

YORK COUNTY'S WEALTH. Some Figures Which Will Be of terest Just Now.

Some figures compiled by the agricul-tural department of Ontario will be found some figures compiled by the agricultural department of Ontario will be found of interest.

York County has 20,000 horses with an approximate value of 33,500,000.

There are over 30,000 mileh cows in the county, and the value is placed at \$1,500,000.

Other cattle than mileh cows number 30,000, with a value placed at \$783,000. The total value of all live stock in the county is placed at \$2,522,000.

In all last year there were 35,755 acres of summer fallow and \$3,000 acres of pasture land. There were 11,584 acres given up to silo corn, yielding about 137,000 tons of green fodder worth 350,000.

The year 1912 was a pretty bad one for the mangold wurtsel crop, but the 5600 odd acres planted to this crop yielded some 2,300,000 bushels, valued at \$181,570. Good judges, however, place the yield and mated value of the two last named crops as far too low.

The market value of 129,214 tons of hay and clover grown on 46,000 acres was \$1,856,000.

Mr. Rowell's amendment cropped up when the premier's bill regarding the extension of Ontario's limits was under discussion in committee. It said that the Ontario boundary should con-tinue due north to a point five miles north of the Nelson River, from the most northerly point of the western boundary of the province, then five miles easterly from the westerly shore of the Hudson Bay and then five miles southerly along the shore of Hudson and James Bay to the present bound-

"This amendment is for the purpose of establishing a Hudson Bay port in the province," said Mr. Rowell. "It gives us the Nelson River and all territory lying on this side."

"H is a very amiable proposition," said Sir James. "Just the mere matter of taking property belonging to other

persons." (Laughter.)
Mr. Rowell had said that it would fall upon the government to extend its railway before it could take over the five mile strip of land which was granted by the federal government. To this the premier replied that the land became the absolute property of the province irrespective of whether the rallway was built there or not.

It may be the railway.



Over-speculation and its attendant over-inflation, coupled with the withdrawals of French capital from Germany, caused coupled with the withdrawals of French capital from Germany, caused the stringency, which was reflected thruout all Europe.
