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
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

NEW YORK, April 21. Titanic will appear there. No explanation of the transfer was given, but it is intimated that the power of the Senate on Federal territory would be undisputed, and no question of State rights would arise to interfere doning the hearing. 

Memorial Services in the Churches.

C. E. CATHEDRAL.

ral at the morning service yesterday His Lordship the Bishop of Newfoundand preached an eloquent and touchng sermon in which he made special eference to the great Titanic disaster. Taking his text, Psalm 77, v. 19 and 0: "Thy way is in the sea, and Thy path in great waters, and Thy footsteps are not known. Thou leadest Thy people like a flock by the hand of Moses and Aaron." His Lordship spoke of the awful marine disaster which had overwhelmed with sorrow two great countries, the people in . which mourn the loss of over /1,600 ersons. We here in Newfoundland felt this sorrow in a special manner, as during the past months we had o mourn the loss of many of our eople in ships that had been overwhelmed on the ocean. His Lordship also dwelt on the heroism, courage and self sacrifice of the crew of the Titanic in helping the helpless wonen and children and giving up their own lives, and many in the congregaion were visibly affected by his elouent and touching discourse. Special hymns, appropriate to the occasion, were sung. The prayers were read by Rev. James Bell, and the Essons by Revs. Canon White and Bolt. The closing hymn was "Nearr my God to Thee," and while the congregation remained standing Mr. Allan, the Cathedral organist, renderd the Dead March.

At last Mass yesterday Rev. Dr. Greene was the preacher and delivered a most impressive discourse on the recent ocean tragedy to which he referred in pathetic terms, and ex-horted the congregation to pray for those who went down to the sea. At evening prayers His Grace the Archbishop preached a powerful sermon on the awful disaster. He made particular reference to the discipline of the male passengers on the ship. and announced that High Mass will be celebrated for the repose of the souls






