The enrollment for the coresponding month increase of 35 per cent. The number in the high school was 74, divided as follows: Standard VI., 42; Standard VII., 23; Standard VIII.

The enrollment last year in the The superintendent reported that the addition of the two rooms to the Peace avenue school still left McKay avenue school congested. The number of pupils enrolled per room was above 50 in the five lower rooms, and the average over the city in the rooms below standard 5 about 47.

The superintendent recommende that a new school centre be establish ed on Ross' flats, to take care of pu pils below Standard III. The report was adopted, and the board will have two rooms in operation on the flats with the opening of the New Year The superintendent explained that by limiting the work of the subsidiar schools to the elementary standards as good classification in organization of pupils could be secured as in the arger schools of the city. He explained that the Ross flats districts made a natural division in itself, and thought that the Board should look to acquiring a site suitable for a four or six roomed school of a permanent character till a later time. A commit consisting of Misses May, Grey, and McCaig was appointed to look up available sites and report at an early


