The Constitutional Question.

This morning's Globe publishes the remainder of the important corre spondence between Earl Dufferin and Earl Kimberley, to which we referred on Thursday and Friday. The correspondence occupies altogether nearly twelve columns of the Globe, and the mere reading of it is consequently a task of no little labour-and a task which we have not found opportunity for in the few hours that have elapsed between the receipt of the Globe and the publication of to-day's MERCURY. We therefore defer any lengthy com-

ments on it until Monday. Two voluminous despatches from Earl Dufferin open the correspondence. These despatches relate the whole circumstances preceding and attendant on the prorogation, from the Governor-General's point of view; review the circumstances connected with the Pacific Scandal; and give an elaborate explanation and defence of the prorogation. Our reply to this bombast shall be brief and to the point.

A few hours after my arrival in Ottawa Sir John Macdonald called upon me by appontment, and formally submitted the unanimous advice of my Ministers that Parliament should be prorogued, according to the announcement made by my authority in both Houses previous to its adjournment. I finally anaconced to him that on a due consideration of all the circumstances of the case the proregation of Parliament seemed inevitable, that I did not feel myself justified in withdrawing any confidence from my Ministers or in concluding that Parliament had done so, and that, therefore, I was prepared to be guided by the counsels of himself and his colleagues, but that I must formally insist on one condition, as the price of my assent to prorogation, viz:—That Parliament should be again convoked within as short a period as was consistent with the reasonable convenience of the members, and that I considered six or eight weeks was as long an interval as should intervene before the House re assembled. Sir John Macdonald did not offer any abjection to this proposition; indeed, he had already volunteered a suggestion to a similar of feer.

It was, however, suggested that if ten weeks were named as the limit instead of eight it would be possible to get the preparation of the Estimates sufficiently advanced to roll two sessions into one and dispense with the usual Spring session. Although I was scarcely in a position to know how far this proposal was practicable, I consented to the additional fortnight, upon the specific understanding, however, that if in the interval anything should occur which, in my opinion, required Parliament to meet sooner, an expression of my wishes to that effect would be at once acted upon, without comment or discussion.

A New Cerral.—Anew cerea! has been grown in Oregon. From seven to ten stalks grown from one root to a height of about four feet, and these stalks or straws, are thin an hard. The radials are tough and spread widely. The heads are six inches in length and covered with a heavy beard, each filament being five inches long. The grain is double the length of a kernel of wheat, and instead of being firm and compact is hollow, the cavity containing glutinous matter. While the grain bears a closer resemblance to wheat than anything else, the straw looks more like that of rye or barley. Its origin is somewhat peculiar, the first grain having been taken from the stomach of a wild goose, by a farmer in Tillamook county nearly three years ago. 
