital

two hours later. Andrews' injuries consist of a slight fracture of the skull, contusions of the head and numerous severe bruises about the body. He has a slight chance of recovery. Mrs. Andrews was about 50 years of age and was very prominent socially.
