It broke by reason of its unsupported weight, and, forming an explosive mixture with the air contained in the spavoid of soil, the gas became ignited. The hole in the ground was therefor the cause, and not the tesuit, of th explosion, and was in no way affected by the gas burning from the frac ture in the main before it could b plugged. The accident, the statement adds, was in every way an exceptional one, and the Underground Pailway Company's engineers, who have had a very wide experience, are anxious to assure the public that nothing need shake its faith, either in the security of Tube railways or
