

Some changes may be required in the arrangements after the plan has been tested. Many improvements have been introduced in the system of Canada and the Postmaster-General has profited by these improvements and starts parcel post here in very much better shape than was the case in the beginning of the neighboring Republic. If the Borden government did nothing else this would merit the approval of the Canadian people this crowning effort of the Postmaster's efforts to secure sufficient gain for the country. The greatest benefits should be derived from the elimination of the middlemen's profits. It is understood that better results can be secured by mail than by express, and that it is possible for the housewife in the city to order her eggs direct from the producer on the farm. The saving in this item should be considerable. We shall have some particulars of the system in a future issue.

Federal Parliament.

Ottawa Ont., Feb. 2.—Hon. J. D. Hazen gave to the house this evening a comprehensive review of the situation regarding the fishing industry both in the Maritime Provinces and on the Pacific coast, and the policy which he is pursuing is stimulating that industry.

The statement of the Minister of Marine and Fisheries followed a resolution moved by Liberal members asking the government to give attention to the question of improved means of transportation for fresh fish between the Maritime Provinces and the United States. Of course, as Mr. Hazen pointed out, the speeches by Mr. Sinclair and others exhibited more desire to create party capital than to help the fishermen.

The speech of the minister showed that more was being done by the government than they had dreamed of and they must have been exceedingly sorry that they brought the question forward. The resolution simply gave Mr. Hazen a splendid opportunity to emphasize the fact that the present government is doing much more for the fishermen and the fisheries than the Liberal government attempted to do during its whole fifteen years of office. I am sorry, said Mr. Hazen, "that the honorable member for Guelph (Mr. Sinclair) did not formulate some plan or tell us what way he would suggest his ideas could be carried into effect. And when I interposed and asked him if he suggested that there should be a direct line of steamers from Canso or other ports along the eastern coast of Nova Scotia to the markets or whether he would favor a line of steamers along the coast connecting with the steamer from Yarmouth to Boston, he had not his mind thoroughly made up and would not give an opinion on the subject."

Ottawa, Feb. 3.—The government has decided after most thorough investigation of the facts surrounding the case that the surrender of the St. Peter's Indian Reserve in Manitoba should be annulled and instructions were sent today to F. G. Taylor, K. C., of Portage La Prairie, and C. P. Fullerton, K. C., of Winnipeg, agents of the Justice Department, to take action in the courts to set aside the surrender. The case will be threshed out in the Manitoba courts. It involves the large sum of two and a half million dollars.

The action taken by the government today marks the beginning of the end of one of the grossest scandals in recent Canadian history. The surrender of the St. Peter's Indian's Reserve was taken

in 1908 by Frank Peiley until recently superintendent of Indian affairs. Statements made on the floor of parliament concerning that deal are to the effect that liquor, bribery and corruption were resorted to in order to get the Indians to agree to the surrender of their valuable lands and that the vote was taken when the young braves and the most responsible men of the band were absent. Shortly after the transaction was completed George H. Bradbury, M. P. for Selkirk, in whose constituency the reserve is, brought the matter to the attention of parliament but, nothing was done and in 1910 Mr. Bradbury went into the question thoroughly in one of the most exhaustive and convincing speeches made for many sessions. "Justice for the poor Indians," was his appeal. The case was very much involved. This apparently was done deliberately, said Mr. Bradbury, to cover up a very dirty transaction.

Prior to deciding on holding the convention the delegates waited on Right Hon. Mr. Borden and Hon. Dr. Roche, Minister of the Interior, and submitted resolutions, covering such matters as the extension of forest areas, more care in deciding what lands shall be opened for settlement, free distribution of young trees, and that appointments in forestry should be based on capability, and experience.

To all these the Premier and Dr. Roche promised to give immediate consideration and Mr. Borden suggested holding a national forestry congress. Later the delegates informed him they would be pleased if such a congress could be held and the Premier promised it would be.

The delegates were headed by Hon. W. A. Charlton, M. P., retiring president of the association, and Hon. Clifford Sifton, chairman of the Conservation Committee.

Officers of the association for the ensuing year are: President, William Power, M. P., of Quebec; vice-president, F. C. Whitman, Annapolis Royal, N. S.; secretary, James Lawlor, Ottawa.

Ottawa, Feb. 5.—Contrast the policy of the present government with that of the previous administration. The Conservatives find that one of the government vessels, the Alert, has been used for political purposes. They suspend the officer responsible and the vessel is put out of commission, pending an inquiry. Under the old government these things were winked at and encouraged.

Mr. Borden, with that high sense of honor, which is characteristic of his life and conduct, has set out to give the Dominion of Canada a clean administration, he formed a cabinet of men of the same principle and the Alert is an example of it.

That the St. Peter's Indian reserve case is going to create intense interest was shown in the house today, when Hon. Frank Oliver, the former minister of the interior, who was in charge of the department when that nefarious deal was allowed to go through, asked Hon. Dr. Roche if the statement which appeared in the Standard to the effect that the government had given instructions to two of its agents in Manitoba ordering them to take action in the Manitoba courts to have the surrender of that reserve declared void was correct.

Dr. Roche and Hon. C. J. Doherty replied that the report was correct.

But no sooner had the Minister of the Interior resumed his seat than half a dozen of the lawyers on the opposition benches, including their leader, Sir Wilfrid Laurier, jumped to their feet and tried to put questions to both the Minister of Interior and the Minister of Justice. They wanted to know why the government did not d.

Ottawa, February 4.—A National Forestry Congress, similar to the one called by Sir Wilfrid Laurier in 1906 will be held in Ottawa next January. This was decided on the suggestion of Premier Borden, by the delegates to the 16th annual meeting of the Canadian Forestry Association, which concluded its session this afternoon.

The lieutenant governors of all the provinces, members of parliament and of the senate, prominent lumbermen, and in fact everybody who is prominently identified and in sympathy with forestry will be invited by the Premier to attend the congress, at which matters pertaining to the preservation of the forests will be discussed.

this or do that. Why were they going to the Manitoba courts, why not to the Supreme Court of Canada, why not to the Exchequer Court and so on. They also wanted the Minister of Justice to explain all about why the government had come to this decision. Mr. Doherty obliged them.

But it is in the lobbies that one sees the keenness of the excitement. The surrender of the St. Peter's Indian reserve, purchased with liquor, bribery and corruption, is the blackest crime of its kind in the recent political history of the Dominion. The revelations are expected to be of the most disgraceful kind and to show a practice of the rottenest character had been in vogue in the Department of Indian Affairs under the Liberal administration. The reports of the case when it comes up in the Manitoba courts will arouse the country from end to end.

LOCAL & OTHER ITEMS

The Session of the Imperial Parliament opened yesterday.

It is reported from London that King and Queen will visit P. April.

The British freight steamer "Louise," from Swansea for New York, is expected to arrive here on the 5th making a new world's record.

Aviator Garais took five passengers 732 feet up in the air, Charlottetown, on the 5th making a new world's record.

The Board of Trade, of St. John's, announces that they have plans for a St. John's dry dock enlarged to accommodate a ship of 1150 feet long.

It is stated at Ottawa, that there is strong probability of the term of the Governor-General being extended another year.

Aviator Inghel broke the world's record at Munich for endurance flight. He made in the air sixteen hours, twenty minutes past covered a distance of 1006 miles without landing.

A mid air collision on the 9th, between a biplane and a monoplane, at Juba, in the air, resulted in the death of a German aviator and a pupil making his first flight alone.

After 21 years service on the Atlantic coast, the record breaking steamer Campanile is to be sold. The new Aquitania will replace her. The Campanile has made round voyages.

The King has given orders for improvement in part of Kensington, on the west of London's slums. As the copy of the Duchy of Cornwall estate is a landlord.

General Haerts of Mexico has been decreed authorizing the increase of army by 50,000 men. This will allow a fighting force of 250,000 men from the active campaign.

Five thousand Mexicans who had had a bath for months, some longer, were forced into a bath house in squads by United States soldiers at El Paso, Texas and made to take a thorough cleaning.

The London Daily News says Viscount Gladstone, Governor of South Africa, is to return home immediately, and Lord Buxton, President of the Board of Trade, will succeed him. C. F. Masterman, who has been taken into the Cabinet.

Picking his men for the Antarctic expedition Sir Ernest Shackleton says that they must be between 30 and 40 years of age, below 30 he says men are too young and above 40 they are too old.

The wonderful operation of Rose All, a young Canadian in the Hospital Baltimore before reported, is proving a success. His nose and lips were torn in a mill and saw one ear being torn from his arm.

Rescued from a waterlogged Schooner off the Nova Scotia Coast, Capt. John White and his crew of five of the schooner Lobos arrived at New Orleans in a steamer which picked them up after week's hard fight for life.

Rodman Wannamakers of New York financing and Glenn Currier is boiling for the Transatlantic flight from Newfoundland to the Irish Coast, 5,000 miles. An English Army officer and United States flier are to operate the biplane.

Robt. Wright, farmer, aged forty, killed and Mildred Beesey, aged sixteen, seriously injured when the baggage car of a Grand Trunk train at Le Crossing Ontario in a snow storm. The others in the buggy escaped.

A school teacher named Wagner, Heilbrunn Germany has been sentenced to life in an asylum for criminal insanity. Last September he set fire to a village, murdered his wife and four children, ten villagers. The court found he suffered from the mania of persecution.

For bribery, Joseph Cassidy, a former Democratic Senator and William White, former Congressman both of New York were sentenced for six months to a year in Sing Sing and pay a \$1,000 fine. T. Walker, politician was sentenced months and pay \$1,000.
