For myself, I feel full of this vast subject, for I know that in less of one hundred leagues of me is the margin of those great solitudes; replete with riches, and occupying the wide space where millions of the human race might dwell in plenty and happiness; where nature annually wastes more than would support the population of China with comfort; and where the most luxuriant fruits and flowers bloom unknown and unnoticed.
