It seeped as if the ancient missionaries of the time of the conquest had come to life again in the person of Bishop Lemmens, and though it is doubtful if he was the first bishop to visit Peten, it is undeniable that he is the only bishop during the past two centuries whose zeal drew him to those desolate and sparsely populated to those desolate and sparsely populated regions. The return from Peten was more difficult than the journey thither. He left there on the 28th of June, sailed for several days on the river Pasion, travelled a whole week on foot through the mountains, living entirely on pal-mito, and on the 18th of July he reached

the hacienda of a Senor Garcia, near Cahabon. Although he was suffering severely, he went to Lanquin and several other places and confirmed many children. 


