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


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
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

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## CONSTITUTION

#### 01

# The Church Dociety of the Diocese of Montreal.

### INCORFORATED BY THE STATUTE OF CANADA, 14 AND 15 VIOTORIA, CAP. 171. FOR PROMOTING THE FOLLOWING OBJECTS, VIZ :--

1st.—The encouragement and support of Missionaries and Clergymen of the United Church of England and Ireland, within the Diocese of Montreal, including the creation of funds towards the augmentation of the Stipends of poor Clergymen, and towards making a provision for those who may be incapacitated by age or infirmity, and for Widows and Orphans of the Clergy of the said Church in the said Diocese.

2nd.—The encouragement of Education, and the support of Day and Sunday Schools in the said Diocese, in conformity with the principles of the said Church.

8rd.—Granting assistance, where it may be necessary, to those who may be preparing for the Ministry of the Gospel of the said Church within the said Diocese.

4th.—Circulating in the said Diocese the Holy Scriptures, and such publications as have the sanction of the Church, viz:—Prayer Books, Homilies, Catechisms, Collects, and Canons, with the addition of Books and Tracts circulated by the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge, in London.

5th.—Obtaining and granting aid towards the erection, endowment and maintenance of Churches according to the establishment of the said Church in the said Diocese, the erection and maintenance of Parsonage-Houses, the setting apart of Burial Grounds and Church Yards, the endowment and support of Parsonages and Rectories according to the said establishment, and the management of all matters relating to such endowments.

His Excellency the Governor General, if a member of the Church of England, shall be requested to become the Patron of the Society.

The Lord Bishop of the Diocese of Montreal, shall be the President of the Society, and shall be "ex officio" Chairman of all meetings of the Society, and of all Committees thereof, at which he may be present. The Vice-Presidents shall consist of such Chairmen of the different District Associations of the Society as are hereinafter provided for, and such others as shall be nominated at the General Annual Meeting of the Society, from among its members.

# BY-LAWS.

#### I.

The Corporation shall be composed and consist of the Lord Eishop of the Diocese, and other members appointed by the Charter, all Clergymen officiating in the Diocese, and of such other members of the Church of England as shall be elected into the Corporation at the General Meetings of the Soeiety. The latter, however, shall not be eligible for election as members of the Corporation, unless they shall pay annually the sum of \$5 to the Treasurer of the Society, or of any District Association of which they shall be members, or shall pay once for all the sum of £12 10s. to the Treasurer; in the latter case they become members for life, and in the former so long as they shall continue to pay the sum of \$5 above specified. All such payments shall be made in advance for one year, from the lst of January in each year.

#### IL.

#### OFFICERS.

The Treasurer, the Secretary, the Auditors, and the necessary Officers of the Society shall be appointed by the Central Board.

The Secretary may be allowed a salary and travelling expenses under the direction of the Central Board. The Secretary may appoint an Assistant, subject to the approval of the Central Board, provided said appointment shall not entail any additional burden on the Society.

The appointment of the Treasurer and Secretary shall not be for any specified period, but they may be removed at the pleasure of the Central Board.

#### III.

#### TREASURER.

The Treasurer shall receive all subscriptions, donations, rents, issues and profits, payable to the Society, for which purpose a paid Collector or Collectors may be employed. Such monies shall be deposited in such Bank or Banks as shall from time to time be indicated or approved of by the Central Board.

No money shall be paid by the Treasurer without the authority of a resolution of the Central Board, certified by the Secretary, expressing the be paid The and oth registra wise sp at the

The Treasurer shall also have the custody of all deeds, bonds, securities, and other documents relating to the property of the Society, (which, after registration, shall be deposited in one of the approved Banks, unless otherwise specially ordered by the Central Board,) and shall submit his accounts at the stated periodical Meetings of the Central Board.

#### IV.

#### SECRETARY.

Minutes of all Meetings of the Society shall be taken, and at each Meeting of the Society, the Minutes of the preceding Meeting shall be read by the Secretary, and signed by the Chairman.

The Secretary shall conduct the correspondence of the Society, take Minutes of the proceedings of the Meetings of the Central Board, and prepare the Annual Report of the Society, to be submitted to the Central Board.

#### **v**.

#### MEETINGS OF THE SOCIETY.

The Society shall meet annually at Montreal, on the third Tuesday in January, whereof not less than fifteen days' notice shall be given by the Secretary, in two of the leading City Newspapers, and elsewhere as may seem to him expedient. Special Meetings of the Society may be called *et* any time by the President, on his own authority, or in his absence from the Dioccese, or in the event of a vacancy in the See, by any two of the Vice-Presidents and five other Members of the Society, by a written order to the Secretary, who shall notify the same in the manner herinbefore provided in respect of the Annual Meetings.

#### VI.

#### THE CENTRAL BOARD.

There shall be a Central Board for the management of the general business of the Society, consisting of the President, the Vice-Presidents, and the other Officers of the Society, all officiating Clergymen of every Church, &c., or Chapel of the United Church of England and Ireland, and of such other persons, being Members of the Church of England, as shall be elected in the manner following :--

The subscribers of the Society in every Parish, Chapelry, or Mission, shall send one Representative to the Central Board, and shall also send one additional Representative for every £20 in the city, and £10 in the country subscribed annually to the General Funds of the Society. No Clergymen, or Representative, shall be entitled to vote at the Central Board unless he shall have paid the annual subscription of \$5.

It shall be the duty of the Secretary to give notice, on the 1st October in every year, to the different Parishes, &c., of the number of Representatives which they are entitled to elect for the ensuing year, and each Clorgyman shall forward to the Society the names of the Representatives of his Parish, District, or Mission, some time before the 31st December.

The Board shall meet in the City of Montreal, on the 1st Wednesday of every month. Special Meetings may be called by the President, or in his absence from the Diocese, or in the event of a vacancy in the See, by two of the Vice-Presidents and four Members of the Board, by a written order to the Secretary. Not less than six Members present shall form a quorum. When a sufficient number of Members to form a quorum shall not assemble at any meeting duly summoned, the members present may adjorn to another day, and so on *toties quotics* until a quorum shall be found, and business may then be proceeded with.

The Central Board shall have authority to make such *rules* as may be necessary for the government of its own affairs, provided that none of them be contrary to, or inconsistent with, the spirit of the Constitution or By-laws of the Society. The Central Board shall report to the Annual Meeting a statement of its proceedings, and a detailed account of all monies received and expended during the preceding year, and no grant shall be made to any country Church or Mission situated withim the limits of any District Association, unless the application be forwarded through the District Association in which such Church or Mission may be situated, nor unless the annual subscriptions for the current year shall have been paid to the Treasurer of the Society of the District Association.

#### VII.

#### PAROCHIAL AND DISTRICT ASSOCIATIONS.

In order more fully to carry out the objects of the Society each rural Parish, Mission or Chapelry, in the person of its Clergyman, and all subscribors of 5s. per annum, and upwards, shall be an Association, in correspondence through its Chairman, (the Clergyman,) with the Central Board, and may be denominated the Parochial Committee of the Church Society, of whom five shall be a quorum. The Committee shall meet at such periods as they shall themselves decide to be most convenient, inviting the co-operation of all the parishioners in their deliberations and designs. They shall collect subscriptions and donations in such manner as they shall doem most effective, and endeavour by every means in their power to augment the resources of the Society. One-half of all monies collected must be transmitted to the Treasurer of the Society, the other half may be expended within the Parish, Mission or Chapelry, for such objects only as are specified in the Constitu Associa Treasur And ciation the sam same, a annum, Any such D composi or Miss each of District as may of Maus not less busines The l the Par

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And where three or more Clergymen may desire it, a District Rural Association may be formed, with the approbation of the President of the Society, the same to be composed of the Clergy resident within the bounds of the same, and all other Members of the Church, who shall contribute 5s. per annum, in aid of the Society's funds.

Any officiating Clergyman resident within the bounds may be elected by such District Association as Chairman, with whom shall be associated as composing a Committee of Management, the Clergy of the several Parishes or Missions within the bounds of such District, one or two Laymen from each of the same, a Secretary and Treasurer. A General Meeting of each District Rural Association shall be held in each year, at such time and place as may be agreed upon at a previous Quarterly Meeting of the Committee of Management, and Quarterly Meetings of the Committee of Management, not less than five to form a quorum, shall be held for the transaction of the business of the Association.

The Rural Parochial Association shall communicate to the Secretary of the Parent Society, a minute statement of the receipts and expenditure within the sphere of their operations, embodied in the form of a Report, at least one month before the General Meeting of the Church Society.

#### VIII.

#### LAY COMMITTEE.

A Lay Committee, consisting of not less than thirteen members, of whom the Treasurer shall be one, shall be chosen at the Annual Meetings of the Society, from among the Members of the Society, of whom three shall be a quorum for the transaction of business.

The proceedings of the Lay Committee shall be reported monthly to the Central Board.

The Clerical and other Members of the Central Board may attend at any of the General Meetings of the Committee, and may propose and discuss matters therein, but have no vote.

It shall be the duty of this Committee to recommend to the Central Board the best means of carrying out the following objects:---

First,—The securing to the Clergymen now resident and doing duty in the Diocese, a sufficient and permanent income, and providing, with the least possible delay, for the increase of their number, so as to meet the increasing exigency of the population.

Second,—The building, in every place where it may be required, a Church of brick or stone upon a well-considered plan, as to dimensions, external form and internal arrangement, keeping in view the probability of its requiring enlargement. Third,-The assisting of the different Parishes and Missions in the Diocese, in the erection of a residence for the Olergyman, by loan, to be repaid by instalments.

Fourth.—The procuring an adequate and permanent support for all the Institutions, Authorities, and Functionaries, suitable and appertaining to the Establishment of the Church of England in this Diocese.

Fifth,—The encouraging the formation of a Local Endowment Fund, at every station or place having a Church or Clergyman.

Sixth,-The management and superintendence of all lands belonging to the Society.

Seventh,—It shall also be the duty of the Lay Committee to investigate all applications for grants of money, and to report thereon to the Central Board. Every application for aid in the erection of a Church must contain the following information:

1. The precise situation, especially with reference to the nearest Church, and the amount of population within five miles of the Church.

2. The title of the ground on which the building is to be erected,—copies to be produced.

8. The size of the building, the number it is intended to accommodate, and the probable number of the congregation that will be likely to attend it.

The supposed cost of the building, the progress it has made towards completion at the time of application, and the amount of contributions on the spot in money or labour.

#### IX.

#### BOOK AND TRACT COMMITTEE.

At the Annual Meetings of the Society seven Members of the Society shall be chosen, to form a general Book and Tract Committee for the ensuing year.

#### X.

#### SERMONS.

Such Sermons as the Lord Bishop of the Diocese shall direct, shall be preached in each year in each Parish, Chapelry, and Missionary Station, on such days as the Bishop shall appoint, in favour of some one or more of the objects of the Society, and a collection made in aid thereof, which shall forthwith be transmitted to the Treasurer of the Society, and no grant or benefit from the Society shall be obtained for any object within any Parish, Chapelry, or Missionary Station within which such Sermon or Sermons shall not have been so preached, and such collections shall not have been made.

#### BY-LAWS.

No alteration or amendment in the Constitution or By-laws of the Society shall be made, unless the general nature of such alteration or amendment shall h ety, pr ings, an which or of ( a doub Whe

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shall have been proposed at the next previous General Meeting of the Society, provided that not less than one month intervene between the two Meetings, and that the object of the Meetings be stated in the advertisement by which they are called. At all Meetings of the Society, of the Central Board, or of Committees, the Chairman, in case of an equality of votes, shall have a double or casting vote.

Whereas some Members of the Church, who are not unmindful of the great spiritual wants of their own neighbourhood, still feel coostrained, in pious gratitude for the blessings they enjoy, to allot something, however small, from the means with which a Gracious Providence has blessed them, towards the spread of the Glorious Gospel among the nations which still sit in darkness; the Society will gladly receive and forward to the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, the Church Missionary Society, or the London Society for Promoting Christianity among the Jews, whatever sums may be given for the conversion or instruction of the Henthen or the Jews.

Total amount of Investments now made for the Widows' and Orphans' Fund is £2,457 10s.

During the year there has again been an increase in the amount raised in Montreal of £255 18s. 7d., and there is an increase in the remittances from Parishes and Missions in the Country of £34 18s. 11d.

The thanks of the Society are due to the Members of the Montreal Parochial Association, for their exertions in the Society's cause. The Association has paid to the Treasurer the sum of £350 133. 2d., which includes £105 193. 2d. contributed through the Missionary boxes.

The total income of the Society from ordinary sources is £353 16s. 10d. more than last year.

By By-law No. 7, the Missions in the Country are permitted to expend half of the money which is raised in the name of the Society on local objects. The amount thus expended is £121 Ss. 10d., which does not appear in the Treasurer's accounts. Many of the Clergy do not avail themselves of this privilege but place the full amount subscribed to the credit of the Society.

Contributions valued at £195 8s. 5d., have been received towards endowments, and £77 have been received for the sale of books.

The total amount raised within the year for Church purposes is £8586 16s. 6d.

The events of the past year have added another to the many claims which the Society has on the support of the members of our Church. The Clergy Reserve question has been settled by an Act of the Legislature. This measure would have deprived the Church, after the death of the present recipients from the Clergy Reserve Fund, of the endowment which it had hitherto enjoyed, had not permission been given to the Clergy to commute their incomes, with the consent of the Church to which they belong. This has been done throughout the Diocese, and in order to secure to the Church the sum thus obtained, the Society has guaranteed the payment of the Annual Income which was received by the Clergy from the Reserves at the time of the passing of the Imperial Act.

As the commutation money when invested will not yield an income sufficient to cover this expenditure, the balance must be made up from the funds of the Society. By this arrangement the capital sum thus invested will be secured in perpetuity for the benefit of the Church in this Diocese, to be applied hereafter (when the present incumbencies shall cease,) in such manner as the Society may deem expedient.

It is hoped that the increasing liberality of the friends of the Society will not allow its ordinary operations to be impeded by the demand which will be made on its funds in securing this important arrangement. The following extracts are taken from the Reports received from the different Parishes and Missions:

For Local purposes: Sunday collections in Christ Church, Aylmer, £7 10s.; St. Jumes', Hull, £3; towards Parsonage and Glebe, £180; Ministers income, £16 10s. Total £157.

#### BEDFORD.

Rev. J. JONES reports, that the stove-pipes have been entirely renewed in the Church, and of the best quality. A new chimney has been built to the Church; the ceiling under the steeple newly plastered; renewed attempts to stop the leaks at the top of the steeple, but we fear the steeple must be taken down. Nearly ten pounds have heen expended, including collection, Thanksgiving, &c. £5 15s. were subscribed for the Society. Collected for Widows and Orphane, £1 5s., and for Missionary purposes, £1 10s.; on day of Thanksgiving, 18s. 9d. Total, £9 8s. 9d.

#### BERTHIER.

The Rev. WM. MERRICK reports, that the little congregation of Berthier, notwithstanding local efforts, have not been unmindful of the claims of the Church Society, during the past year; the subscriptions amount to £10 5s. 74d., of which none has been expended in the Mission.

In the month of July a Bazaar was held; the sum of £76 4s. 8d. was realized, which was applied towards the finishing of the Church, and the purchase of a Melodeon. The Missionary gratefully acknowledges the valuable services rendered on this occasion, by the ladies of the Mission and elsewhere.

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A commencement has been made towards providing an endowment for this Mission; a valuable property situated in the best part of the village has been purchased, and by means of assistance obtained in the cities of Montreal and Quebec, and a grant of £25 through the Lord Bishop, the first instalment of £100 has been paid. £65 has been subscribed by the congregation to meet the subsequent payments.

The following are the other contributions for local purposes:-towards finishing Church, £40 11s.; Offertory collections, £20 8s. 4<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>d.; Donations to Clergyman, £18 10s. Totai, £240 14s. 8d.

#### BROME.

Rev. R. LINDSAY writes :-During the present year I have been absent until the end of May, on account of ill health. During my absence my Mission has been divided, so that I retain at present the Township of Brome. I have opened two new stations, which thus far have been successful, and I trust with the blessing of God they may be centres of great good.

The day school has been finished, and is in successful operation, and I trust it may be the instrument of spreading scriptural instruction through the community.

We have made a beginning towards an Endowment, (viz: £75.) through the liberality of two ladies; £4 were expended in repairs of Church and Parsonage; £26 ls. 6d. were subscribed for the Society. There were collected for Widows and Orphans, 15s. 6d.; for Missionary purposes, £1 5s., and on day of Thanksgiving, £8 15s. Total, £110 17s.

#### BUCKINGHAM.

Rev. W. Monars writes, on 1st Oct: Lately, George Eaton, Esq., (proprietor of one of our lumber establishments,) made us a grant of land somewhat over two acres, as a site for a Parsonage and a burying ground, adjoining our Church in this village; owing to its situation the land is a valuable donation, and has just been laid out in small square portions, as family lots for graves. This fall we expect to have it fenced in and trees planted at the ends of the walks, and in front of the ground, the Church Wardens are now busily engaged in erecting sheds in rear of the Church, and fencing the property. They have also collected subscriptions, and made contracts for the erection of a Parsonage upon the above mentioned site, and about the end of the present month we expect to have the building erected and roofed.

To secure the building so far, and to place within it sufficient materials, to be seasoned fit for working in the Spring, is about all the Building Committee will be able to accomplish this year.

I am happy to remark that the additional accommodation made in our Church, of sixteen pews, is now occupied, and after that the work now in progress shall have been completed, it is the intention of the Church Wardens to make some further accommodation in the gallery for our increasing congregation. There were subscribed for the Society £4 17s. 6d.; collected for Missionary purposes £1 5s.; for Widows and Orphans, £1 4s., and on day of Thanksgiving, £3. Total £10 6s. 6d.

## 22 CHAMBLY.

The Rev. J. P. WHITE gives a very favourable report of the amount raised for Church purposes in the parish this year. Although the Protestant population of the Mission, has lately much decreased, yet it is gratifying to state that the total sum raised for various Church purposes is larger than last year, or for several years past,-evidence, it is hoped, of affectionnte regard for the interests of the Church. The increase in our Annual Subscriptions is to be attributed in a great measure to the zealous exertions of the collectors, and our list numbers 99 subscribers. During the year the Church and graveyard have undergone, (through the indefatigable efforts of our Senior Church Warden,) several necessary repairs and improvements. A most excellent Organ, valued at £188, has been placed in the Church, for which £94 has been raised. I have to record, also, gratefully, the present by a lady of the congregation, in token of gratitude for God's mercies, of three handsome tablets for the chancel, on which the Decalogue, Creed, and Lord's Prayer, are very neatly gilt. The Parsonage house has also been bricked and repaired by the parish at an expense of £130, which sum remains to be collected.

There have been collected the following sums:—C:ergyman's stipend, £70; Church expenses, £31; repairs of Church, &c., £26; Insurance, £9; Sacramental collections, £9 3s. 9d.; Lending Library, £3 8s. 9d.; Sunday School books, £2 12s. 10d., and for Church Society, £46 3s. 10d. Total for Church purposes, £187 9s. 2d., and £16 6s. 8d. for Patriotic Fund.

On reviewing our efforts for the past year, although we are all too indifferent for the Church's interests, yet I cannot but feel that there is abundant cause for deep gratitude to Almighty God for the results which have been accomplished, and may He encourage to perseverance in well-doing, those who have already contributed towards our Society, by the confidence that the more zealously we strive for the prosperity of our beloved Church, the more acceptable we shall become in the sight of Him who loved the Church and gave himself for it, and who regards with peculiar complacency every effort of Christian benevolence, however small or humble it may be, which is made to advance her interests. And may this thought cheer and encourage all in their endeavours to promote the prosperity of the Church Society's cause; it is the Lord's work, and He will crown it with His blessing.

#### CHRISTIEVILLE.

Rev. J. McLEOD reports, that the following sums have been raised in h's Mission:—Subscriptions to Church Society, £8; Donation to Widows' and Orphans' Fund, £2 10s.; Collection for Widows and Orphans, £4 3s. 7d., and for Missionary purposes, £1 10s. #### CLARENDON.

Rev. J. S. SYNES writes :-- I am happy to be able to report, for the satisfaction of the Board and Members of the Church Society, that the people here are contributing towards various objects in connexion with our beloved Church. In Clarendon for the Glebe and Parsonage, &c. At the Portage du Fort, for the erection of a Church, which with the kind assistance of G. W. Usborne, Esq., we hope soon to commence. W. Smith, Esq., and the people of Onslow, are exerting themselves and hope to be able to put up a neat wooden Church next summer, on the ground given for that purpose by Messrs. John Egan & Co.

I am going to meet the people of Bristol on Tuesday next, to look ont a site for a Church in that Township, of which I hope to be able to give a satisfactory report next year.

The words of our Blessed Lord are truly applicable to this wide field of Missionary labour. "The harvest truly is plenteous but the labourers are few." Our united prayer is that the Lord may send forth labourers into his harvest.

#### COWANSVILLE AND CHURCHVILLE MISSION.

Rev. J. C. DAVIDSON reports, that the Missisquoi High School is doing effective service in the community, which is appreciated by parents, and deeply interests them in its prosperity. There are in the school two assistants and a teacher of music.

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A few friends, since October last, have erected and completed a large and beautiful Academy for the use of schools, at an expense of 1700 dollars. In the Deeds it is expressly secured that the instruction given shall be under the direction of the Church of England. The new Church at Churchville will soon be ready for consecration. Divine service is held at Cowansville, Churchville, West Brome, Hall's and Fordyce's School House.

Christmas service was held in the new Academy. At the conclusion an appeal was made for contributions for the purchase of plate for the Communion, when fifty dollars were immediately provided for this purpose. In various ways the people of this new mission have manifested the most praiseworthy liberality.

The following is the account of the ordinary subscriptions and collections for local and other purposes during the past year: Subscriptions for Church Society, £5 19s. 71d.; Widows and Orphans, £1 8s. 21d.; Thanksgiving Day, £1 3s. 8d. Churches) of three years from its actual commencement; in the midst of difficulties and troubles, (often from quarters where it was least expected,) that have severely tried the spirits, and been enough to discourage the most devoted. It may be safely asserted that all are amazed at the success with which God hath blessed us in making effective the sincere but feeble efforts of but a poor and little flock, to build a house for the Majesty of Heaven. And most devoutly therefore do they desire to ascribe all the glory to Him who has heard the prayers of his people, and crowned their humble efforts with success. Three years ago the Bishop, in his triennial visitation, laid the foundation stone, and this year on his next visit, he consecrated it to the holy purposes for which it was erected. And now we have a temple of God, free from any incumbrance of debt, wherein God's people may worship undisturbed through all future ages. The occasion of its consecration on the 13th September, under the name of St. Matthew's Church, was marked by the generous gift of a service of plate for the Holy Communion by a kind Christian friend of the Church in Montreal, which was humbly presented and placed upon the Holy Table during the service by the Bishop. Three Clergymen were present with the Bishop; unforeseen circumstances preventing the attendance of more. Eighteen candidates ratified their baptismal vows, and were confirmed by the Bishop. The sermon was preached by His Lordship, from the text, Exodus iii, 5, wherein was taught the duty of reverence due to places specially set apart for the worship of God. Afterwards a collection was made, and the Church-yard was consecrated as a place of Christian burial.-And thus ended the proceedings of a day which will ever be remarkable here for the consecration of the first and only Protestant place of worship in the Township of Edwardstown. Though this Mission has suffered, in common with other parts of Lower Canada, by the emigration of Church-people to the Upper Province, yet there are many matters of encouragement with respect to religion. The increasing number of baptisms, of communicants, of willing subscribers, not of large amounts, but according to their ability, to pious and charitable objects, not omitting the Church Society, while burdened with erecting a Church; the ready assistance which the Missionary has received from the Laity in collecting and gathering in these contributions; the prosperity of the Sunday School, and the willingness of the young to give systematically towards religion; the gradual but marked change in the many who belong not to the Church, from a scornful and abusive, unto a kindly and respectful manner towards our spiritual work; all new features in these parts lead to the conclusion that the imperfect ministerial labours bestowed have not been altogether in vain in the Lord. There were subscribed for the Society, £7 5s.; collected for Widows and Orphans' 9s. 3d.; Missionary purposes, 8s. 11d. There were collected for local purposes, as follows: for finishing the Church, £50 3s. 2d.; labour for do., £2 5s. 4d.; Sunday School Missionary box, 12s. 5d.; Sunday collection, £5; Gifts to Missionary, £2 1s. 4d. Total, £58 5s. 6d.

#### FARNHAM.

The Missionary (Rev. W. JONES) states, that he cannot review the events of the past year without making allusion to a severe loss which this mission has sustained in the death of George Carlton Allsopp, Esq., on the 8th day of March last, after an illness of only three days. For many years in succession he was our Senior Church Warden, the leader of our choir, our lay-reader, our representative in the councils of the Church, and our efficient and ready helper in every good work. Such faithful and zealous labourers in the cause of God and his Holy Church, deserve our pious remembrance and very honourable mention on the records of the Church, so that others "seeing their good works," may emulate their example "and glorify their Father which is in heaven." A handsome monument with an appropriate inscription, in the centre of the church-yard, marks his peaceful resting place.

Our public services at the different stations have generally been regularly and satisfactorily attended, and the good feeling towards the Church alluded to in my report last year, has in no wise abated, but manifested itself in an increased liberality, and in acts of very special kindness towards your Misi y.

The contributions for Church purposes have for the first time reached the sum at which I rated the abilities of our people in my report to the Parent Society in England, in the year 1854. Nay! they have even surpassed that sum by £1 2s. 10<sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub>d.

At Adamsville we hope ere long to enjoy the luxury of a comfortable Church edifice. In the mean while, through the liberality of the Trustees, who deserve our best thanks, we occupy a large and commodious room in the new Academy. The following is a condensed classification of our contributions, which will enable each congregation to perceive at a glauce the amount of its liberality for all purposes.

#### FROST VILLAGE.

Rev. D. LINDSAY sends the following report:—I have only made my Church Society collections this year in Frost Village, so that it amounts to a little less than last year. For I feel that in Stukely, the building of the Church had drawn heavily upon that part of my Mission.

We have every reason to be thankful for the progress we are making, and the evident willingness of our members to bear their part in duly supporting the Church. In a comparatively new mission like this, every year presents fresh demands for their benevolence, and they are met with liberality.

There is, however, a large district of country round me, in a sadly neglected condition, almost wishing for religious teachers of any kind, and a consequent state of things existing most sad to contemplate. I sincerely trust that the funds of the Society may warrant the sending of some travelling missionmissie

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aries in this direction. There are whole townships without a regular ministry of any kind, and it is painful to pay a visit to some distant place, and find neighbourhoods composed of old-country people anxious to retain the religion of their forefathers, and yet for want of the ministrations of the Gospel, their families are growing up in almost heathen darkness. Strive as we will, we, who have stated churches to supply, and their scattered congregations to visit, cannot attend them regularly enough, so as to render efficient the plans we may use to bring them to the fold of Christ. A few years labour amongst them would, I am persuaded, be attended with the same results as other townships exhibit of the success which has followed the travelling missionary. The following is the amount raised during the year: Subscriptions to Church Society, £9 18s. 7d.; collected for Widows and Orphans, £1 18s. 2d.; Missionary purposes, £3 0s. 3d.; on the day of Thanksgiving, £20, which was appropriated to the payment of some claims upon the Church at Frost Village.

In Stukely there were collected, £122 17s. 6d., viz: for new Church, £107 17s. 6d., towards Stipend, £12; offertory collection, £8. In Frost Village, £44 10s. 4d., viz: towards Stipend, £30, by Ladics Sewing Society, for bell gable, £14 10s. 4d. Total in the Mission, £201 19s. 10d.

GORE.

The Rev. J. GRIFFIN gives a very satisfactory report of the state of his mission. There has been a visible increase in almost every congregation, so much so that two of the school houses, (where divine service is performed,) have become much too small for the members attending, so that there is need for three churches, instead of one, wherein they may meet together to join in prayer and praise to God. Mr. Griffin wishes, in behalf of his congregations, thankfully to acknowledge the liberal aid, (£39 9s. 9d.,) that has been received from S. Bellingham, Esq., M.P.P. A debt of gratitude is also due to the benevolent lady who has presented to the Gore Church a very handsome marble font, and it is hoped that in dependance on God's blessing on their exertions in promoting the erection of a temple to the honor of his name, that the font will soon be in use within its sacred walls. The following sums have been contributed towards the erection of the new Church: from S. Bellingham, £12; collected by do., £14 19s. 9d., order for hardware from do., £12 10s, ; a friend, 10s. ; J. J. Gibb, £1 5s. ; Wm. Lyman, £1 5s. Thos. Mussen, £1 5s.; Geo. Stevenson collected from labourers on the Ottawa Railroad, £1 10s. Total, £45 4s. 9d., of which £30 7s. 11d. have been expended in quarrying stone and preparing site for the Church.

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#### GRANBY AND NORTH SHEFFORD.

Rev. T. MACHIN reports, that the subscriptions to the Church Society this year amount to £12 2s. 11d. This is nearly double the amount collected last year. Of this sum, £6 19s. 7d. have been transmitted to the Treasurer of the Church Society; Collections for Missionary purposes, £1 9s. 6d.; for Widows and Orphans, £1 5s. 10d. The amount raised from pew rents, collections, offertory collections, and subscriptions for local purposes, is £55 17s. 6d., shewing a total for Granby, of £70 15s. 9d. The Incumbent has this year collected from friends at a distance, and expended on the Parsonage in Granby, about  $\pm$  5.

In North Shefford, subscriptions for the building of the Church in this Mission, to the amount of  $\pounds 240$ , were paid last year into the hands of Colonel Savage, Treasurer of the Building Committee. This amount was expended as follows:

Labour has been contributed at Glebe and Parsonage to the value of  $\pounds 14$  5s. Through the exertions of the Rev. G. de C. O'Grady,  $\pounds 8$  10s, were obtained by subscription in Montreal, to procure sedilia, &c., for chancel of St. Paul's Church. Mr. Julius Scriver kindly furnished the timber requisite for these articles, valued at 10s. The offertory collections amounted to  $\pounds 4$  8s. 44d. There were collected at three Stations in the Mission on the day of Thanksgiving,  $\pounds 2$  1s. 4d. Total,  $\pounds 60$  4s. 9d.

On a visit of the Lord Bishop to this Mission, last September, to hold a confirmation, St. Paul's Church, with the burying ground attached, were consecrated.

#### HENRYVILLE.

The Rev. E. DUVENNET writes :— I am happy to report that the attendance upon the services of the Church, in this mission, is slowly but constantly increasing. Some who have never put their foot in the House of God, except on special occasions, are now creeping in, hungry, as it were, for the bread of life, and astonished at their former carelessness and indifference.

The following sufficiently evinces that the people are not altogether indifferent to the services of the Missionary:

In the early part of November, I announced to my people my intention of leaving the mission, and not a little to my surprise the intelligence produced a very general, and very manifest feeling of disappointment; and indeed so strongly was I solicited to remain that I felt constrained, with the Bishop's sanction to do so, notwithstanding I had made arrangements to move to another part of the Diocese, which was more inviting, and where the prospeets of a permanent settlement were of a more pleasing character.

I am happy to add that the disappointment referred to has not expended itself in mere expressions of regret, but that my people have exerted themselves to the utmost, and have promised me 200 dollars, to insure my stay among them.

This action on their part is the more gratifying, as it was wholly unexpected.

Our local wants this year have been so many, that I have felt disinclined to call for any subscriptions towards the general objects of the Society, but another year I hope to be able to make a more encouraging return.

The estimated cost of the building is £1112, including grave-yard fence: to make up this large sum, the residents in the Mission have subscribed about £550. £420 were collected in this Province and the United States, by myself. A substantial wooden side-walk along the whole length of the Church property, at an expense of about £15, was constructed by the Corporation, which, as that body is composed of Roman Catholics, is an act of liberality deserving of honourable mention. The Rector caunot close his report without again expressing his gratitude, and that of the congregation at large, to Miss Amelia Armstrong. and to the other ladies associated with her for their untiring, gratuitous, and highly valued services in the choir.

Rev. H. MONTGOMERY writes :--It is a cause of encouragement and gratitude to God, to be able to state that during the past year, prosperity has attended all the efforts made for the advancement of the interests of the Church on this Mission.

We have succeeded beyond all expectation in getting our Parsonage removed, and the additions and improvements brought to an advanced state towards completion, which will ultimately render it for convenience and permanency second to none in this part of the Diocese.

Our vestry and school-room is also nearly finished. The school is in a prosperous condition, and bids fair to become a blessing to the youth of both sexes who attend it.

To meet this outlay there has been an income of £3796, viz: from the Government for 2 years £1000; Parent Society in England £970; School Fees £250, and private contributions £1579; a large portion of which was contributed for a special purpose in Upper Canada and the United States; the whole income exceeding that of the last year by £1100.

The Model School, which has about 30 Teachers, progresses most satisfactorily and there is an increase in the number of the Society's Schools in this Diocese.

The sum of £2457 10s. is now invested for this fund. The amount added to this fund from all sources during the past year is £409 7s. 3d.



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The annual meeting of this Society was held on Tuesday evening, January, 25th, 1856, at the Mechanics' Hall, which was well filled with a most respectable and attentive audience.

The Lord Bishop took the chair shortly after seven o'clock, and prayer having been offered :--

HIS LORDSHIP, in opening the proceedings of the meeting, said he would not anticipate what was about to be said by other speakers, but confine himself to a very few remarks. The progress made by the Society during the past year was on the whole satisfactory Last year it was made matter of congratulation that there had been a considerable increase in the amount of revenue over that of the previous year, and now they found a farther very satisfactory increase this year. He hoped this indicated the direction in which they would proceed in future years. He had stated last year that he hoped to send two more missionaries out in the year into the destitute settlements, but in consequence of what had happened respecting the Clergy Reserves, he had felt that the funds of the Society would be unable to bear the additional burden. In the present year, however, he hoped they might do so. For this was the great work the Society had to do, to bring light to those who sit in darkness. The people of Britain had, during the past year their feelings deeply interested in the war which was being waged in the East. It had been made matter of reproach to England that she had engaged in war in behalf of a Mahometan nation against another Christian nation, but this was urged by those who did not know the kind of Christianity professed and taught in Russia, and did not consider that the arms of Britain were now opening up a way for the spread of Christianity through Turkey. Already, in Constantinople, steps were being taken to build Churches and commence more vigorously the missionary work. With regard to the Christianity professed in Russia, he would read them something from the narrative of one who had travelled in that country. His Lordship here read from a book in which was a portion of the Catechism of the Russo-Greek Church, in which was shewn that the Czar was held entitled to almost equal worship with the Deity; and another portion of the work shewed how every effort was made to keep the people in ignorance. It was a great

merit claimed by the professors of our religion that our Church did not seek to keep the people in ignorance, but sought their enlightenment, and it was our bounden duty to exert ourselves to carry the Message transmitted to us from our Lord and Saviour to the rest of the world.

The BISHOP then called on the Secretary, the Rev. E. J. ROGERS, who read the Report.

The Venerable Archdeacon Lowza then moved the first Resolution,—That the Report now read be adopted and printed, under the direction of the Secretary.

He recapitulated some of the statements contained in it, and remarked on the increase of the income of the Society, both in the country and in Montreal, In Montreal it had been relatively greater than in the country; but he supposed their country friends would give very good reasons for that, and nothing could be further from his intentions than to make invidious comparisons. He thought the contributions might be much enlarged, and that many who had not had an opportunity to contribute would be glad to do so. should one be afforded them. He particularly called on the more wealthy of the members of the Church to increase their subscriptions. They must do so if anything great was to be done. More was expected of them this year than they had done in the last. He particularly remarked on the increase of income that had arisen from boxes. This amounted to £105. and it was a sum that he did not think would have been collected at all but for the boxes. He contended that this species of collection might be still further increased, and hoped that the number of boxes circulated this year might be doubled. Coming back to the greater amount of contributions from the city than from the country, he stated that he supposed one reason given by their country friends would be, that a large amount had been spent in the country for the building of churches, school-houses, &c. He looked upon the building of churches as very important; indeed, its importance could not be readily over estimated. The exertions of the last year gave reason to hope for more success this year. Much yet remained to be done in the country; and he contended that the avidity with which the teaching of sects-even of doctrines so wild as those of Millerismwere received by some portions of the people, was proof that the teachings of the Church would be well received. The people were anxious to receive religious truth, and that was the reason they seized teachings that bore resemblance to it, which were presented to them in its name. He found hope rather than discouragement from this fact. It was a sign to him that the truth, which was in the possession of the Church, and which had been handed down through all ages, would be well received. The carrying of truth to that portion of the people was to help those who could not help themselves, and its being regarded in that light should make the members of the Church more earnest. Much evil existed that they could not hope to touch, but they should direct their efforts where they could make an impression, and by the blessing of God they might hope for success.

GEORGE MOFFATT, Esq., seconded the motion. He was sorry that some abler person than he had not been appointed to speak to it. The general objects of the Society had been so often stated before, that he did not suppose it was necessary for him to repeat them there. But he would specially refer to one or two points; and first to the education of elergymen. Intellect was not confined to any particular class, and the parents of many of those who would like to study to fit themselves to be clergymen were poor, and had not the necessary means. He mentioned an instance that he was pe sonally acquainted with. A friend of his early in life had lost his father, and when he arrived at such an age as to enter a profession he was very anxious to study for the Church, but as his mother did not possess the means to give him an education fitted for the ministry, he was forced to abandon his views. He came out to this country, where he amassed a competency, and to this day he regrets not having been able to enter the Church. An important object of the Church Society, was to assist in the education of clergymen. Next, with regard to the funds of the Society, he did not think that the increase mentioned in the Report was so much as it ought to have been, nor that the total amount of contributious was so much as ought to be expected from the Churchmen of this Diocese. Estimating the number of members of the Church of Englaud in the Diocese of Montreal at only 20,000 members, (and that was surely a small enough number out of the 45,000 members in Lower Canada belonging to the Church of England, as given in Mr. Hogan's Prize Essay,) at 1d. per week for each, would give £4000 instead of £1037, as mentioned in the Report. From Montreal alone, where, by the last census, the members of the Church of England were put at about 4000, if they had subscribed 1d. per week, the income this year would have been about £800 in place of £500, while last year it was about £326. Was the increase anything to boast of? He had never, he was ashamed to say, taken much interest in the Church Society before, and he did not know that he should have done so, if he had not been asked to second the resolution. He next alluded to the stipends given to Clergymen. These he did not think were sufficient. Some of them did not equal the salaries ordinarily paid to clerks in mercantile houses, and many would turn from them with disdain, if they were offered them. Yet elergymen were expected to maintain themselves res-

pectably on the pittance allowed them, and to clothe themselves well. They were expected too to be men of education; and travelling Missionaries were expected to pay their own expenses. He held that this subject was worthy of serious consideration with the view to reform.

His LORDSHIF put the motion, and it was carried unanimously.

Rev. Canon GILSON moved the next Resolution. It was intended that the Bishop of New York should have done so, and it was much to be regretted that he had been prevented by circumstances from attending that meeting. They could not forget his kind words of encouragement on a former occasion nor his kind words of sympathy with Great Britain's struggle. Living under symap man h "Th

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"That this meeting acknowledges with deep thankfulness the progress of the Missionary work now carried on through the instrumentality of the several branches of the Reformed Church throughout the world, and hails with increasing satisfaction the unity of spirit manifested in their various operations."

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> The resolution made mention of the Missionary work of the Church, and though that was not the present business of this meeting, yet its introduction required no apology. The Church Society was essentially a Missionary Society; the work of the Clergy in Canada was essentially Missionary work. If the Church in Canada had hitherto done but little for foreign Missions, it was because its scanty resources had all been needed at Home. But he hoped the time would come when the Church in Canada would do its part in the Missionary work of the world. It was a good sign that the Church in Canada desired to do its duty. He had great faith in the too commonly much abused maxim, that charity begins at home. He knew it was often used as the cloak of avarice, but he held that that Church was best entitled to be called a Missionary Church which did its duty best at home. That family that best performed all the charities of home, would be the one most likely to render aid when an appeal was made to it. He did not doubt that when his Lordship the Bishop called them to assist in the work of foreign Missions they would cheerfully answer his summons. The resolution spoke of the debt of gratitude they owed to Almighty God for the progress that Missionary work was making throughout the world. There was cause for making that acknowledgement. Let any man take a map of the world, and he could hardly find a country marked down on it, in which the banuer of the cross was not unfurled. Was there not cause for thankfulness to God for that ! He referred particularly to the progress made in New Zealand, and showed how the Gospel had succeeded in doing away with the atrocities that formerly prevailed there. During the last 150 years extraordinary progress had been made for which they ought to be grateful. They ought not to be discouraged at the difficulties that still presented themselves. These should rather stir them up to make more carnest, prayerful efforts, and more selfdenying offerings.

> B. CHAMBERLIN, Esq., said he had great pleasure in seconding the resolution, the greater that after the eloquent speech of the Rev. Canon who preceeded him, he had little left to say. But as he knew his name was not put down on the resolution as its seconder because the name itself would give it any weight, he felt he was expected to say something, no matter how feeble, to urge it upon their attention. He quite agreed with the resolution itself and the remarks of the Rev. mover—that we had much cause for thankfulness that so much good had been done by the missionary spirit of the church generally, yet as Canadians they had much cause for humiliation

that they had contributed so little, absolutely nothing to do so good a work. Like his friend Mr. Moffatt, he had a confession to make, and were it not irreverent to use a passage of Scripture he would say it was well for them to be there. As Mr. Moffatt confessed he should never have taken any interest in the Church Society, if he had not been called upon to second a previous resolution, so he should have gone on making the excuse he had made in previous years that the constant pressure of his daily avocations was such as to leave him no time to read the records of efforts of the Missionary organization of the Church had he not been called upon in like manner. Now he had taken time to read them, and their perusal had caused him mortification when comparing our labors with those of others. He believed the Bishop considered the statement in the census of the Church people in the Diocese at 30,000 as an under estimate. Their contribution to the general fund of the Society was £1000, or, only 8d. per head. Now he found in the Report of that venerable Society, which had been a nursing mother of our Church here, that the congregation at Pictou, not numbering one.man of wealth among them, had contributed 10s. per head in one year. Thus we give one-fifteenth part as much as our brethren in this other Diocese. If we gave at the same rate as they, the Society would have an income of £15,000. But take away half for those parishes which, building churches, parsonages, schools, &c., had no spare funds for the Society, and we have a revenue of £7500. On taking the heads of families at 6000, if each contributed £1 5s. (the sum necessary to constitute a member of the society,) and this would give the same amount. How many heads of families had a less income than \$500 ? and surely a hundreth part of one's income was not too much to contribute to the Church. We should never rest satisfied until we raised the revenue of the Society to the amount named. But it was not alone to be regretted that we did not give enough, as compared with others of our means, but as he read the Reports he had already referred to, he found the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel desired to found other Missions, but could not for lack of means. And why was this ? Why, because we here in Canada, who live so well and dress so well, and drive about in carriages, &c., we are pensioners on her bounty, and absorb a portion of the revenues which should be devoted to other objects. A wider field was being opened up in Turkey. A better opportunity was offered now than ever before in China for Missionary effort. In India, a vast field exists calling for more aid and more laborers. In South Africa, the Bishop of Grahamstown whose diocese extends over the seat of the Kaffir war, desires and is desired by the Governor of the Colony to send out Missionaries among those tribes as a means of civilizing them and inducing them to dwell at peace with the British Colonists. But they cannot do it because we are using the funds needed, in Canada. He blushed, as a Canadian by birth, to think that they were accepting the alms taken from the pockets of many poor people as well as rich in England; people bound down under a heavy burden of taxation, while we are free from it. We talk largely about what a great

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people we are going to be; we talk loudly about taking upon us an independent national existence, yet we consent to receive this charitable allowance from the Mother Country for the support of our Church, which we are so well able to support for ourselves | Nay, we go further, and with singular hypocrisy profess to be charitable. We take a portion of the money thus cent us-and only a portion-out of our pockets, and putting it upon a subscription list for the sick and wounded soldiers in the Crimea, and the widows and orphans of the killed, call upon an admiring world to admire our generosity | He hoped this blot on our fair fame would, ere many years, nay, many months, were passed, be wiped out. Other Dioceses had announced their intention of giving up the grant of the Society, and he had read an account of a clergyman in New Brunswick who had given up half his stipend, and another in Sydney who had given it all up, because they felt it their duty to call upon their own congregations, who were well able to afford it, to support them. These were examples we should ponder upon. He would end as he began,-however much cause they might have for mortification and humiliation at their own short-comings, they had cause for gratitude, as stated in the resolution, that Churchmen generally had done so much in the good cause of Missions.

His LORDSHIP put the motion, and it was carried unanimously.

The Rev. Professor THOMPSON moved the next Resolution, which he read as follows :---

"That this meeting has learned with satisfaction that more systematic efforts have been successfully made in this Diocese, and the city especially, by which the increased demands upon the Society's funds, owing to the commutation of the Clergy Reserves, will be met without delay, and is happy to perceive that the Sister Societies in the Diocese of B. N. America have like cause for thankfulness in an improved condition of their funds."

After some preliminary remarks, which were not distinctly audible to the Reporter, the Rev. gentleman alluded to the peculiarity of the situation of the Church of England in Lower Canada, and the better manner in which it was provided for in Upper Canada. In Lower Canada they were hemmed in by Roman Catholies on one side, and the United States on another, while a considerable portion of the population was so mixed, that it was difficult to bring it within the fold of the Church. He contended that the Church wanted more men to do its work. He next showed at some length the efforts made by Trinity Church of New York, to promote the spiritual welfare of immigrants, and argued that its example might be advantageously followed. He continued to make some general remarks, and concluded by expressing the hope that the Synod to be held the next day might be characterized by Christian charity

Rev. Canon TOWNSEND seconded the Resolution. He felt a degree of humiliation that the efforts made by the country had not equalled those made by Montreal; but even in Montreal it appeared, from the remarks of Messrs Moffatt and Chamberlin, that Churchmen had not done their duty. He nevertheless held that they should be thankful for the contributions that had been made, while they spared no exertions for the future. A collection was then about to be taken up, and, as out of the abundance of the heart the mouth spoke, he hoped that out of the liberality of the heart the hands would give.

The resolution was here put and carried, and a collection taken up, which amounted to £23.

Rev. E. Du VERNET then moved :---

"That the thanks of the meeting be given to the Members of the Central Board, who have kindly assisted in carrying on the work of the Society, and to the Officers for their services during the past year."

He contended that the resolution should receive the hearty support of the meeting for those who gave their time at the least deserved thanks. He next dilated on the importance of Missionary labor. Every member of the Church had a work to do, and should do his duty.

J. ARMSTRONG, Esq., seconded the motion. In reference to remarks that had been made that evening that the members of the Church had not contributed enough, he still thought it right to say that they had done a great deal. It must be remembered that a great deal of money had been spent in building Churches and Personages. It had been stated that the members of the Church in the Diocese numbered 30,000; but it must be remembered that many of those were unable to contribute much. Many of them lived in sparsely settled portions of the country, which were not very favorable for farming operations. He expressed hearty concurrence in the remarks made by the gentleman who bore the honored name of Moffett in reference to the scanty stipends allowed to elergymen. Many of them were expected to live like gentlemen on £100 a.year; and they were generally the first applied to for charity.

The Bisnor having left the Chair the Hon. George MOFFATT was called to it; and the Rev. Mr. Davidson moved a vote of thanks to his Lordship for his kindness in presiding on the occasion. He stated that in leaving the Methodists to take orders in the Church, he had not found it necessary to change his theological doctrines. He showed how closely connected great Methodist authorities, from Wesley downwards, were with the Church of England. The Wesleyan Ministers of British America he described as a laborious and self-denying set of men, who reached a class of mind in the country that others might fail to do. In reference to the gentlemen mentioned by Mr. Moffatt as having amassed a fortune, who was too poor to study for the Church in his youth, he stated that he hoped he would give an earnest of his youthful predilection, by now making a handsome donation to the Society. In reference to the subject of his resolution the Rev. gentleman expressed his high sense of admiration for the Bishop, and his fitness for all places, and oceasions.

The Rev. Canon LEACH seconded the Resolution which was carried unanimously amid cheering.

His Lordship expressed thanks for the manner in which his name had, been received; and took the occasion further to say, that after what he had

heard that evening he felt something like Clive on his return from India who, although he had brought with him great wealth, when he was reproached for the manner in which he had obtained it, expressed astonishment at his moderation when he reflected on what he had left behind. When he heard Messrs. Moffatt and Chamberlin state the great sums that ought to be received from the Society, he felt surprised at his own moderation in only asking for £1500 last year, which, however, had not been obtained He would be content first to obtain that sum before he asked for more. The statements made by Messrs Moffatt and Chamberlain were worthy of all consideration. They were made by clear headed men, engaged in business pursuits, and he might add, he believed of good heart too, who he \* knew had taken time in the midst of their daily and busy avocations to examine the subject on which they spoke. He thus laid stress on their statements, because it was too much the habit to take those of Clergymen as a matter of course. He hoped others would follow their example and examine for themselves.

After further remarks The Lord Bishop pronounced the benediction, and the meeting separated.

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#### REPORT OF THE WIDOW'S AND ORPHANS' FUND COMMITTEE.

This Committee has the pleasure of reporting that the financial state of the W. and O. Fund is in a prosperous condition, as will appear from the General Report, presented at the recent Annual Meeting of the Church Society. (See Report, page 18.)

The continued prosperity of this fund, and its ultimate success pursuant to the principle laid down as its basis, namely, the funding of its receipts at compound interest, will depend mainly on the punctual fulfilment of the obligations of those entrusted with the collection of its funds, and the careful investment, without delay, of the funds by this Committee.

It is also with pleasure that your Committee are enabled to state that its principle has met with the *almost* unanimous support of the Clergy of the Dioecse, as will be manifested by the following recapitulation;

In 1854 out of 52 Clergymen entitled to participate in its benefits, 47 became contributors.

In 1855 out of 54 Clergymen entitled to participate in its benefits, 50 became contributors; leaving a deficiency of 4 to complete the un nimity—of these four, two only have decidedly declined, and the final determination of the other two is not yet known.

With reference to the payment of the contributions imposed on the Clergy by the 3rd clause of the By-law, your Committee respectfully suggest that each Clergyman should only be called upon to pay on his reception or admisson into the Diocese, in proportion to the period of the year to expire after such admission.

Your Committee in conclusion, earnestly call the attention of the Clergy coming within the purview of the 7th section of the By-law, to report to this Committee accordingly, on the principle, that unless all the available means placed at its disposal be made the most of, the great object of the By-law will not be attained.
