Cunard Liner Andania Lands Her Captain The Cunard liner Andania, which

ad advised that she was making for this port on Wednesday forenoon owing to the illness of her captain, arrived off the Narrows at 6.15 p.m. and by 6.45 was moored in the stream. She was met off the Heads by the Furness Withy tug, and Pilot Malone brought her safely into port. Dr. Arch Tait, the Port Doctor, and Dr. Fox of the General Hospital staff immediately boarded her, and were followed by the agent of the Furness Withy, in the tug Mouton. She imnediately returned to the King's Wharf in order to take off the stretcher bearers, but it was not until 10.30 p.m. that Captain F. E. Storey, R.N.R., was conveyed ashore. The ambulance was waiting and he was immediately taken to the General Hospital, where all arrangements had been made for his admission.

Leaving Halifax on Monday night the Andania ran into the storm off Halifax in which the Japanese steam-Raifuku Maru and her crew went to their doom, and Captain Storey, who was all night on the bridge, contracted a chill which resulted in a severe attack of diabetes, from which he had been suffering for some time. Everything possible was done for him by the ship's surgeon, Dr. Morrin, b unfortunately no insulin was avail able and it was not until late in the afternoon that Dr. Frazer, Professor of Medicine of Bart's Hospital, London. who was a passenger, and who had also been in attendance on the captain, found a supply of insulin in his effects and was able to relieve his sufferings. After arrival in port, and with fresh insulin available, it was hoped that Captain Storey's condition would improve, but as there was no indication of this, it was decided to bring him ashore. The ship sailed again at 7 a.m. yesterday for Hamburg via Plymouth and Cherburg. She is loaded with wheat for the former port and has on board 292 first and 108 second class passengers. Captain F. E.
