

#### AGGREGATE PRIZES.

The aggregate badge of the association, the Dominion rifle association silver medal, and the Dominion rifle association bronze medal to be awarded to the two competitors whose score in the 3rd, 4th, 5th, 7th and 9th competitions make up the highest aggregate.

SPECIAL AGGREGATE. -THE GOVERNOR-GENERAL'S MEDALS.

The medals presented by His Excellency the Governor-General will be awarded to those two members of the association who are effective members of the active militia of the Dominion whose aggregate scores at 500 and 600 yards in the 4th, 5th and 9th competitions are the highest.

1st prize—Silver medal, Captain Bishop, 63rd Batt. 180 2nd prize Bronze medal, Captain Harris, H. G. A. 179

On the last day of the shooting the prizes were presented by Lieut.-Governor Daly, who prefaced the presentations with a short but happy speech. He congratulated the various winners on the fine exhibition of shooting they had given, and expressed himself much pleased with the large number of militiamen in attendance, and felt proud of the excellent shooting made. It established the fact that should a call to arms be made in Nova Scotia men would be found equal to the emergency. He deplored the idea of war, but should it ever be necessary that the militia of this province be called upon, he knew, as judging from the excellent shooting, that our boys could do considerable "mowing down."

The Lieut.-Governor then presented all, with the exception of the ladies' prizes, the Attorney-General being called upon to officiate in that respect. The latter also made a short address, reiterating and voicing the sentiments of Lieut.-Governor Daly.

A new cavalry saddle of the model of 1890 has been received at the militia stores from England. It embraces a number of improvements that take the eye of the cavalryman at once. Major-General Herbert has examined the outfit critically and has suggested a change in the plan of fastening the wallets, besides one or two other improvements. After these have been completed the saddle will be given a practical trial, and if found satisfactory a number of them will probably be ordered from England for distribution amongst the Canadian cavalry corps.

A capital story is told in Vanity Fair, and is put down as an actual fact. There was an "incorrigible" in a regiment. always in scrapes and always dirty. A brilliant idea struck his colonel. Why not march him up and down before the whole line of the regiment, and shame him into decency? 'Twas done. The untidy warrior, who hailed from the Emerald Isle, was ordered to exhibit himself and march up and down the front of the entire regiment; the men were told to have a good look at him; and then—his peregrinations completed—the unabashed Pat halted, saluted the colonel, and said, in the hearing of the whole corps, with the utmost sang froid; "Dhirtiest regiment I ever inspected, sorr!"

#### DEATH OF A BALACLAVA VETERAN.

The death is announced at Edinburgh of Mr. Robert S. Farquharson, one of the Balaclava "Six Hundred." He was a native of Leith, and enlisted in 1846 in the 4th Light Dragoons, now the 4th Hussars. He went with the regiment to the Crimea, and with a portion of it took part in the charge of the Light Brigade. His horse was killed under him, and he was in consequence taken prisoner by the Russians. He was kept in Russian prisons for over a year, and suffered great hardships. In 1860 Mr. Farquharson purchased his discharge from the army, and taking up his abode in Edinburgh became bandmaster of the Lothian and Berwickshire Yeomanry, and subsequently Queen's Trumpeter for Scotland. He was a fine example of a sturdy old soldier and was much respected.

The ancient custom of flying the Union Jack on the summit of the Keep, or Round Tower, as it is generally termed, of Windsor Castle during the Queen's absence has exercised the minds of many people lately. The supposed innovation is really a revival of an ancient practice, whereby the fact is continually kept *en evidence* that the Castle is a fortress, the same as the Tower of London.

A young gentleman who has a large contract on hand, passed through Canada recently on his way to China, and expects to return to England four months hence with \$1,000,-000 worth of John Chinaman's Government bonds. The young gentleman in question is Mr. Eustace H. Turner, who represents the Southgate Engineering Company, of London, England. His mission in China is to construct for the Chinese Government a six-ton arsenal at Tin Sing and equip it with machinery capable of producing the most improved cannon and projectiles. His company have guaranteed to supply guns which will at the distance of one mile throw a steel cannon ball 14 inches in length and 6 inches in diameter through 9 inches of solid steel, 25 inches of oak and 11 inches of iron plate. All the material necessary for the construction of the arsenal has been sent from England, and skilled workman are now en route.

Recently, for the first time in the German Navy, there has been, at Kiel, a special exercise in the landing of wounded. The general idea was that the squadron had just suffered heavy loss in a great naval battle, and the Friedrich Karl, Deutschland, Kronprinz, and Friedrich der Grosse arrived at the port each with 500 wounded. Four steam transports had been chartered, and, approaching the men-of-war, the blue-jackets of these transferred the wounded to them, and, under the care of surgeons and attendants, they were carried to four appointed places on shore, where they were placed in ambulance wagons and taken to the hospitals. The getting of the wounded ashore was well and promptly managed.

#### THE MOUNTED POLICE.

The Regina detachment of the N. W. M. P. gave a most enjoyable concert in the Town Hall in that town recently. His Honour the Lieutenant-Governor and the *elite* of the place were present. The chief performers were Constables Burghard, Benson and Bayliss, in singing; Capt. Allan, in reading; Constable Koelle, recitation; Staff-sergt. Walker, flute soloist; and Sergt. Mason, general comicalities. Constable Martin accompanied the singers on the piano and played that instrument in the orchestra. All the selections were very heartily received.

The report of a recent visit of a party of eastern M. P's. to Regina gives an interesting account of the condition of the Mounted Police barrack there. It is stated that the party made a tour to all the points of interest in Police-town

the Sergeants Mess, where everything was pleasant and comfortable, with piano, billiard tables, etc. purchased by the proceeds of the Canteen; the stables, with scores of the finest horses in Canada, sleck with good feeding and attention, splendidly limbed, powerful and handsome animals, all bought on the ranches of Stimson, Pollock, Oxarart, Cross and others in Western Assiniboia and Alberta; the bowling alley and the men's recreation room, fitted up with billiard tables, piano, card tables, etc., these, like the furniture of the Sergeant's Mess, being the result of the canteen system; the guard room, which is really a common jail, and Riel's cell and the spot where he was swung into eternity. The maples, vines, flowers and shrubs around the Barracks grounds are looking their best and to say that all the visitors were delighted and interested with what they saw is to state no more than the truth. The stables were however the centre of interest for some of the sports in the party. Sergeant-Major Belcher and Veterinary Surgeon Burnett evidently look after the valiant chargers with the best of care, and all pertaining to the equines was pronounced very satisfactory. One old horse, Crowfoot, has been in the force seventeen or eighteen years and looks as fresh as a four-year-old. We were shown another which had carried a 160 lb. man and 40 lb. saddle from Calgary to Macleod over 100 miles in daylight.

#### The Irrepressible Ranger.

That Mr. E. A. Macdonald should amuse himself by touring through the United States, and gulling foreigners as to the extent of the annexation sentiment in Canada, is a matter with which we have little to do; but that Lieut. Madonald of Her Majesty's Twelfth Battalion Canadian Militia should do so is a matter which distinctly affects the whole force. How it is that the officer commanding the company (No. 1), to which Mr. Macdonald is attached, does not immediately call for a court-martial on his unsavory lieutenant is a mystery; in the absence of any such action, the officer commanding the battalion should, without delay, take the necessary steps to have such an unworthy subaltern dismissed. Mr. Macdonald's conduct in this matter is a disgrace to the corps, and such it will continue to be, until its officers take steps to rid themselves of an associate who reflects such discredit on one of the best rural battaiions in Ontario. In the old days, when the Governor-General personally took charge of Militia matters, any officer taking part in any way in disloyal agitations was promptly dismissed without the formality of a court-martial.

#### Appointments to the Permanent Corps.

Some of the recent appointments to the Regiment of Canadian Infantry appear to have been singularly unwise, and have provoked much comment from practical and experienced militia officers, strongly condemning the action of the Department in making such selections. The whole method of filling commissions in our permanent corps is antiquated and absurd. The country maintains a Military College unsurpassed in system of training, excellence of instruction, and high quality of its graduates; an institution thought so much of by Her Majesty's Government that not only are four commissions in the Imperial army given annually, but that on one occasion twenty-six appointments were made from third and fourth year men. Yet this institution, --- an honour and credit to Canada, is practically ignored by the Canadian Government so far as officering its regular force is concerned. Any appointments that R.M.C. graduates may receive are given in a haphazard way, and, it is generally believed, to those who possess most political influence. In appointments from the militia, the same faulty system is seen. Instead of the smartest and best officers being selected, their claims are dependent solely on the influence brought to bear on a Cabinet Minister, who, himself a civilian, has to knuckle-down to the exigences of politics and party, rather than have a single eye to the best interests of the militia.

#### A Possible Remedy.

Some change from the present system is imperative. In the first plan, all appointments to the permanent corps (including the Mounted Police, which is as a matter of fact a military organization) should be divided equally between R. M. C. graduates and those militia officers who are specially recommended by the D. A. G. of their district for zeal, efficiency, and general fitness for permanent service. As the number of recommended candidates would, presumably, much exceed the vacancies at their disposal, a competitive examination would require to be held to determine the relative fitness of each. In short, the system in vogue in England for first appointments to the regular service could be bodily adopted here with very slight alteration. One thing is absolutely essential politics and political influence must have no bearing on military appointments in Canada, otherwise commissions will continue to be injudiciously given, proof of which has so recently been before the country. The Major-General commanding should alone have the say in these matters; so long as the department is presided over by a merely civilian head, his influence must, as a rule, run on the political lines of his colleagues in the Ministry, irrespective of the purely military needs of the subject.

#### The Buffalo Riots.

The recent active service of the New York National Guard at Buffalo brought out two features of special interest -- the alacrity with which the men (chiefly clerks in mercantile houses) turned out for duty, and the more speedy and effective measures apparently authorized by U.S. military law in dealing with rioters, than are allowed to British troops on similar service. Not only did the men of those corps called on for duty show the utmost eagerness for the unpleasant and thankless work before them, but several instances are given where their employers showed every disposition to help them forward, kept their situations open, their full pay going on, and generally assisting them and their work in every possible way. This is as it should be, and deserves mention. It is not likely that there were any instances of refusal on the part of employers to let their men go, or of loss of situation resulting from their obedience, as was the case with some of our Canadian militiamen in 1885; had there been such in this instance, there is every probability that the papers would have published all details, and have made it decidedly unpleasant for the unpatriotic offender. With regard to the service itself, the comparative quickness with which the American soldier is permitted to defend himself against rioters constrasts favorably with the cumbrous and antiquated procedure legally forced on our troops in similar instances. He who wears the Queen's uniform, whether in Canada or Britain, must submit to be stoned and assailed in every way until in the opinion of the magistrate with the party, (if there be one available.) the troops have had sufficient pounding, and the Riot Act read. Then, and not till then, can a soldier fire a shot in self defence. more elastic method is wanted in Canada for the protection of troops on such duty; a commissioned officer should have the power of ordering a volley when necessary to quell the violence of a mob, without having the fear of a trial for murder before his eyes. The knowledge that the troops could and would use their rifles if attacked, did much to assist the maintenance of comparative quiet at Buffalo, during the whole period of the presence of the military.

## REGIMENTAL NOTES.

#### HALIFAX.

The recently formed male class, in connection with the St. John Ambulance Association, which has been receiving instructions from Surgeon-Captain J. R. Barefoot, was examined at the Y. M. C. A. building by Surgeon Major Lees-Hall last night. The following received tickets of proficiency: Messrs. J. W. Graham Bonner, W. Lester Kane, R. J. Wilson, junr.; H. Studd, T. Vardy Hill, Fred Wood, G. W. Caldwell, Geo. Woodill, Simon Macdonald, Robert Macdonald, Geo. Watt, James Curren, Sergt. Major Burton.

The ladies' class which is under instruction by Major Lees-Hall, will shortly complete its course and be examined; certificates being awarded to the successful candidates. Drs. Hall and Barefoot deserve the thanks of the community for the unselfish manner in which they are imparting elementary medical instruction to the public. There are two classes formed amongst the members of the police force, and four other classes are shortly to be started amongst the militia and firemen.

After playing in the square at the Wellington barracks a few evenings ago three of the Leicestershire band suddenly left the scene. A short time after three instruments were found on the ground but the owners had flown. Later a noise near the entrance fence attracted the guard. The latter rushed over and caught one of the deserting bandsmen scaling the fence with some civilian clothing in his possession.

It appears that the three planned to leave the square and row off in a boat which was awaiting them near the dry dock.

The two men who escaped went to the Wellington barracks the following Sunday night and gave themselves up. Both were dressed in citizen's clothes. They informed the colonel that the heavy downpour of rain drove them to barracks. They had camped in the woods outside of Dartmouth. Provisions gave out, and this together with the soaking they got compelled them to return to barracks. The men state that they had made arrangements to leave the city in a vessel. They secured a boat early in the day and tied it near the dry dock. That night they rowed to where the vessel was supposed to be lying, and not finding her they decided to land on the Dartmouth shore and take to the woods.

Mrs. M. Tremaine, in an article on "Social Life in Halifax" in the September Dominion Illustrated Monthly says: "Society has lately organized a "rifle club" for ladies. This has been got up by some of the military men, and has been a source of great pleasure to the ladies, some of whom handle the rifle with an ease and dexterity which is almost alarming, and are excellent shots. Who knows but that presently when we progress a little further, we may have a regiment of militia, composed entirely of society ladies?"

Architect White of the Militia Department, Ottawa, has been sent from Ottawa to view the site for the new drill shed. It is understood that the new building will be commenced pretty soon. Colonel Humphrey had a consultation with Mr. Kenny, M. P., the other day regarding the matter, and it is understood that all arrangements have been completed for the erection of the building, and that tenders will be asked in a short time. The building will be of brick, the front being an imposing one.

Sapper Bray, of the Royal Engineers, fellower the parapet at York Redoubt recently and received injuries which it is feared will be fatal. He was removed to the hospital.

It is said that there are certain arbitrary restrictions on the liberty of the N. C. O.'s of the Halifax garrison to visit places in the neighbourhood. It appears that this restriction applies especially to the village of Dartmouth, about a mile from barracks; and, though private soldiers are freely granted permission to go there, N. C. O.'s are refused. The matter would be almost too insignificant for notice but for the

alarming increase of desertions lately among troops on this station.

One morning during the recent visit of the Montreal Garrison Artillery to Halifax word was telephoned to the police station that a man—a suspicious looking character—was in the house of Col. Saunders, R.A., with two swords, two military caps. and a can in his possession. Policeman Whelan hurried to the house and found there Thomas Ormand. The Colonel's servant said he noticed Ormand pass the house this morning flourishing two swords. Thinking he had stolen the articles the servant induced Ormand into Col. Saunders' kitchen, and telephoned for the police. The man was arrested and taken to the police station. On the box containing two artillery caps was the name, "Lieut. Cole, M.G.A." The swords are very fine ones.

Ormand stated that he picked the articles up. An officer was sent in the afternoon to investigate the affair. He learned that a team while en route to Point Pleasant with a number of articles, ran away, spilling some of the things on the road, including the articles found in possession of Ormand.

## THE GOVERNMENT CARTRIDGE FACTORY QUEBEC.

In view of the fact that some of the machinery now in use at the above factory is somewhat obsolete, and that nevertheless the ammunition turned out, both small arms and shells, is giving very satisfactory results, much credit is therefore due to Major Prevost and Lieut. John G. Hearn (R. M. C. Unattached List) the Superintendent and Assistant Superintendent respectively.

Ammunition having been sent out on trial and also such as has been used in recent competitions all tend to establish the fact that the Canadian manufacture is equal to the English make.

The whole supply of 64 pr. shells recently used at practice in Halifax was made in Quebec. The results proved very satisfactory, good shooting was made and during eleven days practice but some three or four blind sharpnel were found.

With regard to the Martini Henry ammunition it may be stated that a lot was sent to Lieut.-Colonel Otter, Commandant of the Royal School of Infantry, Toronto, for the purpose of having the same tested. The test was made by three of the best shots in No. 2 Company, Canadian Regiment of In-

fantry, and by Staff-Sergeant McVittie of the 10th Royal Grenadiers, a well known rifle shot, and all concurred that the results of their practice was very satisfactory.

The recent inspection of this factory by the Minister of Militia and the General Officer commanding, will result, it is to be hoped in, the Government taking some action in the way of an addition of more modern machinery.

#### PERSONAL.

Gen. Charles Robinson, recently appointed to take the command of the troops and garrison at the Mauritius, is a Canadian, and brother of ex-Lieut.-Gov. John Beverly Robinson, and Christopher Robinson, Q. C., of Toronto.

As Gen. Robinson was leaving, an old Canadian who knew the late chief justice of Upper Canada John Beverly Robinson—said, "How glad the old chief would have been to see his three fortunate sons here in London this day. John, the ex-governor; Christopher, the distinguished counsel; and Charles, now a general, going to the Mauritius."

A man named Whitney brutally attacked Capt. Bennett, of the 56th Batt., Prescott, in that town last week. He took umbrage at an item which appeared in the "Prescott Messenger" (of which Capt Bennett is editor), about some of his escapades, and without a word of warning, while Capt. Bennett was walking with a lady, knocked him down and came down on him with both knees while thus prostrate. We hope that the ruffian will receive the punishment he deserves.

Lieut. A. McLachlin, of No. 1. Company, 25th Battalion, who has been in attendance at the Military College here for the past two weeks, has succeeded in passing his examination and has secured a second class grade A certificate.

Major General Francis Jenkins, late of the Bengal army, has nearly reached his hundreth birthday, and is thus not only the doven of the Indian service, but is the oldest English military officer living. General Jenkins first entered the service of the East India Company as far back as 1809, and is the last survivor of the famous Nepaul campaign of 1814. He thus saw much active service long before Waterloo was fought. He became captain of the 47th Native Infantry in 1830, and subsequently served for 25 years in Assam as the governor-general's agent. He remained in India until after the suppression of the Mutiny, when he retired with his present rank. The venerable gentlemen can thus boast of having seen more service in India than any living officer.

General Dashwood, who served in Canada many years ago as an ensign in Her Majesty's 15th Regiment, was in Montreal recently. He intend to spend some time in New Brunswick shooting, after which he will hunt cariboo in Gaspe, where this large game is said to be abundant. The general was pleased to meet one or two old acquaintances who knew

him when he served in Canada, and expressed astonishment at the progress the country has made since he left it. He will be remembered by many as the author of a book called "Chiploquorgan," a most interesting account of sporting adventures in the New Brunswick forest.

Master Gunner Maher, "A" Battery, has commenced the 15th year of his service as non-commissioned officer. He served twenty-five years in the Imperial army. He is only 53 years old.

Hon. J. R. Gowan, of Barrie, and his nephew, Col. Ardagh, C.B., of the Royal Engineers, were in Ottawa recently. Col. Ardagh is military secretary to the Viceroy of India, and is now en route to the east by the C.P.R. The Colonel has had a distinguished career in the field.

Major John Fraser, "A" Battery, was married recently to Miss Martin. The ceremony was held in St. James' cathedral. The couple have gone on a tour to New York.

Lieutenant MacMahon of the Royal Grenadiers, a son of Justice MacMahon, some time ago received an appointment in the permanent corps, to qualify for which he entered "C" School of Infantry for the stipulated term. In the course of event his turn came to do duty at the ranges, and he was apprised of the fact, but failed to respond to the call to duty. When Lieut. MacMahon was approached for neglect of duty he stood on his dignity as an officer in Her Majesty's regular army, and as such claimed to be exempt from the decrees of the militia force. The superior officers of the Grenadiers termed his replies not only insufficient cause for his absence from duty, but furthermore considered them impertinent, and proceeded to test their authority in a manner unusual in the ranks of the militia. An order was issued for his arrest on a charge of insubordination, and in the early part of the week he was deprived of his sword and his liberty. In the meantime General Herbert, commander-in-chief of the forces in Canada, was apprised of the matter, and he further added to the severity of the punishment by ordering the insubordinate officer to join his company (No. 3) in the regular forces within 48 hours after his release.

Staff-Sergt. J. D. Taylor, of the 43rd Battalion, Ottawa, and formerly editor of The Canadian Militia Gazette, who is at present on a visit to the Pacific province, took part in the annual matches of the B. C. Rifle Association last week, and "scooped in" a fair share of the prizes. He was top scorer in two matches and took prizes in two others, and his general good shooting throughout the meet placed him first in the grand aggregate by one point over Sergt. Newbury, which secures him the Dominion of Canada Rifle Association silver medal, the gold badge of the British Columbia Rifle Association, and \$15.

From the memorable wreck of the troopship "Birkenhead," in 1852, only three officers (Captain Wright among them) and a handful of men, managed, after floating in the water for several hours, to get ashore alive. To the memory of those who were lost a monument was erected in Chelsea Hospital; and as Colonel Wright (he was subsequently promoted) was one day showing it to an enthusiastic friend of his—"Dear me, Colonel Wright," she observed, "what a pity 'tis your name is not recorded there, too." "Opinions may differ, madam, on that point," was his pithy reply.

According to Dr. Colin, a French military surgeon, the regularity of the soldier's marching step causes the indefinite repetition of a shock of the bones and brain, infinitely more deleterious than an irregular walk, and to this regular repetition of shock to the same parts of the body are due the peculiar aches, pains, and illness of the troops. In a one-day march, he says, this shock is repeated 40,000 times, and often the strongest men, who can walk the same distance without difficulty when not in line, succumb to the strain in a few days. Dr. Colin's preventive for this is a rubber heel in all military boots. This heel, it appears, has been tested at the instance of the French infantry and the result of the trial thus far recorded has been one of marked relief to the soldiers.
