FRANCE AND CHINA.

It is announced that on the 19th of this month the French attacked Haidoung, in Youquin. It is also asserted that great preparations are being made by China to resist the French at Hue. Chins, it is understood, is able to push forward a hundred and fifty thousand well drilled and well armed men to resist an invading force. The Chinese have no greater liking for war than the French people generally; but they know what the French have been doing since they establish. ed a footing in Cochin China, and have a sagacious appreciation that the spirit which moved the French expedition to explore the Cambodia river in 1866-68 may be induced to make a bolder stroke nearer the heart of the Empire. The French "protection" of Cambodia began in 1863, when the king of that country, who had been for nearly ninety years viceroy of the king of Siam, inety years viceroy of the king of Siam, vas induced to throw off his allegisnce and place himself under the wing of France. The object of the exploration of the river was to find a navigable waterway between the new protectorate and the province of Yunnan, in the southwest corner of China. The river was found unsuitable for the purose, the passage being interrupted by a seres of rapids and cascades, so that all hope had to be given up of ever making it a great ommercial waterway to China from the French colony at Saigon.
