

The total number of persons admitted since the opening of the institution in June, 1888, is 250, of whom 58 have died in the Home. Thirty-seven of the latter number were buried in the Home cemetery, 15 were removed by friends, and 5 claimed by the School of Anatomy, Toronto.

The number of meals furnished prisoners employed in extra work on the farm was 764, equivalent to at least 254 days' board or 36 2.7 weeks' board, and increasing the number of weeks' board for inmates to 2641 4-7.

- The costs in Division Court suits are not generally more than one-fifth of the costs incurred in a suit for a similar amount in a higher court.
- 2. The same judge presides in Division Courts as in County Courts,

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- 3. A jury may be had in the Division Court if demanded by either the plaintiff or the defendant.
- 4. Division Courts are held in different places in the County, thereby saving time, travel and expense to all persons attending court.
 - 5. It is the only court that is self sustaining.

For these among other reasons your Memorialists respectfully pray that you will be pleased to cause the jurisdiction of the Division Court to be enlarged so that the amounts specified in Section 70 of Chapter 51, R. S. O., Sub-Section (a) shall be increased from \$60 to 5100; in Sub-Section (b) shall be increased from 5100 to 5200; and in Sub-Section (c) shall be increased from \$200 to \$400.





DEAR SIR,-

I would most respectfully request you to consider and lay before your Council the following facts, and request them to consider the same with a view to remunerating me for a large amount of work performed by me for which I have received no remuneration.

In 1892 your Council appointed a constable to take charge of

the vagrants who visited this vicinity. I was also requested at the time to avoid as much as possible dealing with these cases at the instance of other constables, which request I have endeavored to comply with. In the following statement I have only given the number of cases dealt with by me at the instance of the constable appointed as stated. I have also dealt with a large number of cases when vagrants were arrested outside this neighborhood by other county constables, but I do not purpose asking any remuneration in those cases unless the Council should deem it proper to consider them with the others.

The Memorial of the Municipal Council of the County of.....

HUMBLY SHEWETH:

That the loss to the farmers in the Province of Ontario caused by sheep being worried by dogs is very great, so much so that many farmers residing near cities, towns and villages have been forced to quit sheep husbandry; the mischief being done at night, it is seldom possible to trace it to the owners of the dogs, and in most instances when traced nothing can be collected. The Act for the Protection of Sheep thus bearing unjustly on the rural municipalities, inasmuch as they have to pay for a great number of sheep worried by dogs harbored in cities, towns and villages.

And whereas sheep husbandry in many parts of the Province would be one of the most lucrative branches of farming, if it were not for the great loss sustained by the destruction of sheep by dogs principally harbored in the cities, towns and villages throughout the Province.

Therefore your Memorialists pray that your Honorable Body will amend the Act to impose a tax on dogs for the protection of sheep, so as to form a county fund for the payment of losses caused by dogs worrying or killing sheep, by enacting that every dog in the Province shall be taxed.........dollars and every bitch.......... dollars, one moiety of said tax to be paid to the treasurer of the municipality in which the said tax is collected for the use of the municipality, the other moiety to be paid to the County Treasurer of the county in which the municipality lies, to form a county fund for the payment of losses caused by the damages done to sheep by dogs.

That all losses caused by the worrying of sheep by dogs be paid in the first instance by the municipality in which the losses were sustained in accordance with the Act at present in force, and that said

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NG, : Co. Kent. municipality be reinbursed by the County Treasurer on the receipt of an order from the head of the municipality that the amount has been paid by the treasurer of their municipality.

That if the County Fund so held by the County Treasurer should increase so as to exceed thousand dollars, the excess shall be refunded to the municipalities contributing to the fund pro rata as paid by them to the fund. . Just bound will ever D

FROM COUNTY OF GREY RE TO EXTEND THE JURIS-DICTION OF DIVISION COURTS.

Will you kindly lay the matter before your County Council at its January Session; and I will be obliged if you will send me a postal card stating what action was taken by your Council in the matter.

To the Honorable the Legislative Assembly of the Province of Ontario:

The Memorial of the County Council of the County of....... in Council assembled,

RESPECTFULLY SHEWETH,-

That in the opinion of your Memorialists the jurisdiction and powers of the Division Court might, with great advantage to the general public, especially to those having recourse to it for the collection of debts, be considerably enlarged, and principally for the following reasons:

- 1. The costs in Division Court suits are not generally more than one-fifth of the costs incurred in a suit for a similar amount in a higher Court.
- 2. The same judge presides in Division Court as in County Court.
- 3. A jury may be had in the Division Court if demanded by either the plaintiff or the defendant.

- 4. Division Courts are held in different places in the County, thereby saving time, travel and expense to all persons attending Court.
 - 5. It is the only Court that is self sustaining.

For these among other reasons your memorialists respectfully pray that you will be pleased to cause the jurisdiction of the Division Court to be enlarged so that the amounts specified in Section 70 of Chapter 51, R. S. O., Sub-Section (a) shall be increased from \$60 to \$100; in Sub-Section (b) shall be increased from \$100 to \$200; and in Sub-Section (c) shall be increased from \$200 to \$400.
