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PRAIRIE FIRE CAME UP CLOSE TO CITY

Sweet Ten Mile Area to the West of Calgary

DID SOME DAMAGE DURING AFTERNOON

But it Was Held Back By Some Very Strenuous Hand Fighting

A large prairie fire to the southwest of the city yesterday destroyed about ten square miles of good grazing lands and two ranch houses and stables, threatened the outside limits of the city.

The fire started in the afternoon in the Sprague area and carried along by a strong wind from the southwest soon spread over a vast territory of country, burning through farms and forest posts as it travelled.

At five o'clock in the evening a heavy cloud of smoke could be seen coming from the hills to the west of the city, though at that time the fire must have been ten miles distant.

As the travelling cityward rangers and settlers in their path turned out to protect their own and neighbors' property by fighting the flames, women and children assisting in the work as well as the men.

At six o'clock last night it had reached a point five miles west of the city and about two and a half miles southwest of W. J. Trellius' ranch, and was travelling then as fast as a man could run, the wind increasing and the smoke becoming more voluminous as the flames leaked up the green brush and meadowland.

About five o'clock in the evening a call was sent in to the Mounted Police for assistance and the men were sent out to take charge of the work. Backing was started and for a mile or more the grass was fired, the flames and checked as they came to the Sprague area.

At 8 o'clock it looked serious for the Trellius and other property in the Sprague area and a call was sent in for assistance from the City Fire Department. Chief Smart with eight men went out in the morning and some more men were despatched from the Mounted Police barracks.

BORDEN ENDORSED WITH ENTHUSIASM

Conservative Members in Ottawa Are Quite Unanimous About it

Ottawa, Ont., April 13.—The general committee of fifty which had in hand the preliminary arrangements for the Conservative convention which was to have met here next June, decided this afternoon to report to caucus that it be postponed. The caucus meets again in the morning and the report of the committee will be adopted. While the convention has been postponed from the date originally set, it is not likely that it will be held this year.

Mr. R. L. Borden was enthusiastically endorsed as leader of the party at a prolonged caucus of Conservative members, Mr. Geo. H. Parley, M.P., for Argenteuil, presiding. There was no half heartedness about the matter and a resolution was unanimously passed, endorsing Mr. Borden's leadership.

The Official Statement

At the conclusion of the caucus the following official statement was given: "A Conservative caucus this morning a discussion took place regarding the extraordinary reports that have lately appeared in some newspapers concerning disensions in the Conservative party and alleged criticism of the leadership of R. L. Borden. There seems to have been no real foundation for any such report and the caucus unanimously passed a resolution expressing its implicit confidence in Mr. Borden as the leader of the Liberal-Conservative party and its desire that he should continue to hold that position and pledge to him its allegiance."

ANTI-COMBINE BILL PASSES COMMONS

The Bill Was Pressed to the Surprise of the Legislators

MR. KING DECLINED TO SIDETRACK THE BILL

Dr. Clarke of Red Deer Makes Strong Free Trade Speech

Ottawa, April 12.—The most important discussion today was over Mr. King's anti-combine bill.

The bill authorizes the appointment of a board to investigate the period of twenty years, or such shorter period as may be specified, in explaining the bill, said the people had experienced a great rise in the prices of commodities during the last few years and they had observed at the same time the great increase in the formation of combines and trusts. There were other reasons than these for the rise in prices, but the bill was intended to place some form of restraint on these trusts on behalf of the public who have helped to make large combines possible.

Mr. King then quoted figures to show the enormous increase in prices of commodities during the past twenty years, and particularly during the past ten years. He also showed that there has been an increase in wages during the period of twenty years, of which calculations have been made. These for "putting trades" in Montreal had increased from 25 to 45 per cent. in the last ten years, and in Winnipeg from 15 to 45 per cent.

The question and the price question were pretty closely associated.

The talk tonight was mostly devoted to this question of reference to a committee, but Mr. King was adamant. He thought no good purpose would be served and it would not become law. The bill becoming law this session. Another argument of the minister was that 22 years ago a parliamentary committee went fully into why wages were so low and were so low during the past 22 years and that such an important measure as this should not be forced through in the last session of the parliament.

Alberta Correspondent Tells of a Trip Through One District

(By J. N. McDonald)

Irriacopa, April 9.—Up to a few months ago the site of the brick kiln town of Irriacopa, about 24 miles north of Langdon, was a ranch lease held by J. C. Davy from the C.P.R. Mr. Davy's five year lease expired at the end of 1909 and owing to the rapid settlement of the country, the company refused to renew it.

The name Irriacopa is derived from the first syllable of the word "Irriacopa" and is an especially appropriate one for the young town. One of the advantages of the site is the irrigation ditch. The town dates its birth to July 3, 1909, when J. C. Davy, general manager with A. V. McLean, a local manager opened a branch at this spot on the prairie, when there was not another building in sight. Mr. Geo. L. Paul, followed soon after, and the first general store and later Mr. Hugh Miller opened a second general store. At the present time there are 100 population and about 40 houses and dwelling houses. Some of these are merely unpainted shacks, but there are some very respectable business blocks and private houses. A better class of buildings will be erected as the supply of building material increases.

The places of business include a general store, 3 hardware stores, brick and block store, butcher shop, good hotel, a library and feed store, 2 plumbing agencies, billiard and pool room, yard, blacksmith shop and 3 building agencies. A resident physician, Dr. Fowler is establishing a general practice. The establishment of a regular train service through Irriacopa has given a great impetus to the business as the merchants are assured of prompt delivery of their goods, without the delay and inconvenience of having to bring their teams from Alberta. A station and unloading platform are badly needed, but these it is understood will shortly be supplied with an electric charge.

School District Organized

The Irriacopa school district has been organized and the trustees have been elected. As soon as the required number of trustees have been elected, a school building will be erected. There are twenty children of school age in the district and the school will be opened shortly in a temporary building.

Two religious denominations, the Baptists and the Methodists, have services alternately in the concert hall, but these and other denominations have selected sites and are planning to build churches during this summer.

Irriacopa Wants Incorporation

The citizens of Irriacopa are discussing the question of petitioning the government for incorporation as a village municipality so that an assessment can be made and a start made in street grading, sidewalk construction and other public improvements.

A board of trade is also being organized to look after the business interests of the new town and to bring its requirements to the notice of the particular and the general public.

Better Mail Facilities Needed

A matter which requires remedying at once is the mail service. At present Irriacopa has only one mail each week, but as a consequence business is seriously handicapped. A letter written here in Calgary on Monday would reach Irriacopa on Wednesday and the reply would not be received in Calgary until a week from the following Thursday.

As a rule the bulk of the mail is sent by travellers either to Alberta or Langdon, and I was told that not nearly one half of the mail from Irriacopa is carried by the regular mail carrier. This has a very bad effect on the business of the local post office.

Another thing that has retarded building operations is the fact that during the past fall and winter was a very bad effect on the business of the local post office.

WILL CLARKE SPEAK IS THE BIG QUESTION

The Railway Promoter is Not in Edmonton, But is Promised

MINTY AND ROBSON LEAVE MYSTERIOUSLY

Hawes May Be Asked to Give Evidence at the Investigation

Edmonton, April 12.—W. R. Clarke, president of the A. & G. W. railroad, has not yet reached the city to be present at the investigation of the transactions between him and his associates over the C. N. R. to the east, which opens in the parliament building tomorrow morning.

Whether he will be here or not none of his friends are prepared to know, but his solicitor, Mr. Robson of Winnipeg, has notified Mr. Walsh, solicitor for the royal commission, that he will be here, and Mr. Clarke is expected to arrive in the morning. However, if they only intend to be gone for a brief period it seems peculiar that they should have paid their bill at the King Edward hotel, and also took their baggage with them.

Clarke May Hesitate

A close friend of Mr. Clarke said this afternoon that in view of the action that has been begun by Alfred Hawes of Toronto against him and his associates for \$250,000 for his alleged part in the C. N. R. to the east, Mr. W. R. Clarke would be unwilling to go on the witness stand before the royal commission and furnish evidence in the morning. This opinion is shared by the civil suit. Then the insurgents point out that perhaps Mr. Clarke would like to have some excuse like that to avoid appearing before the commission. Mr. Hawes and Robson insisted to one or two friends before leaving tonight their reason for going, but these friends say they cannot divulge it.

Mr. Hawes, Perhaps

Quebec Puts Embargo ON ALL PULP WOOD

It Must Leave the Province in the Form of Pulp or Paper

FOLLOWS EXAMPLE OF PROVINCE OF ONTARIO

This Action Precipitates a Serious Situation in the Paper Trade

Quebec, April 13.—If the people of the United States want pulp wood from the crown lands of the province of Quebec, they must take it out of the province either in the shape of pulp or paper. Premier Gouin this afternoon announced in the legislature that that was the policy of the government and that it would be put into effect as soon as possible. In taking this step they were following the example set by the province of Ontario, which had found the policy beneficial. He said that it had been the intention of declaring this to be the policy of the government for some time, as he had announced in a speech made in the Windsor fair in Montreal. His government had no desire to embarrass the federal government and so it had delayed making its policy officially known, although it had not been requested by the Ottawa government. Premier Gouin also announced that it was the intention of the government to increase the stumpage dues which had not been raised for ten years, by about sixty per cent, and also to increase the ground rent from \$3 to \$5 per acre. The announcement was enthusiastically received by the house.

New York, April 13.—John Morris, chairman of the paper commission of the American Newspaper Publishers' association, commenting on the pulp wood situation in Quebec said tonight: "The announcement by the Quebec premier precipitates a serious situation in the paper trade, and tends to embarrass many paper mills which have supplies of pulp wood cut but not yet delivered to the United States."

How West Indies Like It

London, April 13.—The West India royal commission report states that the recent tariff agreement between Canada and United States will remove the fears of Jamaica, Trinidad, Grenada and Dominica, that the latter would retaliate if preferential trade arrangement was made with Canada.

RACE DISCUSSED BY THE SENATORS

Sir Mackenzie Bowell Objects to the Action of French Canadians

NO RACE STANDARD FOR THE SENATOR OR BENCH

Senator Belcourt Defends the Action of the French Canadians

Ottawa, April 12.—The senate today what it seldom does. It discussed race and religion. Senator Cloran was dressed down by Sir Mackenzie Bowell who defended Toronto from a charge of bigotry which he alleged had been levelled against that city. The Premier declared that members of the Roman Catholic religion were elected to positions every year by Protestant Toronto.

The topic arose in this way. Senator MacDonald of British Columbia drew attention to a report of the doings of the recent convention of French-Canadians of Ontario which stated that Senator Belcourt headed a deputation to wait upon the premier asking that a French-Canadian high court judge should be appointed for that province and another French-Canadian should be appointed from Ontario to the senate. Senator MacDonald said he brought the question up on public grounds.

The request made by the delegation headed by Senator Belcourt, discussed the British North America Act. The senators were appointed from the whole country irrespective of religion or race. If the delegation had asked for representatives to fill vacancies, it would have been quite a legitimate request to have vacancies filled by representatives of the French-Canadians and Catholics. But suppose other denominations asked for similar privileges, would it not be a most desirable one, such denominations demanding representation in the senate and on the bench, after a hundred years of peace and harmony? Questions of this kind of religion should be allowed to die out and should not be brought before public bodies.

With regard to the bench of Ontario, appointment of a French-Canadian judge to that position, if it is to be a vacancy there, there was no objection, but the very fact of asking for a judge of the religion of race, was in the opinion of Senator MacDonald, a reflection on the Anglo-Canadian judge.

Senator Belcourt said that the congress of which he was president had passed the resolution and presented it to the premier as reported. He could not be recalled in his action to call recalcitrant or objection.

The French-Canadian educational board proposed that it should constitute a tenth of the population of Ontario and had come to feel that their numerical importance should be recognized by having two of the twenty-five seats assigned to the senate to Ontario. They now have but one. They did not want the constitutional number exceeded, but when vacancies occurred and it was convenient they asked to be recognized by the appointment of a second French-Canadian senator to represent an Ontario constituency.

Senator Belcourt declared the congress had no intention of reflecting on the English judges of Ontario. Every one knew the high standing of the bench in that province. Neither did it want the high court enlarged to provide a place for a French judge. All that was wanted was when a vacancy occurred at some time the French-Canadians of the Ontario bar, and there were many able lawyers that they asked to be recognized by the appointment of a second French-Canadian senator to represent an Ontario constituency.

### SKATER BUSH IS IN EDMONTON NOW

The Speedy Ice Man Back From His European Trip—Will Locate At The Coast

Edmonton, April 12.—O. B. Bush, the fastest short distance skater in the world, arrived in the city today. Mr. Bush has just returned from a tour through Europe, where he made some new records. Bush, who is an Edmonton product, has done some fast skating and at the present time is the holder of the half-mile and the mile championships of the world. He has only one arm, the right one being off at the shoulder, and in spite of this handicap he manages to win the records of the world on the ice.

He started racing in 1908 and won the 220 yard championship of America at Montreal the following year. In the same year he also won the world's championship at Lake Saranac, making the 20 yards in 19 1/2 seconds, which is a world record. He also won the indoor half mile championship at Pittsburgh in the same year, making the distance in 1:17 3/4. He also won the mile race at Pittsburgh in 1909, making the mile in 5:52.

This last winter while in Europe he established a new 200 metre record at Davos, Switzerland, making the distance in 19 2/3 seconds.

During his stay in the old land he visited many points of interest. He was in London, Paris, Nice, Monte Carlo and other places of interest.

Without any great effort of imagination we can picture the scene outside Herter's arena when Nelson went down to defeat at the hands of the despised Wolgast. We can see the knots of "dead game sports" as they call them in America, saying their heads together and wondering why it happened. We have seen it all so often before. We saw it when Walcott failed to stop Lavigne when Fitzsimmons beat Corbett, and more or less modified when Bowker put paid to the account of the "Pedlar." Somehow the majority of us it never seemed possible that Nelson could be beaten. We had come to regard him as invincible in a long-distance fight, to look upon him as something super-human where endurance and ability to take punishment were concerned, to believe deep down in our souls, that the "abysmal brute," as Jack London calls him, had no ten on his title which would be broken. And even now, in the face of the terse, thrilling cable from "Frisco," we can hardly believe it; the message stuns and deadens the senses, and yet it must be true, Nelson has been beaten, and the lad that spoke so boastfully of facing Wolgast, repeating the trick when facing Freddy Welsh, is now of no more value than the glass from which the wine has been drunk. Let us forbear from further comment on Nelson and his follies. It is "not a good thing," as Rippling would say, to kick a man when he is down, and Nelson is down, and no error—down and out for ever.

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### GOING AFTER THE CHIPMAN TROPHY

The Calgary Team Will Probably Challenge For Cup Now Held By The Regina Team

At an informal meeting between Dr. Hicks, president; Joe Moir, vice president and Allan McDonnell, manager of the Calgary lacrosse club it was decided to make arrangements for the locals to challenge for the C. C. Chipman lacrosse trophy.

This trophy is not very well known amongst lacrosse players, except those in close touch with the affairs. This silverware is an international championship for amateur lacrosse teams and was presented by C. C. Chipman, commissioner of the Hudson's Bay Co. of Winnipeg, to the hands of the place of silverware stands four feet high and is one of the best trophies for competition amongst sporting clubs in Canada and the States. At present Regina is the holder of this championship.

The games have usually been played between Winnipeg, St. Paul and Regina. Regina won two years ago and there was no challenge last season.

As this is an amateur competition, the Calgary club is in the opinion of those it has a good chance of lifting this international championship. Regina at present has not any too strong a team owing to the professional players to New Westminster last year in quest for the Minto cup. It has none of the crack players to defend this shield, and as Calgary has one of the strongest teams playing amateur lacrosse, the above officials consider the chances of lifting this silverware excellent.

A challenge will be sent in to the trustees and if accepted, and there is no reason why it should not be, Calgary will have to travel to Regina and play the Saskatchewan capitals for the Minto cup. Should the locals be successful they would have to defend the same on home grounds against any bona fide amateur lacrosse team who may challenge, and is accepted by the trustees.

### LACROSSE NEWS AND VIEWS

At a meeting held in Hamilton last week it was decided to enter three teams in the C.A.A. this summer, a senior, junior and juvenile.

Jimmy Murphy of the Toronto, is still looking around for players for his team, his latest acquisition being Spruille, a husky young home player from Bradford.

"Buzz" Baillie, better known as the quarter back on the Montreal rugby fourteen in the Big Four, is blossoming out as a senior lacrosse player, according to reports.

At the annual meeting of the British Columbia lacrosse association, it was voted to require a cash bond of \$500 from each club as a guarantee to carry out the season.

A practice of the Calgary lacrosse club has been called for this evening at 8 1/2 o'clock at St. Mary's Park. All players are asked to be out on time to take part in a full work out.

Tommy Gorman is another member of the Ottawa Capitals whom the coast team would like to have with them this season. Both Westminster and Vancouver have made him tempting offers.

Five hundred dollars prize money has been hung up by Mr. E. Tasse of Ottawa, as an inducement to the Capital players to win the championship this season. Mr. Tasse is the gentleman who took the Cup in 1908, the year they won the championship.

Charlie Gerrie, manager of the Toronto Tecumehs, is sending out letters to his Harry Griffiths, the former Tecumeh post player, now on the coast, begging him to return to his tepee on the island. It is unlikely Griffiths will return.

Vancouver World: Although the players do not care particularly for wearing numbers on their backs, the meeting was agreed that the rule regarding it should be made workable.

It was decided that a fine of \$25 for each offence be imposed. Numbers were regarded not only as an aid to the spectators, but to the referee.

Out in New Westminster they're going to give a gold medal to the player who is ruled off the least during the season. It's a cinch that some of the defence will be cut of the running before the season is very old, although the new rules promise to give the desired effect in keeping the game free from unnecessary rough play.

Vancouver exchange says that "Dad" Turnbull of the Fraser River metropolis looks in better condition right now than at any other stage in his lacrosse career, and it's almost a certainty that he will figure on the Westminster twelve when the Montreal players come west. He doesn't say so, but hands out the information that "he was feeling fine and weighed 175 pounds and still felt good for a game."

Now that the British Columbia lacrosse association has extended the season from May 14 up till September 24, Con. Jones will have to dispense real money for 22 weeks instead of 20 as he had figured on doing. However, as the game promises to boom in Vancouver this season, Manager Jones is not worrying very much about the financial end. He figures on having to defend the Minto Cup against some eastern teams as the leaves fall again.

THE SECTIONAL ISSUE.

The defenders of the government are overlooking nothing in their efforts to get some sort of support from some place for the Rutherford administration.

In the first place the roads that were guaranteed were no more Calgary roads than they were Edmonton roads.

In the second place the people of Edmonton do not seem to feel at all neglected because the government is criticised for attempting to work this remarkable legislation to completion.

There has been no suggestion yet of entirely abandoning this road. But there is very serious objection to giving any person a coal half million on the side for handling the securities of the province, which is not only contrary to the moral sense of an honest citizen, but which is absolutely contrary to the act itself.

There is a strong objection to guaranteeing bonds to a road to run through a county upon which the government has never received an official report, and never arranged for one.

This is not a sectional question, as the Edmonton Capital very well knows. It is condemned in every part of the province as an unbusinesslike deal, which has some features about that are nothing short of appalling.

STATEMENTS CANNOT BE REFUTED.

From time to time the Albertan has repeated in brief the essential features of the Waterways railway transaction, which on account of its unbusinesslike

features, has aroused both the surprise and indignation of the people of Alberta.

The Albertan proposes to repeat this statement of conditions and will briefly point out what answers have been suggested to them.

A band of promoters, two lawyers and a broker, nose-railway men. This has not been controverted. The promoters are W. E. Clark, who never was interested in railway building.

These men got bonds from the province worth \$8,000,000 and then calmly hand the government \$7,400,000, or thereabouts, keeping the balance for themselves.

The promoters got par for their money. Taking liberal rate of exchange and commission, some persons got half a million dollars which should have come to the province of Alberta.

And in the meantime the government newspapers and the government members of parliament are following in behind the leader of a government who, they say, has no right to lead a party any place.

The legislation which is being introduced by W. L. M. King this session is regarded as somewhat fancy by some of the members of parliament.

Without giving it too strong in the way of going advice, we are bold enough to say that any syndicate which decided upon placing a big bunch of houses in some place instead of donating street railways to the city, will not find any lawyer opposing their scheme at the city council.

The newspapers, which declined to make any move in the railway discussion, even after all the papers were produced, until it looked as if the road was clear, are not slow about forming an early opinion about this Hawes-Cornwall business, which shows that circumstances alter cases, sometimes.

The words of praise from Mr. Fredrick Villiers were very much appreciated. He is a world-wide traveler and a keen observer. But at the same time one cannot but remark that Mr. Villiers would not have been quite so enthusiastic if he had been forced to sleep on the sidewalks of this city.

These rumors of big hotel building have a very good sound. We want every person to come, and all the visitors can spend their money here if they want to, but at the same time we should be able to house these people.

It is whispered that Premier Rutherford came to Calgary last week to select a Minister of Public Works, and took in the horse show on the side. He did not find a suitable man, but he was somewhat taken with one of George Lane's Percheron stallions, and was assured that in some respects that worthy Albertan had an advantage over some of the members of the cabinet.

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In an army, of course, the albatross and that sort of thing have a very delightful, artistic effect.

Poster's disaster in the court pretty nearly ousted him out of the firing line of the party and that is nothing to what will happen to him when he gets what is coming when the judgment in the appeal is handed down.

The Conservative members at Ottawa by a unanimous vote expressed confidence in Opposition Leader Borden, says a brief despatch. Perhaps they are confident that he will continue as opposition leader.

Now that the royal commission is in earnest Premier Rutherford has been forced on account of pressure of time to give up his cartoon work upon the Edmonton Capital, which is, of course, a very great disaster to him art.

Three days have passed and Theodore Roosevelt has not aroused millions of Egyptians or defied the head of a great religious order or done anything else worthy of comment.

And the time seems to have come when the city has decided that it is no longer to be the target for all the city parks and street car lines that every real estate syndicate wants to throw at it.

If Mr. Halley directs his comet very close to this portion of the earth, some of the energetic real estate men will get a slice of it and put it on as a subdivision and perhaps offer the city a fleet of airships to enable the people to keep in touch with their property.

## THE VERY PROMISING TOWN OF IRRICANA

(Continued from page 1).

the high price of lumber, due to its having to be hauled from Aldrie at a cost of \$5 per thousand feet. The arrival of the railway will however soon remedy this.

Stock yards are badly needed at Irricana, to facilitate the shipment of the large number of beef cattle that will be shipped out of the district this season and in future years.

From Irricana a magnificent view of the Rocky Mountains 100 miles distant can be had and on a clear morning they appear to be only a few miles distant. In the hottest days of summer, the farmer tilling in his fields is refreshed by a sight of the snow capped peaks and knows that from those huge glaciers comes the moisture that in time of need he can always rely on to cause his land to produce an abundant crop.

**Irricana District**  
The country tributary to Irricana includes an area of approximately 300 square miles, although considerable trade will be drawn from outside this territory. It extends west about 9 miles to Crossfield creek; east 12 miles to the Sandhills; north 4 miles to the Rosebud and south 5 or 6 miles. It is situated right in the northern portion of the irrigation block and is one of the most fertile portions of it. The country is well watered with creeks and little lakes, which are comparatively free from alkali. Excellent water for domestic and other purposes can be obtained by sinking to a depth of from 75 to 100 feet and several well boring machines are at work throughout the district and in the town. Although the Irricana district is in the irrigated block not more than 50 per cent is irrigable land and the thick

mass of grass that covers the prairie would seem to indicate that there is sufficient natural moisture for the growth and maturity of crops, without the artificial aid of irrigation.

**Progress of District**  
Although the land in the district is nearly all disposed of by the irrigation company, the settlers are just taking possession of their farms. A few went in last year with steam plow outfits and broke a considerable portion of land for this year's crop. Among these pioneer settlers are F. E. Scribner from Wisconsin who will have 1400 acres under crop this year; Geo. Todesca, an Italian from the U. S. who owns two sections of land and will have 500 acres of crop; V. E. Chase, with 300 acres; John Curtis 300 acres; T. W. Smith 250 acres; J. Leonard 300 acres.

The holdings range in size all the way from 20 acres to three sections but quarter and half section farms are the rule. As yet only a very small percentage of the land is under cultivation, but when it is remembered how short a time it has been since the first farmer settlers went into the district remarkable progress has been made.

### Mostly American Settlers

The settlers in the Irricana district are principally from the states of Ohio, North Dakota, Iowa and Missouri with a small percentage of eastern Canadians. The majority are practical farmers, who sold out high priced farms in the states named and on their arrival in Alberta they were anxious to make their payments on their farms and purchase stock and implements with which to start farming operations as soon as a result of having secured such a superior class of settlers the Irricana district will make much more rapid progress than if it had been homesteaded land.

In conversation with a number of farmers whom I met in a drive from Acme to Irricana on Thursday afternoon last, they without exception expressed themselves as being highly delighted with the country and with the prospects for its future development. "Even if we do not require to use the water every year, we have it right at hand in case of necessity in an especially dry year and it is cheap crop insurance." "I like your laws here," remarked one farmer, "and we find that the government is very liberal in granting aid to schools, building roads, bridges &c., and I feel confident that the people who are coming here from the United States will prosper if they are industrious and use common sense in operating their farms. We have got away from the high taxation in the United States, and find that the taxes here will be very low when compared with what we were forced to pay in Ohio and Iowa."

### Adaptability of the Soil

Of course it is too early in the settlement of the district to say just exactly what kinds of crops the soil is best adapted for but the experience of last season proved that all kinds of spring crops do well. Some fall wheat was sown last fall and appears to have stood the winter very well. The ap-

pearance of the soil however would indicate that spring wheat would do especially well. On the irrigated land alfalfa and sugar beets should also do well and prove good paying crops.

However as one farmer remarked, "The soil is here; the climate cannot be beaten and it is up to us to find out what are the best crops for us to grow."

The prices charged by the irrigation company for raw land is \$30 per acre for irrigable land and \$15 for non-irrigable land. Farms that were purchased last year for \$18 and \$25 per acre and have some improvements on them are held at from \$30 to \$50 per acre.

### Branch Line Eastward

A railway line has been surveyed eastward from Irricana to join the C. P. R. main line at Kinnevie and a couple of miles of it was graded last fall. At least fifteen miles of it will be built this year to open up the country to the east through the irrigation block. The line is projected to eventually join the main line of the C. & E. at Didsbury. The construction of this branch should have a beneficial effect on the trade of Irricana inasmuch as the territory tributary to the town.

**From Irricana to Strathmore**  
In a very pleasant 27 mile drive across country, last Friday afternoon from Irricana to Strathmore I passed through a very fine stretch of rolling prairie. Until within a few miles of Strathmore there is very little settlement, although I was told that most of the land is under cultivation and that it will be under cultivation. And when the 3,000-000 acres of land in the irrigation block is brought under intensified cultivation the wealth producing capabilities of it cannot be calculated. Calgary will to a great extent reap the benefit of the settlement and bringing under cultivation of this immense tract of new country, in expansion of trade and in many other ways. Already it has felt the stimulating influence of the opening up of the irrigation block in every line of trade and the effect of the rapid increase of population so close to the city will continue to be felt more and more as the years go by.

Over 15 or 18 miles of the country through which I passed bands of cattle still roam at will but by this time next year their range will be restricted by the wire fences of the settlers. The district possesses all the requisites for a prosperous farming community—fertile soil, abundance of water, railway facilities, easy access to markets, fuel not far distant. The settler coming into that country has very little pioneer work to do, and if he so desires and has some capital he can go right on a ready made farm immediately on his arrival. With such a country surrounding it, and with an energetic, up-to-date class of citizens the future of Irricana as a prosperous trade centre is assured.

**ALBERTA LAND ATTRACTS MANY CAPITALISTS**  
The Idaho-Alberta Land Company is Starting Up in Calgary

Mr. Showalter manager of the Idaho-Alberta Land Co. arrived in the city last week with a full staff of salesmen and intends to establish a real estate agency in this city for the sale of Alberta lands.

Mr. Showalter found great difficulty in securing a suitable office, and is temporarily quartered in the parlors of the Dominion hotel, where he is transacting business. To the Albertan yesterday, he said that the head office of his company is in Spokane, Wash., to which he is drawing well-to-do farmers from all over the northwestern States to buy Alberta lands.

The company has 25 agencies through the western States, and are centralizing the prospective settlers at Spokane and then bringing them up to Alberta. Mr. Showalter was here last year and purchased a large tract of land in the vicinity of Dead Horse Lake from the C. P. R. on which there are three steam plow outfits busy this spring breaking up land, on which he will place settlers in the best class of settlers of which arrived on March 9, and are now busy with their farming operations.

The new firm will engage in a general land business throughout Alberta, buying and selling land both on its own account and for others.

Mr. Showalter says that there is a great deal of talk all through the northwestern States in regard to Alberta lands, and he predicts a great migration of the best class of settlers to this country this year and for the next few years.

The stories of the wonderful country here has aroused the people there as to the possibilities and opportunities of this country as nothing else has done in recent years and they are seeing the advantage of selling their high priced lands and securing greater areas of virgin and more fertile lands at a much lower price.

Many farmers from the vicinity from which Mr. Showalter comes are relying on his judgment to select lands for them and will come to Alberta later on.

"There never was a new country," concluded Mr. Showalter, "which is attracting so much attention as Alberta throughout the world or that has so great a future here. Why, instead of ten years the United States will be importing wheat and beef from Alberta to feed its millions of people, and western Canada will be recognized as the great granary of the world."

Winnipeg, April 12.—Within a few days an amicable arrangement will be reached between the C. P. R. and its commercial operators, who are demanding a substantial increase. All the operators between Fort William and the coast will share in the advance, which will amount to between ten and fifteen per cent. The increase will be based on the volume of business which is handled in the various offices and other conditions prevailing, all of which have been taken into consideration in the formulation of the demands of the operators. This means a graded increase and the matter is now under consideration between the company's officials and the committee of the union at Toronto. No definite announcement has been made, but from information received, it is inferred that only a mutually satisfactory settlement is anticipated. There will be no strike and no straining of the cordial relations between the company and the operators in any event.

**Famine in Operators**  
There is almost a famine in competent operators all over the continent, since there has been ever since the great strike a couple of years ago. Then many of the operators left the business to engage in other work, and the wages scale has not been sufficiently high to induce others to enlist in the service in proportion to the marked development in business.

Recently the manager of the C. P. R. telegraph office in Winnipeg is said to have visited Chicago on a scouting expedition on a search for operators. New York is in a worse plight, and many of the other large cities report there instead of a surplus. Indeed, there were vacancies for 100 operators fore seen necessary that the company, for which no men could be found, pays more wages if they are to get up to \$110 instead of \$90 per month.

Mr. Jesse Gouge One of Calgary, Sustained Compound Fracture of Leg—Other Acme News

Mrs. Gouge was telegraphed to at Calgary and is now in attendance on her husband. Mr. Reynolds, the new manager of the Crown Lumber company, arrived on Tuesday's train accompanied by Mrs. Reynolds and family, and has taken charge of the business. A large number of commercial travellers representing Calgary and eastern wholesale houses arrived on the train this week to look up business in Acme. Among them was Frank L. Heberling special agent of the Western Canadian department of the Springfield, Mass. Fire and Marine Insurance Co. He appointed Messrs. Williams and Newton local agents for the company. ### THE USELESSNESS OF UPPER CHAMBER

Mr. Asquith Refers to Lords as Anachronism

### FIRST STEP TO CHANGE THE EXISTING DEFECT

British Premier Refers to Parliamentism and Crime Letters

London, April 11.—During the consideration in the commons today the government's second resolution in regard to the veto power of the house of lords Mr. Asquith said that the continued existence of the lords as a second chamber on its present basis was an anachronism, and it was an integral part of the government's policy to get rid of that anachronism. But, he added, the changes were to be put forward without prejudice to, and in contemplation of, alterations in composition of the lords. The premier went on to say that while the present resolutions were not put forward as a final or adequate solution of the problem, they were, in the opinion of the government, first and necessary steps if they were to eliminate the anachronism from the throne of the lords. Mr. Asquith made his reply today to a number of questions of which notice had been given in the commons in regard to the admission of Sir Robert Anderson, for many years adviser to the home office in matters relating to political crimes, that he was author of notorious articles in the Times, in 1887, entitled "Parliament and Crime," which were credited to Richard Pigott, and which accused Charles Stewart Parnell and other Irish leaders, with agrarian crime in Ireland. Mr. Asquith in his speech commented strongly on Sir Robert's admission of authorship of articles referred to. He said he could not use language so delicately strong to express his condemnation of admitted breach of official duty of which Sir Robert had been guilty, but he added, he did not think that any useful purpose could be served by instituting an inquiry into matters after a lapse of more than twenty years. The Interest Increasing London, April 11.—The political pot boils seethingly in parliament but the public listlessly read the headlines only from the newspapers, avoiding the perusal of long reports of the debates in commons, and the equally full editorials. This week the government may begin to discover precisely where it is at in regard to the budget and lords veto measures. Saturday the government whips sent urgent notices to the Liberals and Nationalists to attend this week's debates. The Liberals have finished the past week without joy. It is concluded that Mr. Asquith will have almost an insurmountable difficulty in planning his program to suit both Redmond and the members of the cabinet who are not yet prepared to demand guarantees from the throne, while there is Liberal uneasiness about the fate of the budget. Liberals are hoping the Irish will not destroy it. Despite the hopes of Liberal leaders it is believed Redmond will stand up for his demand for guarantees from the throne.

### MR. JOE MARTIN RECITES HIS POLITICAL CATECHISM

Prepar Basis For Taxation — State Should Support Hospitals

London, April 11.—Joseph Martin held a long and interesting debate in the commons yesterday afternoon that English land ought to be taxed on the basis of what it could be sold for, as in Canada, and not as at present, on the basis of rent. He also said hospitals ought to be supported by the state, so that the poor could obtain assistance and not be made paupers as now. Liquor licenses Martin said, being granted by the state, the state should be free to revoke them without compensation to holders. His speech was applauded, particularly where he referred to land taxes and liquor licenses.

### A COMPARISON OF THE COST OF LIVING

Mr. John Mosely Discusses Ontario And Alberta—Tells of The Condition of Affairs in The East

Mr. John Mosely and family returned on Saturday evening last from a four months' visit to Ontario, during which time they visited Toronto, Montreal, Ottawa, Hamilton and a number of the interior towns. To the Albertan yesterday Mr. Mosely gave an interesting description of the impressions which he formed of the conditions existing in the east. "Toronto is going ahead very rapidly," he said, "and real estate is advancing in price, and although there is a sentiment in some of the smaller towns that Toronto is trying to coral the trade of Ontario, they appear to be holding their own, and are making good progress." Among the farming community Mr. Mosely found that although the young or younger generation were well out and come west the land which they were offering for sale was greedily picked up at high prices by people both from the United States and Great Britain, who wished to locate in an old settled community. Conditions in regard to cost of living he said were just as high in Ontario towns as they were in Calgary, considering the higher standard of living in the east, and the higher wages paid in the west. The season was an extraordinarily early one in the east, and when he left there he said that the birds were all out on the trees and vegetation was very advanced. "Calgary," he said, "is the most talked of city in Ontario, and wherever he went he was besieged with enquiries in regard to Calgary and Alberta. The number of people coming west is something extraordinary, and the C. P. R. ticket office is besieged with people wanting tickets for the west, and every train leaves hundreds of people behind who are anxious to come west. Western Canada, and especially Alberta, will certainly receive a large influx of choice settlers this year. Reverting back to the eastern cities Mr. Mosely said that the electric radiating lines from Toronto, especially the Metropolitan line up to Station on Lake Simcoe, is directing trade to that city. Ottawa is building up fast and is becoming a respectable city in every way. The citizens, he said, are now starting out with the idea of making it a beautiful city at once in which every Canadian will feel pride as the Capital city of this great Dominion. Montreal is a city of great wealth and is bound to be one of the finest cities on the American continent. The C. P. R. has done a great deal for Montreal and is the greatest institution in that city, as it is in Canada. It is also one of the greatest factors in the present prosperity of Toronto and is projecting great improvements in that city. A syndicate recently purchased two blocks of land containing approximately 12 acres, bounded by Young, Carleton and Church streets, which it is expected will be the future site of a mammoth C. P. R. passenger depot, right almost in the heart of the city. "I would like to say right here," said Mr. Mosely, "that Toronto is the cleanest city I saw in my travels and that their sanitary system is considered the best on the continent. "You may say from me," said Mr. Mosely, in conclusion, "that although myself and family have enjoyed our visit to the east very much and that we have enjoyed good health while on our visit, that every one of us is glad to get back to Calgary and Alberta. I intend to get into business again in Calgary, if possible, either by building a new hotel or by purchase, but one thing is sure, I intend to remain in Calgary, which I consider the best city in America. "No, I have nothing to say in regard to politics. I read the Calgary papers when I was east, but I concluded that I would take no part in the present controversy. The political situation in Alberta appears to be greatly tangled and is not doing the province any good on the outside," he concluded. 

**NEW STEAMSHIP SERVICE  
TO RUN TO ANTIPODES**  
Big Addition to Trade Between Canada  
and Australia

It has just been announced by the  
Canadian government that a new  
direct service between Canadian At-  
lantic ports, and Australia and New  
Zealand will be put on this summer.  
This service is to be put on by the  
New Zealand Shipping Company, which  
is one of the big steamship companies  
of the world. It is expected that this  
new line will result in a large accretion  
of trade between Eastern Canada  
and the Antipodes, the boats bringing  
from meat, wool, is low, furs and  
other Australasian products to Can-  
ada, and taking back manufactured  
products, such as agricultural imple-  
ments, flour, carriages, buggies, boots  
and shoes, sewing machines, and other  
Canadian manufactured articles, which  
have for long past been in strong de-  
mand in Australia.  
The new service will be inaugurated  
with the sailing of the S.S. "Rakata" on  
Montreal on May 15th, and  
monthly sailings thereafter.  
The New Zealand Shipping Company  
which is inaugurating this new ven-  
ture is one of the strong shipping  
companies of the world. It was in-  
augurated in New Zealand in 1873, with

several sailing vessels, but speedily  
grew, until, with the advent of steam  
vessels, it took on a new phase, and  
became a concern with world-wide  
affiliations. At present, its head  
quarters are at London, England, and  
at Christ Church, New Zealand, and  
the company owns 17 first class modern  
steamships, operating all over the  
world. In its origin the company was  
formed by a number of New Zealand  
farmers, who felt the necessity for  
foreign outlet for their trade, but its  
success speedily caused it to outgrow  
this limited start.  
The service will be operated by  
five steamships: "Montreal" being the  
summer post, and "West" St. John  
the winter port. The names of the vessels  
are as follows: "Rakata," "Whaka-  
tane," "Waimate," "Papanui," and  
"Wakanae."  
The vessels to be engaged in the  
service will be comparatively speedy  
and of large carrying capacity. This  
service is of more than ordinary im-  
portance to manufacturers in Canada,  
particularly those in Ontario, Quebec  
and the Maritime Provinces, for the  
reason that it will enable them to lay  
their commodities down in the Aus-  
tralian markets with regularity and  
permit them to compete on an equal  
footing with their friends south of the  
boundary. It is the intention of the  
New Zealand Shipping Company to give  
the Canadian manufacturer every facili-  
ty and concession which the Ameri-  
can manufacturer now enjoys and  
which Canadians have felt for some  
time past they were not obtaining  
through the port of New York owing  
to certain discrimination. A matter  
worthy of note is that although New  
Zealand granted to the Canadian a  
preferential tariff some years ago the  
same has been of little benefit as it  
is claimed by Canadian manufacturers  
that the steamship lines operating out  
of New York immediately advanced  
freight rates against the Canadian,  
so as to practically offset the advan-  
tage in the duty in order to place the  
American manufacturer on an equal  
footing with the Canadian. The New  
Zealand shipping company and Cana-  
dian government in establishing this  
service feel confident of the full and  
undivided support of the Canadian  
shipping public. There is undoubtedly  
enough traffic to warrant the suc-  
cess of the line.  
These vessels are approximately

4,000 tons burden each, and are all  
equipped with the most modern cold  
storage facilities for the carriage of  
frozen meats from the Antipodes.  
This service will undoubtedly pro-  
mote a more friendly feeling between


