





#### Empire Aircrail.

This brings the total number of the Over-seas flotilla to nine -three from Hong-kong, three from the Federated Malay States, and one each from Gibraltar, South Africa, and British West Indies. Many more units have been promised. Several of the Canadian provinces, Ceylon, New Zealand, the Straits Settlements, and other sections of the Empire are actively engaged in collecting money

LONDON, July 27. The best method of economizing gold for individual circulation is engaging the attention of Reginald Mc-Kenna, Chancellor of the Exchequer, who is desirous that the public utilize currency notes so far as possible. No steps will be taken to interfere with legitimate exports of gold, Mr Kenna told the Commons this after-noon, but he adopted the method of mobilizing war resources as when required for the purpose of foreign exchanges. The question was raised in Parliament by a questioner asserting that quantities of British gold were daily taken to the Continent by travellers. The complaint follows the action of the Ambassador in suggesting to the State Department that the paper in question, in fore-casting the destruction of the Lusi-ania, has been guilty of foreknow-ledge of a crime.


