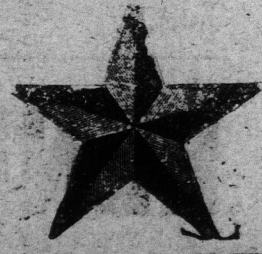

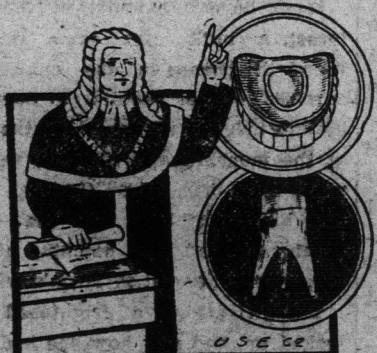

11.00 A.M.

TURKISH GARRISON REVOLT.
PETROGRAD, To-day.
A message received here from
Bucharest states that there has been
a revolt among the Constantinople
and Adrianople garrisons. Five Ger-
man officers were killed by the ex-
ploding of a bomb, in the Palace of
Enver Bey, the Turkish War Minis-
ter and Leader of the Young Turk
Party, Enver Bey not injured. A let-

SENTIMENT GONE MAD.
LONDON, To-day.
A storm of protest was aroused in
Melbourne by the suggestion that
Captain Carl von Muller, commander
of the German cruiser Emden, which
was destroyed recently by the Aus-
tralian cruiser Sydney, be given a pub-
lic reception in recognition of his
gallantry as a courtesy when he ar-
rives in that city.

DUNKIRK AND CALAIS SAFE.
LONDON, To-Day.
Both official and unofficial reports
concerning the situation in Flanders
agree that the force of the German as-
sault on the Allies' lines disputing the
way to Dunkirk and Calais has lessened,
and the feeling prevails in Eng-
land that the coveted base for invasion
of England never will be gained
by Germany.

PRUSSIAN GUARDS HURLED BACK.
PARIS, To-Day.
Official statement declares that from
the sea to the River Lys the German
action has been less keen and that the
Allies have assumed the offensive
along some parts of the front and are
making progress south of Bixchoote,
having retaken a hamlet east of Ypres.
Artillery duels continue along rest of
line. The British official report gives
a vivid idea of the tremendous action
which preceded recent attacks on
Ypres by the Germans. From dawn
for three hours the British soldiers
were under heavy artillery fire, which
did away to be succeeded by an in-
fantry onslaught by the Prussian
Guards, who were hurled back after
penetrating British lines at several
places. Dixmude has been reported
as re-occupied by Allies but this lacks
confirmation.

Running Down Commerce Destroyers.

With the gradual addition of new units to the Navy, and the completion of the transport of troops from Canada and India for a time, in spite

of the loss of a number of cruisers, the Admiralty have been able to pay more attention to the fast German commerce destroyers which are at large in the southern seas. It should be remembered that the North Atlantic, the Mediterranean, the Red Sea, the route to India have been kept clear for commerce, thanks to the co-operation of the British and French Navy. There have also been few losses on the seaway to South Africa, and the Japanese Navy co-operating with the British, French and Russian Navy have kept clear the North Pacific, while the Australian Navy has not only seized many German Colonies, like New Guinea, Bismark Archipelago, and Apia, but it has to its credit the destruction of that successful German cruiser, the Emden,

and it has also protected the waters of Australia and kept the seaways with it comparatively safe. The ex-panes of water which have to be patrolled and searched by the warships of the Allies is enormous. The area of the Pacific Ocean is 67, the Atlantic 40 and the Indian 28 million square miles. It is no small task to track down fast cruisers under these circumstances. The main help arises from the German difficulty of coal-ling and supplying, which will in-crease as time goes on. The fall of Tsing Tau releases more British and Japanese cruisers for the work in the Pacific. The Japanese have in addition to battleships and small cruisers,

a number of cruisers which are well capable of destroying the two big German cruisers, the Gneisenau and the Scharnhorst, which destroyed the Good Hope and the Monmouth, and which are the most formidable of the German cruisers known to be at large in the Pacific and Atlantic Oceans. These are the battle cruisers Rongo and Hiyer, of 27,500 tons with arma-ment and speed far superior to Ger-mans. There are also four Japanese cruisers about half the size of the bat-tle cruisers, the Kurama, the Iduk, the Ikoma and the Tsakuba. Any one of these six would be more than a match for the two Germans. There are also quite a number of Japanese cruisers far superior in armament, if not in speed to the three small Ger-mans of the Leipzig class. It will be remembered that the German cruisers have kept clear of Australian waters. This is largely due to the fact that in addition to the Sydney which destroyed the Emden, there is the Melbourne, of the Sydney type, and a battle cruiser, Australia, which can do 28 knots and has a chief armament of eight 12 in. guns. It is believed also that the New Zealand, a sister ship of the Australia is either in South American waters, either on the At-lantic or the Pacific, and we notice also that the Defence and the Car-narvon with the transport Orana were reported in Buenos Ayres on Tuesday last. The Defence is a five year old cruiser of 14,800 tons and carries four 9.2 guns and ten 7.5. Her speed is 23 knots. The Carnarvon is 10,850 tons, 9 years old, and carries four 7.5 guns and six 6 in. There are also faster and smaller units in these waters. It follows from these facts that the career of the Karlsruhe in the South Atlantic and the Spree Squadron in the Pacific cannot be of long duration. With these warships rounded up and the German fleet bottled up in the Baltic and at Kiel, British Commerce should become more and more safe.

THE FOLLOWING BULLETIN POSTED AT ST. PIERRE.

Official.
Council of Ministers met this morning and was presided over by Mr. Poincaré. Messrs. Millerand and De-casse gave information on military and diplomatic situation. Parliamen-tary group of republicans of French Departments gathered together under the Presidency of Mr. L. Bourgeois. Latter gave contents of a letter from Prefect of Algiers, announcing that by a vote of the General Council a subsidy of 250,000 francs was granted in favour of the invaded French De-partments. The Crown Prince of Tunis has asked General Verand, French Commander of troops in Tun-is, to convey to the French Govern-ment his good wishes for a complete success of the French armies and his congratulations on previous victories. The Crown Prince blames strongly the Turkish attitude toward France. Rear Admiral Dupere dead. French consols, 3 p.c. 73.

Official communication midnight.—From the sea to La Lys the German action is less violent and on several points of front we have progressed south of Bixchoote. East of Ypres we have re-occupied by a counter at-tack a small village recently lost. South of Ypres we have repulsed an offensive of the Prussian Guard. On remainder of front nothing but can-onading reported.

How Morgan Met His Death.

He was Dragged a Half Mile by a Runaway Cow.

Allan Stanley Morgan, aged 10 years, belonging to Burnt Head, Brigus, met his death in a tragic manner a few days ago. Particulars of the affair have just been received by Mr. Ch. H. Hutchings, K.C., Deputy Minister of Justice.

Shortly after four p.m. on Wednesday last Allan Morgan with another boy named John Martin went to drive the latter's cow home from a field about 300 yards away from the house. Morgan caught hold of the cow first, tied a rope around its horns and made it fast to a tree while he was opening a gate to let the cow in. He then tied the rope around his waist. Martin stooped to pick up a stick to bar the gate when suddenly his companion shouted "Oh John." Morgan had fallen down and the cow, which had taken fright, was running off at a fast clip, dragging Morgan after it. Noah Morgan, who was in his garden some distance away, saw the cow coming towards him with an object behind it but for the moment did not know what it was. Afterwards he discovered it was the boy. The boy was dragged about half a mile over very rocky and rough land before the cow was caught. The boy was dead and his body badly injured.

German Warship Has Been Interned.

Honolulu, Nov. 8.—On instructions received here from Washington, the North German Lloyd's steel schooner Locksun, which arrived here recently, was interned here last night, under the ruling that the vessel was a naval tender. A guard has been placed aboard the ship.

The Japanese cruisers Hizen and Asama which have been standing off and on outside this port, waiting for the Geier, coaled yesterday from the collier Hatter.

Formal proceedings for the internment of the Geier were taken last night at midnight when Rear-Admiral C. B. T. Moore, in command of the Pearl Harbor Naval Station and M. A. Franklin, collector of the port, boarded the German gunboat and gave official notice that the time limit for its departure had expired. The North German Lloyd steel schooner Locksun, which arrived here recently and was interned as a naval tender, and the Geier will be assigned adjoining anchorages in Pearl Harbor. American machinists will assist in dismounting the Geier's guns.

The officers of the Geier and Locksun were paroled by Admiral Moore.

ROUMANIA SAID TO BE NEAR WAR

Petrograd, Nov. 7.—It is reported that M. de Giers, the Russian Ambassador to Constantinople, had a highly significant and strictly private conversation with the new King of Roumania, and after a few days' stay in the Roumanian Capital he has left for Petrograd, whither other members of the embassy proceeded direct without delay.

Moscow newspapers report that the

King of Roumania declared to his entourage: "We shall certainly have to go to war."

Seventy-two waggons of munitions sent by Germany to Turkey, and detained by Roumania, have now been returned to Germany, but the export to Germany of foodstuffs and benzine continues in such quantities as to arouse protests on the part of the Roumania people.

Household Notes

If something you are cooking happens to scorch, set the kettle in cold water immediately, and there will be no scorched taste.

A large, clean marble put into milk or porridge, custards or sauces will automatically do the stirring while the liquid cooks.

It is said that if people insisted on having every meal appetizing and savory, it would make a tremendous difference to their health.

If boiled frosting becomes rough and crumbly, beat a lump of butter into it. The frosting will become smooth and creamy again.

Mice will not reopen a hole which has been filled with any mixture containing lye. Flour and lye make a good paste for the purpose.

Flowers can be sent by post in a mailing tube. They should be rolled in wax paper and have a little moistened cotton tucked in the tube.

If you find that your feet get tired, about the middle of the day try changing to another pair of shoes and see how rested your feet will feel.

Spanish salad is composed of small pickled onions, drained and coated with mayonnaise sauce, placed inside a border of slices of tomatoes.

To remove the yellow stains caused in bathtubs and basins by the dripping of the faucets, use pulverized chalk moistened with ammonia.

A child's shoe-bag is charming made of heavy linen with the figures of little Dutch children outlined with deft blue embroidery cotton at the top.

When washing cream wool or cotton goods, try putting in the water a few onion skins which have been boiled in the last rinsing water. You will be insured a clear, bright cream color.

Combs will soon warp if washed with soap and hot water. It is best to put a little ammonia in lukewarm water and scrub the comb with a nail brush.

Baked potatoes are delicious if a slice of bacon is put inside. Make a hole in the potato with an apple corer, roll a piece of bacon and place it in the hole.

A good way to clean patent leather shoes is to remove all the dirt and then wipe them over with a soft cloth dipped in milk. Polish with a dry cloth.

The skin of a grapefruit, after removing the bitter white pulp, can be crystallized and cooked in the same manner as orange and lemon rinds are prepared.

If vinegar and olive oil in equal parts are rubbed on both sides of a tough steak and allowed to stand for two hours before cooking, the steak will be tender.

To make beaten eggs in which you dip croquettes go further, use hot water, heating all the while. The proportion is three table-spoonsful of water to one egg.

Do not tack the oilcloth or linenum in place when it is laid, but let it lie in place and be walked over for a few days. There will then be no difficulty in getting it to lie smooth.

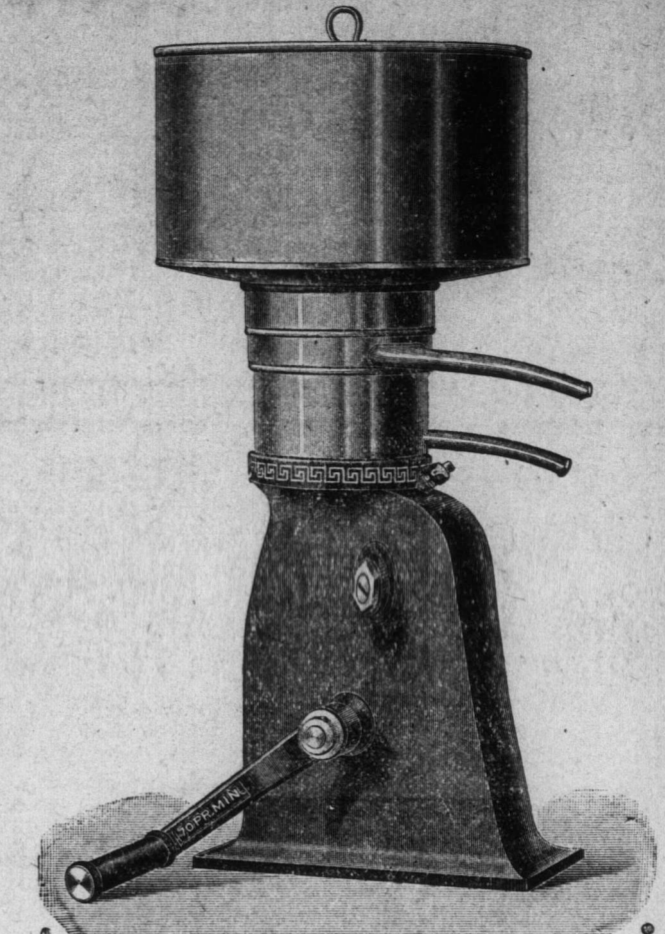

Cable Cut by Germans Reopened.

THE CRUISER NURNBERG, UNDER FALSE COLORS, LANDED PARTY ON FANNING ISLAND, DESTROYED PLANT, SPARE INSTRUMENTS AND PLUNDERED SAFE.

Vancouver, B.C., Nov. 5.—The Pacific cable which connects Canada with Australia, was re-opened to-day. It was put out of business on September 7th when the German cruiser Nürnberg steamed up to Fanning Island flying a French flag and accompanied by a collier.

So sure were the cable men that the ships were friendly that they launched a boat to greet the newcomers. They had hardly started when two cutters loaded with German sailors and marines, in tow of a launch, came for the beach at full speed. The Germans jumped over into the waist deep water and with bayonets fixed charged ashore and seized the cable headquarters. The Nürnberg's guns covered the landing party.

The Germans then fired up the cable operators. Several parties were directed to locate the shore end of the cable and this was blown to atoms by dynamite. Other men blew up the engine room, the boiler room, the refrigerating room and the dynamo room. All the instruments were smashed with sledge hammers. Papers were taken from the office and were transferred to the Nürnberg.

These revealed the fact that spare instruments and arms and ammunition were buried in various parts of the island and that there was \$2,200 in the office safe.

An officer went ashore, ordered the safe blown open and took the money. The arms, ammunition and instruments were found and destroyed.

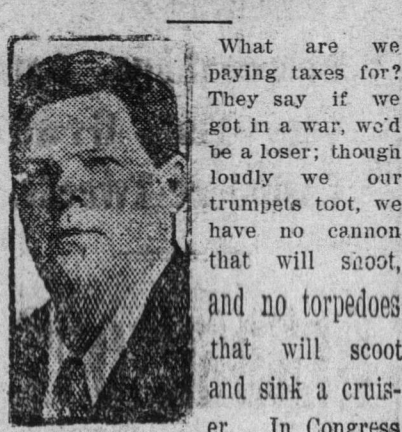

War News

Messages Received Previous to 9 A.M.

GERMAN ATTACK LESS VIOLENT.

PARIS, Nov. 13. The French official announcement this afternoon says: From the sea coast as far as Lys the fighting has been of less violent character than on previous days. Several efforts of the Germans to cross the Yser Canal at the western outlet from Dixmude and at other points of passage in Thernont District were checked. Generally speaking our positions have been maintained without change. To the North, to the East and to the South of Ypres, the attacks of the enemy were repulsed at the end of the day at different points of our line and that of the British Army. From the region to the east of Armentieres and as far as the Oise there have been artillery exchanges and actions of minor importance. In the course of the last few days of foggy weather our troops have not ceased to make progress little, and they are to-day established almost everywhere, at a distance varying from 200 to 500 metres from the network of barbed wire entanglements of the enemy. To the north of the Aisne we have taken possession of Tracy La Val, with the exception of the cemetery to the northeast of this village. We have made slight progress to the east of Tracy La Mont and to the southwest of Nouvron as well as between Cromy and Vregny and to the northeast of Soissons. In the vicinity of Vallée a counter attack by the Germans delivered against those of our troops who had retaken Chavonne and Soupir, was repulsed. Equal failure attended German efforts in the environs of Berry au Bac. In the Argonne region there has been a violent artillery duel, and we have made minor progress in the region of St. Mihiel and in the region of Pont a Mousson. Surprise attacks delivered by our troops against the villages of Val and Chailion, near Clef sur Vozons, made it possible for us to capture a detachment of the enemy. The German attack directed against the heights of Mount St. Marie resulted in failure. It is reported that snow is beginning to fall on the heights of the Vosges Mountains.

A BATTLE OF AEROPLANES.

PARIS, Nov. 13. A thrilling encounter, in which eight aeroplanes, four German, two French and two British figured, occurred in the vicinity of Ypres. The German machines were destroyed finally by artillery, and the eight officers whom they carried, were killed. The Germans were seen approaching to reconnoitre the lines of the Allies. The French and British aeroplanes immediately ascended to meet them. For some time the air craft circled about each other, rising and descending, while machine guns spattered bullets among them. The sky was clear, and the gunners on the ground had a good view of the aeroplanes, but failed to cripple any of the German machines. Then, suddenly, the four Allied aeroplanes made a swift dash towards our own trenches, and were followed by the Germans, who, too late, discovered the feint, and perceived the perils of their situation, only when shrapnel burst among them. In a few minutes the four German aeroplanes crashed to earth.

GERMANS DRIVEN FROM DIXMUDE.

LONDON, Nov. 14. A correspondent of the Central News in Northern France telegraphs that the Germans have been driven out of Dixmude. "The Germans," he says, "had not long in which to congratulate themselves on their seizure of the mass of ruins which was once the ill-starred town of Dixmude. They

ACTION LESS PRONOUNCED.

PARIS, Nov. 13. The official announcement to-night

were sprayed with high explosive shells until extermination threatened them, and the appearance of French marines with bayonets rapidly convinced them that the death rate would be too high if they remained." The Germans have made a slight advance against Ypres, but it is doubtful if they now hold the village of Stelol. At La Basse the Germans are attempting to drive a wedge into the Allied line by a concentrated heavy gun fire. There has been a considerable bulge in the line here for some time, but the Allies hold positions on either flank.

SEVERE FIGHTING NEAR YPRES.

LONDON, Nov. 14.—(Official.) The Press Bureau issued the following last night: A very severe attack against the portion of the line held by our first army corps before Ypres was delivered on the eleventh by Prussian Guard Corps. The enemy made an effort on this occasion to break our line, which they hoped had already been weakened by attacks on the infantry line. The facts briefly are as follows: Our troops were subjected to the heaviest bombardment we have yet experienced, from dawn, for three hours. This was at once followed by an assault in force, carried out by the first and fourth brigades of the Prussian Guard Corps. It is understood these picked troops had been brought up specially to act against us in order to force their way through points where previous efforts, made by the infantry line, had failed. The attack was pressed with great bravery and determination, but owing to the gallantry of our troops, and their splendid resistance against great odds the attempt to penetrate Ypres was repulsed, but the weight of the enemy's advance enabled them to break through our lines at three points. They were, however, hurled back, and prevented from gaining further ground. An immense loss has been inflicted on the Germans, seven hundred of their dead having been found in the ground behind our front trenches alone. The casualties suffered by them advancing up our line under a direct enfilade fire must have been enormous. Our casualties are also heavy. The action of our troops on this, as well as on previous occasions, cannot be praised too highly.

At the City Hall.

The regular meeting of the Civic Commission, took place last evening, the Chairman, Mr. W. G. Gosling, Messrs. Harris, McNamara, Bradshaw, Mullaly, Morris, Anderson and Withers attending.

After the minutes of the previous meeting had been read and adopted, the following business was transacted:

The labor bill for recent work on Prescott Street, was considered too high. The results were not at all satisfactory in view of the amount expended. The Council was of the opinion that with proper supervision twice the amount of work could be done. It was decided that in future expenditure of this nature will be considered by the special committee in charge of the same. In this way, a fuller discussion may be had at the regular meetings.

The Committee appointed to deal with the question of purchasing property on Queen Street for the improvement of George Street, reported on their interview with Mr. Ryan. The matter was further postponed until an interview with Mr. Trelogan can be had.

Rev. H. Uphill and others of the Southside, on behalf of the residents of that locality, called the attention of the Board to the condition of the street from Water Street to the Southside. The Engineer will attend to the matter, and in the meantime the Solicitor will be asked to report as to the liability of the R. N. Co., whose railway tracks pass through the street.

The Secretary of the C. of E. Cemetery Committee complained of the dumping of matter too near their grounds. The Sanitary Supervisor will be instructed to deal with the matter.

J. R. Johnson informed the Board that the building erected on Knight Street, and used as a stable, was the property of the Country Laundry. The owners will have to comply with the law relating to such cases.

J. F. Calver wrote re a sewer which he was repairing. The Engineer will attend to the matter and see that the work is properly done.

H. J. Stabb & Co. applied for permission to lay a narrow sidewalk between their premises and A. J. Harvey & Co.'s. Permission will be granted to lay a sidewalk 10 feet wide in accordance with the Municipal Act.

John Calver, Secretary of the Nfld. Poultry Association, asked that repairs be made to the lane leading from Forest Road to the Prince's Rink, as the Association will be holding a Poultry Show at the rink next week. The matter was referred to the Engineer.

R. Shortall, of the Cross Roads, made claim for \$40 damages, caused by his cellar overflowing from the city water service. Referred to the Solicitor.

The Engineer reported on the condition of the Southside Road, which is in a bad condition. The Chairman will interview the Premier on the matter.

Plans of houses to be erected on Fleming Street were approved, subject to the city regulations.

J. & F. Davey were granted permission to make repairs to building 310 Water Street.

W. F. Butler submitted plan of new dwelling for James Haw, to be erected on Topsall Road. Approved.

After the passing of pay rolls and the adoption of the reports from the different committees, the meeting adjourned at 10.40 p.m.
