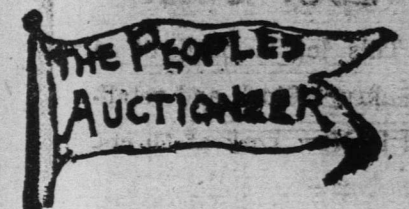

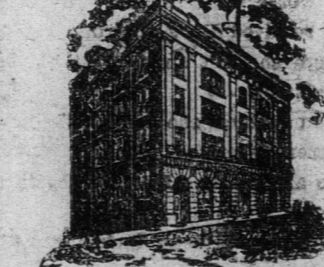

Canada Raises a \$40,000,000 Loan IN NEW YORK.

New York, July 21.—J. P. Morgan and Company and Brown Brothers and Company announced to-day that in association with the Bank of Montreal and the First National and National City Banks of this city, they have purchased \$40,000,000 of notes of the Government of the Dominion of Canada.

The notes, the announcement states, will be dated August 1, and will be divided into two maturities, \$25,000,000 running one year, and \$15,000,000 for two years. The last named maturity may be increased to \$20,000,000.

The notes, bearing interest at five per cent., will be offered in the near future.

Montreal Confirms Report.

Montreal, July 21.—H. V. Meredith, President of the Bank of Montreal, tonight confirmed the report that the Bank of Montreal, acting as fiscal agents for the Dominion of Canada, had placed forty million dollars of notes of the Government of the Dominion of Canada in New York City.

He stated that these notes had been placed with J. P. Morgan and Company, Brown Bros. and Company, the First National Bank of New York, and the National City Bank of New York, and that the Bank of Montreal had also associated itself with them in the purchase.

When asked why it had been found advisable to place such a large loan in New York instead of following the usual procedure of placing it in London, Mr. Meredith stated that in times like these it was always desirable to get money when it could be had, and that under existing conditions it was especially advantageous that the loan should be arranged in the United States.

Reasons for New York Loan.

The two chief reasons for doing so were that by having a large amount of money available in the United States the exchange situation as between Canada and New York would be relieved to a very great extent, and it would also have the effect of improving the borrowing exchange situation as it applied between London and New York. We could obtain money in New York on more advantageous terms than it would be possible in London, having in view the penalizing rate of exchange in transferring funds from London to this side.

Over 2,000 Old Harrovians Serving.

"Governors' Day" was yesterday a sorry substitute for the usual Harrow Speech Day. There were no speeches, no plays, no luncheon, and no concert of school songs. 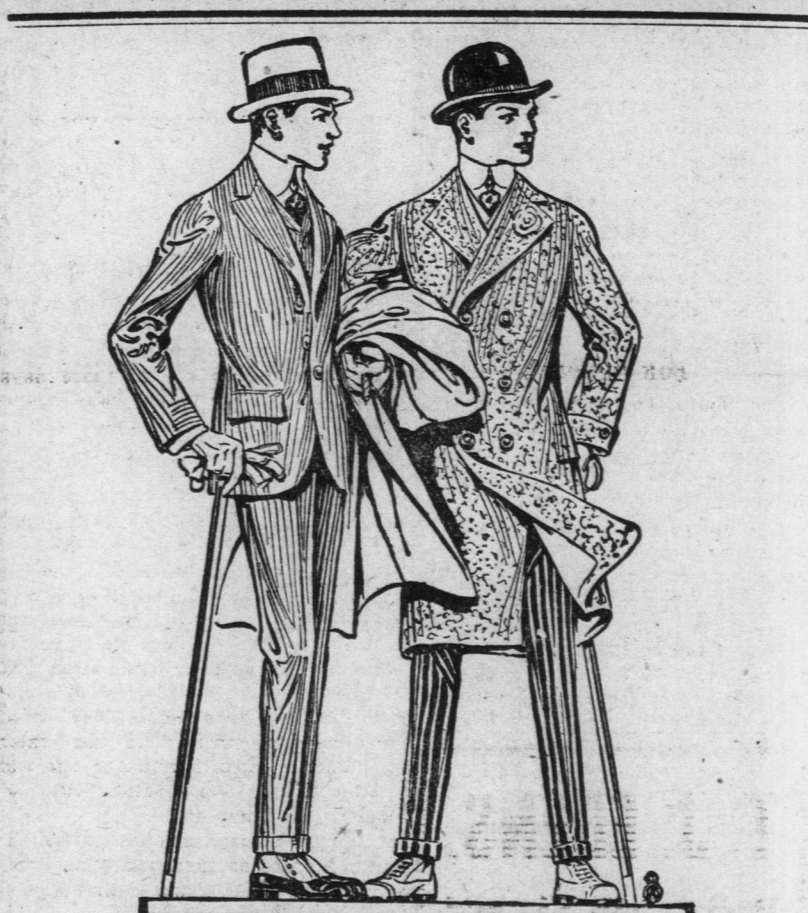

LONDON, July 6th.

Going to Aldershot.

Last night the Governor received a message from the Secretary for the Colonies, stating that the 1st Battalion was to be moved to Aldershot, where it will be attached to the Third New Army, as Army Troops Battalion. The depot will remain at Ayr. The Third New Army is composed of six divisions, the 21st to 26th inclusive. The Commander of this Army is Lieut. General Hutton. The object of sending the Newfoundland Battalion to fit it in its place in a brigade, and to train as a Battalion to manoeuvre with a brigade, an army corps and an army. As an Army Troops Battalion it will be at headquarters and will be used as a reserve, when the third New Army goes to the front, whichever front the third army is sent to. The sending of the Newfoundland Battalion to Aldershot is the last step in the training for the front, so that before very long we may expect to hear of our boys doing their duty in the trenches. Now that there is really enough money to purchase the two large aeroplanes determined upon, and that they have not been sight after paying for them, the intention has been formed of keeping the list open to Aug. 4th and then turning over the surplus to a new fund to be started to purchase machine guns. The object is to furnish our regiment with a good supply of machine guns, and turn over the rest to the War Office for other requirements. A machine gun costs about \$750. Grand Falls is providing two and Sir George Bowring and his business associates two more.

Meeting of Aeroplane Committee.

A meeting of the aeroplane committee was held at the Board of Trade Rooms last night, and was largely attended. In the absence of Mr. W. G. Gosling, the chairman, Mr. J. W. Withers presided. His Excellency the Governor was present and at the opening of the meeting read the following communication which he had received from the Secretary for the Colonies: "The Newfoundland Battalion is to be moved to Aldershot, where it will be attached to the Third New Army as Army Troops Battalion. Depot will remain at Ayr." His Excellency then paid a tribute to the work of the committee, and to the noble response of the people of Newfoundland in the matter of providing funds so speedily. He said that when the present terrible war is concluded with the complete humiliation of the enemy, the position of this colony will be on a far higher plane than ever before, because of the loyalty and devotion of her people in the cause of the Empire. Treasurer Clift reported that the fund is progressing very favorably, as will be seen by the statement published elsewhere. The committee expect that a splendid response will also be made by the outports. It was decided that a meeting of the Patriotic Association will be held on August 5 to discuss matters in connection with the latter fund. The meeting closed with the National Anthem.

Motor Accident.

Miss Gladys, daughter of Mr. T. J. Duley, had a narrow escape from serious injury last night. She had just left her home on Rennie's Mill Road in her motor car and had commenced to go over King's Road when suddenly another automobile, driven by a young man named Tapper, came off Queen's Road on to King's Road. To avoid a collision, as she thought, Miss Duley swerved her car to the left, crashing into the fence surrounding the garden owned by Mrs. Higgins near the Laundry. The car was well into the garden when brought up by the owner who had not seen to lose her head. About 15 feet of the fence was carried away. The machine was badly smashed and was taken in tow by Tapper's car, who stood by to render aid, and taken to Parsons' garage for repairs. Fortunately Miss Duley escaped unscathed.

Roosevelt Has Lost Patience With Pacifists

Says Peace-at-Any-Price Men Are Hostile to Manly Action—Europe of To-day an Object Lesson—Policy of Milk and Water Will Only Assure German Blood and Iron.

New York, July 22.—Little patience with peace advocates who blind themselves to the lessons apparent in the struggle of Europe is expressed in an article by Col. Theodore Roosevelt which he has written for the Metropolitan Magazine's August number.

Following a denunciation of the American pacifist in the article "Peace Insurance by Preparedness Against War," the former President deprecates the prevalence of such sentiment by saying:

"Recently, in certain articles, some popularity has been achieved by a song entitled 'I Didn't Raise My Boy to be a Soldier,' a song which ought always to be sung with a companion piece entitled 'I Didn't Raise My Girl to be a Mother.' The two would stand on precisely the same moral level." "The fundamental characteristics of the peace-at-any-price men is sneer, downright physical or moral timidity. Very many of the leaders among the men who protest against preparedness and who are hostile to manly action on our part—hostile to the insistence in good faith upon the observance of The Hague conventions and upon respect for the lives and property of our citizens in Mexico cowed by any exhibition of ruthlessness and brutal force, and never venture to condemn wrong-doers who make themselves feared. This fact might just as well be faced. To it is due the further fact that the professional pacifist usually turns up as the ally of the cynical type of international wrong-doer.

"This has been made evident by the attitude of the great bulk of the men and women who have shrieked loudly for peace during the last eleven months. It has been made evident by the men who have joined dinners and peace congresses during that time, and by the women of the same type who on this side of the water, have advocated a peace without honor or justice.

"These men and women have demanded peace in terms that would not merely disregard righteousness, but that would crowd out righteousness with success. They have not ventured to make one protest against any concrete act of wrong-doing; they have not ventured to raise their voices in denunciation of the iniquity wrought by Germany against Belgium, the most wanton, the most hideous wrong, and the wrong on the largest scale, that has been perpetrated for over a century. Some of the women by the men who have actively engaged in exciting contempt and derision for themselves and their country by crying for peace without justice and without redress of wrongs, at the very time that the Lusitania was sunk. American women and children were at the time being slain on the high seas; Belgian women and children, French women and children in Belgium and Northern France were at the same time suffering the last extremities of infamy and outrage; and our own women in Mexico had been subjected to nameless infamies.

"The fact that these male and female professional peace enthusiasts who have screamed so busily for peace during the past year have been afraid to make any concrete protest against wrong is doubtless due primarily to sheer fear on their part. They were afraid of the trouble and effort implied in acting about Mexico. Above all, they are afraid of Germany. Those men who are politicians are afraid of the German-American vote; for those professional pacifists have no sense of national honor and are great encouragers of hyphenated Americanism. But in addition they are terrified, they are cowed, by the ruthless spirit of German militarism.

"There are plenty of Americans like myself who feel that the German Government, the German governing class has in this war shown such ruthless and domineering disregard for the rights of others as to demand protest, and, if necessary, further action on our part.

"The success of the German policy of blood-and-iron largely depends upon their possible rivals and opponents adopting a policy of milk and water. The blood-and-iron statesmen of one nation finds in the milk-and-water statesman of another nation the man predestined through the ages to be his ally and his tool.

Fishery Report.

July 24th.—From T. McCarthy (Reynolds to Seal Cove)—The total catch is 2750 qts. and for last week 500. Eleven traps, 34 dories, 32 skiffs and 7 boats are fishing. Prospects are very poor for hook and liners. Caplin is plentiful but the best hook and liners secured only 1 qt. of cod for the week.

July 24th.—From J. Gosse (Spaniard's Bay)—Nothing is being done by hook and liners but caplin is plentiful. The lobster fishery is a blank. The catch of cod to date is 285 qts. and for last week 55. Four traps, 2 here and 2 at Island Cove, with 64 dories and skiffs, are fishing. M. Gosse and Son's 2 traps for the week had 39 qts. and the two at Island Cove had 25.

July 24th.—From A. S. DuBourdeau (Stephenville to Serpentine River)—All the traps have been taken ashore and 170 dories and skiffs and 1 boat are now fishing. The catch to date is 3500 qts. Prospects are not very bright and the codfish seems to have struck off since last week. But is not hot, but there is some small herring which do not mesh in the nets used. There is no improvement in the lobster fishery since last report and very few men are engaged at this work now. Dogfish are plentiful and are interfering considerably with all fishing operations.

Necessary Divorce!

Someone wants to know if I believe in divorce. That's a very big, many angled question and one of the subjects on which I am waiting for my opinions to crystallize. But I'll take this opportunity to tell you that there is a certain kind of divorce which I consider not only permissible but desirable.

Indeed I think the need of it should be taught in the public schools. I think mothers should instill its advisability into their children's minds and husbands and wives keep each other reminded of the need for it. The kind of divorce to which I refer is the dissolution of the tie between married words.

Words Which Custom Has Joined Together.

Of course you know what I mean by married words—the kind of words that seem to be indissolubly associated in our language, words which custom has joined together and common sense fails to put asunder.

We find them in newspaper paragraphs, we find them in almost every story, we find our friends using them, and still nearer home, we find ourselves perpetrating them.

"Ample repaid," is one such couple. "Added inducement," is another.

"Last analysis," is a most familiar example.

"Willing hands," is a favorite among newspaper writers. I know of one newspaper in this country whose

proprietor believes so emphatically in word divorce that he supplies each work with a list of "abused couples," "Willing hands" is one.

A Dangerous Subject For Me.

I know it is a dangerous subject for me to write about for the day after it is published I shall get a grist of letters pointing out examples of married words which appear in my own column. And yet I brave this experience, because I think it will be an excellent thing for me. Our own mistakes are hardest to find and misuse of words is no exception to this rule.

The tie that holds together worn-out quoted phrases is another tie that would be more honored in the dissolution. I refer to such phrases as "sweet girl graduate" which Agnes Reppier describes as "endowed with a regrettable vitality." She wonders if Tennyson would not be grieved to find himself better known by those chance mocking words than by any of his serious thoughts.

Slang Is Machine-Made Language.

Anything in language which is fixed and which makes it possible for us to use merely our mouths instead of our minds in expressing ourselves is bad. That is one of the objections to slang, that it substitutes ready-made phrases for individual mind made thoughts and expressions.

Barrie says that whenever he wants to use a quotation, he looks it up in the quotation book and if he finds it he doesn't use it.

I wish more of us were as much afraid of hackneyedness as that.

If we were, we wouldn't have so many married words, so many phrases "endowed with a regrettable vitality" and so much worn out slang.

The Text of the American Note.

The following is the official text of the latest American note to Germany regarding submarine warfare, which was delivered to the Foreign Office at Berlin, Friday by Ambassador Gerard:

Department of State, Washington, July 21, 1915. The Secretary of State to Ambassador Gerard:

You are instructed to deliver textually the following note to the Minister for Foreign Affairs: The note of the Imperial German Government, dated the 8th of July, 1915, has received the careful consideration of the Government of the United States and it regrets to be obliged to say that it has found it very unsatisfactory, because it fails to meet the real differences between the two Governments, and indicates no way in which the accepted principles of law and humanity may be applied in the grave matter in controversy, but proposes, on the contrary, arrangements for a partial suspension of those principles which virtually set them aside.

States notes with satisfaction that the Imperial Government recognizes without reservation the validity of the principles insisted on in the general communications which this Government has addressed to the Imperial German Government with regard to its announcement of a war zone and the use of submarines against merchantmen on the high seas—the principle that the high seas are free, that the character and cargo of a merchantman must first be ascertained before she can lawfully be seized or destroyed, and that the lives of non-combatants may in no case be put in jeopardy unless the vessels resist, or seek to escape, after being summoned to submit to examination; for a belligerent act of retaliation is never an act beyond the law, and the defence of an act as retaliatory is an admission that it is illegal.

The Government of the United States is, however, keenly disappointed to find that the Imperial German Government regards itself as in large degree exempt from the obligation to observe these principles, even where

neutral vessels are concerned, by what it believes the policy and practice of the Government of Great Britain to be in the present war with regard to neutral commerce. The Imperial German Government will readily understand that the Government of the United States cannot discuss the policy of the Government of Great Britain with regard to neutral trade except with that Government itself, and that it must regard the conduct of other belligerent Governments as irrelevant to any discussion with the Imperial German Government of what this Government regards as grave and unjustifiable violations of the rights of American citizens by German naval commanders.

Illegal and inhuman acts, however justifiable they may be thought to be against an enemy who is believed to have acted in contravention of law and humanity, are manifestly indefensible when they deprive neutrals of their acknowledged rights, particularly when they violate the right to life itself. If a belligerent cannot retaliate against an enemy without injuring the lives of neutrals, as well as their property, humanity, as well as justice and a due regard for the dignity of neutral powers, should dictate that the practice be discontinued. If persisted in it would in such circumstances constitute an unpardonable offense against the sovereignty of the neutral nation affected.

The Government of the United States is not unmindful of the extraordinary conditions created by this war, or of the radical alterations of circumstance and method of attack produced by the use of instrumentalities of new warfare which the nations of the world cannot have had in view when the existing rules of international law were formulated, and it is ready to make every reasonable allowance for these novel and unexpected aspects of war at sea; but it cannot consent to abate any essential or fundamental right of its people because of a mere alteration of circumstance. The rights of neutrals in time of war are based upon principle, not upon expediency, and the principles are immutable. It is the duty and obligation of belligerents to find a way to adapt the new circumstances to the events.

The events of the past two months have clearly indicated that it is possible and practicable to conduct such submarine operations as have characterized the activity of the Imperial German navy within the so-called war zone in substantial accord with the accepted practices of regulated warfare. The whole world has looked with interest and increasing satisfaction at the demonstration of that possibility by German naval commanders. It is manifestly possible, therefore, to lift the whole practice of submarine attack above the criticism which it has aroused and remove the chief causes of offense.

In view of the admission of illegality made by the Imperial German Government when it pleaded the right of retaliation in defence of its acts, and in view of the manifest possibility of conforming to the established rules of naval warfare, the Government of the United States cannot believe that the Imperial German Government will longer refrain from disavowing the wanton act of its naval commander in sinking the Lusitania, or from offering reparation for the American lives lost, so far as reparation can be made for a needless destruction of human life by an illegal act.

States, while not indifferent to the friendly spirit in which it is made, cannot accept the suggestion of the Imperial German Government that certain vessels be designated and agreed upon which shall be free on the seas now illegally prescribed. The very agreement would, by implication, subject other vessels to illegal attack, and would be a curtailment of the principles for which this Government contends, and which in times of calmer counsels every nation would concede as of course.

The Government of the United States and the Imperial German Government are contending for the same great object, have long stood together in urging the very principles upon which the Government of the United States now so splendidly insists. They are both contending for the freedom of the seas. The Government of the United States will continue to contend for that freedom, from whatever quarter violated, without compromise and at any cost. It invites the practical co-operation of the Imperial German Government at this time, when co-operation may accomplish most and this great common object be most strikingly and effectively achieved.

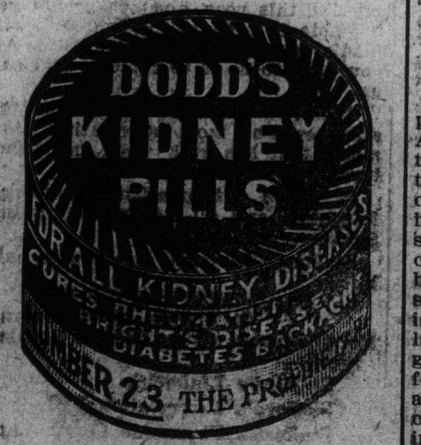
The Imperial German Government expresses the hope that this object may be in some measure accomplished even before the present war ends. It can be. The Government of the United States not only feels obliged to insist upon it, but whosoever "violated or ignored, in the protection of its own citizens, but is also deeply interested in seeing it made practicable between the belligerents themselves, and holds itself ready at any time to act as the common friend who may be privileged to suggest a way.

In the meantime the very value which this Government sets upon the long and unbroken friendship between the people and Government of the United States, and the people and Government of the German nation, impels it to press very solemnly upon the Imperial German Government the necessity for a scrupulous observance of neutral rights in this critical matter. Friendship itself prompts it to say to the Imperial German Government that repetition by the commanders of German naval vessels of acts in contravention of those rights must be regarded by the Government of the United States, when they affect American citizens, as deliberately unfriendly.

Orduna Sails With Full Cargo

New York, July 22.—The Cunarder Orduna, laden almost to capacity or close to 11,000 tons, chiefly of war material for England, sailed to-day for Liverpool with fifteen cabin, seventy-five second cabin, and 105 steerage passengers, including 22 Americans, in all classes. Three first cabin passengers, who had booked to sail, cancelled their passages to-day, not caring to take the risk of dodging German submarines. One is an American, Miss Lydia Wheeler, of Philadelphia.

A few minutes before the Orduna sailed at 10 a.m., two young women came sprinting down the pier, too much out of breath to be interviewed, and rushed up the gang plank. They were the Misses Grace Jeffrey and Ruth Buchanan of Ottawa, bound for the William Astor hospital at Cliveden, where the fiancé of Miss Jeffrey and the brother of Miss Buchanan, Lieut. Cassels Buchanan is lying, beyond hope of recovery.

The Lieutenant was wounded by sharpnel in France and because of the development of a form of cancer, his left leg was amputated. The surgeon in charge said he had not more than ten days to live, and his fiancée and sister were informed by cable on Wednesday and caught a train that got them to this city, after 9 o'clock this morning. A swift taxi took them to the pier.

The Fox Of the Balkins.

(From the Boston Transcript.)

King Ferdinand of Bulgaria countenanced a ministerial decree last week forbidding the passage of war munitions from Austro-Hungary and Germany over the railroads of Bulgaria to Turkey. "The Fox of the Balkins," as he is known in that harassed region, has therefore thrown in his lot against the Central Powers, deciding that the better chance for him is with the Allies. Rumanians having done the same thing, Turkey has now no way of securing munitions and must depend on herself and such unexpected supplies as she may possess. No harder blow has been struck at Turkey than this cutting off her supplies.

It is reported that Austrian troops are massing on the Rumanian border with the avowed intention of forcing supplies through Rumania and Bulgaria—an effort that can only end in disaster, as a few miles of destroyed railroad puts all of it out of service—to say nothing of bringing an immediate declaration of war from both of these nations. The issue of the ministerial decree at Sofia shows that the bait held out to the Fox—the restoration of what Bulgaria won and lost in her last war—was not sufficient, probably in the weakness of the guarantee that was offered. King Ferdinand, whose father was a German, and whose mother is a French woman, has evidently reached the conclusion that if Germany was there will never again be any Balkan States worth the name. If for no other reason than that of punishing the little nations who did not join when told to come in, Serbia, Greece, Bulgaria and Rou-
