





BATTLESHIP SINKS BARK.

Cruiser Was Blown Up

Despatch From Her Captain Reveals Fate of Another Warship.

Czar Informed That Vessel Ran on a Rock and Was De stroyed.

Lively Chase by Togo's Greyhounds Described by an Officer.

T. PETERSBURG, June 1.-Official S reports bearing on the naval bat-tle are beginning to be received by the Emperor and Grand Duke Alexis, the high admiral, the most im-portant of these reports revealing the fate of the cruiser Izumrud, being a telegram from her captain, Baron Feren, dated June 1, saying that he had blown up the cruiser at the entrance of Vladi-mir bay, and describing the battle.

mir bay, and describing the battle. The Baron says that before dark on May 27, the Oslabya, Alexander III. and Borodino had been sunk, and that the Kniaz Souvaroff, the Kamchatka and the Ural had been seriously damag-ed and were lost to sight. The command then devolved on Rear Admiral Neboga-toff. In the evening the Nikolä I., the Orel, the General Admiral Aparaxine, the Admiral Seniavin, the Admiral Oush-akoff, the Sissoi Veliky, the Navarin, the Admiral Nakhimoff and the Izum-rud sailed northeastward, the latter be-ing charged to transmit orders to the battleships. Two other cruisers were cut off from the fleet, and were not again seen.

The battleships, steaming 14 knots, were repeatedly attacked by the Japan-ese torpedo boats, especially at the ex-tremities of the line. At dawn it was ascertained that the battleship division consisted of the Nikolai I., the Orel, the General AdmiralApraxine and the Ad-miral Senjayu. eniavu.

Japanese Again Appear.

At sunrise, May 28, smoke from the Japanese ships re-appeared on the hori-zon, whereupon the admiral gave orders for increased speed. The Admiral Sen-iavin and the General Admiral Aprax-ine dropped behind. Towards 10 o'clock the Japanese fleet appeared first to port and then to starboard, while the cruiser division manoeuvred behind the Russians to starboard. Baron Ferzen's account continues:

continues: "I was cut off from the squadron and finding it impossible to rejoin it, resolv-ed to make for Vladivostok. I put on full speed and the enemy's cruisers came on in parsuit. Owing to the insufficiency of my coal supply and the certainty of meeting the enemy's cruisers, I subse-quently altered my course for Vladimir bay, where I arrived on the night of the 29th. In pitch darkness the Izumrud ran full on a reef at the entrance of the bay. Having only 10 tons of coal, and seeing that it would be impossible to again float that vessel, I ordered the crew ashore, and blew up the Izumrud to prevent her falling into the hands of the enemy. Ten of my sailors were wounded in the battle, but the officers and the rest of the crew are all safe."

Baron Ferzen's report disposes of the statement sent from St. Petersburg yes-terday morning that the Izumrud had arrived at Vladivostok

The Izumrud.was built at the Nevsky yards, St. Fetersburg, and was launched in 1903. Her armament consisted of six 4.7 inch quick-firing guns; six 1.8 inch quick-firing guns; two 1.4 machine guns, and she was equipped with five torpedo tubes. Her complement was 340 meu.

Another Destroyer Safe.





Nagasaki, June 1.—Fully 3,800 Russian naval prisoners have been landed. Three Russian ves-sels have drifted ashore off the coast of the province of Nagate. The Russian torpedo boats from Vladivostok captured the Japanese steamer Daishon, of 700 tons, off Hokkaido and placed a prize crew of thirteen men on board, with orders to take the Russian commander of the bashen headed for Gensan, Korsa where he met a Japa-nese transport. The latter, see-ing the Russian flag flying from the Daishon, intended to recement the vessel, when the Japanese captives aboard the steamer, on seeing their compat-riots, attacked the prize crew, re-captured the vessel and event-ually took her to Gensan. The Mail and Empire. The new governor of the Yukon is Mr. W. W. B. McInnes, formerly M. P. for vancouver. Of this gentleman his friends speak with a good deal of confidence. It is claimed that he is opposed to operations such as those which have distinguished the Yukon under Mr. Sifton, and that he may be relied upon to conduct a clean admin-istration. Certainly he has the chance of his life. More than this, he has given evidences of a desire to do what is right. and to fight the booding evil. Early in the history of the Laurier ad-ministration he tried to stop the biggest raid ever made upon the public resources of Canada. The facts, as understood, were these: The British Columbia gov-ernment had granted a huge land subsidy for the construction of the Etailer govern-ment. Then the Toronto Globe, which had published articles opposing any grant to the British Columbia Southern by the Ot-tawa government, suddenly veered round and prosecuted a noisy campaign in favor of a huge money boons. Suspicion was at effected out of disinterested motives. Mr. McInnes opened fire upon the organ in parliament. He charge was most ex-traordinary. 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
