Apples to Hydro Commission for Current
Wins Out—Then Throws Victory Away

Amazing Situation Develops in
Connection With Attempt of
Private Company to Prevent
People Securing Supply of
Electrical Energy.

The mayor and the corporation of Ottawa are under the limelight. The proceedings yesterday before the hydro-electric commission at Toronto were, to say the least, peculiar. It was an ostensible contest between the city and the Ottawa Electric Company. Nobody was hurt, and the query now is, why did the City of Ottawa, appeal to the commission for relief and then apparently run away as soon as relief was sighted? The proposed "compromise" by which the municipal plant enters a combine or trust to furnish high priced power to its customers for a term of years, is certainly without a parallel. There is an effort to avoid the benefits of the Electrical Energy Act of 1906. It looks like a betrayal of popular rights that fairly staggers one by its audacity. But comment is superfluous; the facts are eloquent.

Municipal Plant.
The City of Ottawa has its municipal plant, and develops and distributes electrical power. It has a competitor in the Ottawa Electric Company. Some time ago the city undertook to buy additional power (500 horse-power per annum) from a concern that utilizes the energy from Chaudiere Falls, for convenience, this concern will be hereafter referred to as the Hull company.

The Ottawa Electric Company engaged the city in buying this power, and won the first round in the courts. The matter is now pending on appeal. To avoid this, the city applied to the hydro-electric commission to furnish it with electrical power. There is nothing to prevent the commission from obtaining power from the Hull company and selling it at cost to the city. The Electric Company, realising what this meant, asked to be heard. Yesterday the whole matter came up for hearing before the commission at Toronto. The city, the Electric Company and the Hull company were all represented.

Fear Cheap Power.
Hon. Adam Beck, chairman of the commission, asked the Electric Company to state why the city should not be granted the power. The reply was that the city might charge a low price for power, as it is a private company out of the business. No other objection was stated.

Groundless Fears.
The commission then pointed out that there were no groundless fears. The case is foreseen and guarded against by the statute. Section 19 of the act creating the hydro-electric commission provides:

"Upon the complaint in writing of any municipal corporation, company or person that any municipal corporation, company or person receiving power from the commission under a contract as herebefore mentioned is charging for supplying electricity or heating or lighting or electric power or energy at a rate which is excessive or unfair, or that any municipal corporation is making use of the power conferred upon it by this act for the purpose of granting bonuses by supplying power, light or heat below cost to manufacturers or others the chairman of the commission may appoint a time and place at which the commission or some member thereof will hear and determine the matter in dispute."

The electric company could not reply to this sweeping answer to its objection, but also Mayor Ellis filed a formal request for estimate of cost of power, there is reason to believe that nothing will be done by the city to utilize the power which could be obtained for it by the provincial commission within a few days time.

On the contrary, the city and company united in saying that a compromise would likely be reached between them by which the COMPANY WOULD ABANDON ITS INJUNCTION SUIT, AND THE CITY WOULD BIND ITSELF TO CHARGE A FIXED PRICE FOR A TERM OF YEARS; AN IRREDUCIBLE MINIMUM.

Carpeneters Are Jubilant
Many Workers Join Union

Over 1600 Are on Strike, But Bosses Say They Have No Trouble Getting Men—Contractors May Form Exchange and Give In to Men's Demands.

Over sixteen hundred carpenters in this city are on strike. It is estimated that between seven and eight hundred carpenters worked yesterday. The strikers say that they cannot imagine where the bosses are going to get men. One thousand horsepower will be needed at once, and more hereafter. This is the third application of the kind to be received by the commission.

RUSSELL READY TO SETTLE
ASKS FOR ARBITRATION
If He Can Adjust Difference With Mr. Greenfields Will Give \$50,000 to Hospital.

Montreal, Aug. 9.—(Special.)—David Russell has given out the following statement re his dispute with J. N. Greenfields:

"A dispute has arisen respecting the ownership of 157,000 acres of land, situated in the Saskatchewan Valley. The government has given title to these lands to Messrs. Mackenzie, Mann and Ross in consequence of representations made by them to the minister of the interior dated June 19, 1906, and signed by Mr. J. N. Greenfields. Mr. Greenfields has stated that he did not know the word 'subsequent' was embodied in this letter. The government, acting on this letter, gave title to lands subsequent to December 31, 1906, but the authority of Mr. Greenfields (which I obtained for him from the G.W.A.P. office, Lorne Lake, and Saskatchewan Railway and Steamboat Company), gave him power to deal only with lands selected prior to December 31, 1906. The government, in its proceedings, as I believe, to do any injustice to the company which I represent, by acting on this letter, entitled to less than my company of over one million dollars. I have no doubt as to the ultimate result of my claims in a court of justice. I have no doubt as to the incident to that course of action are such that I am willing to settle our differences in a more summary manner. Having in view the amount involved, I have retained the following eminent counsel: Hon. F. L. Belue, Hon. A. Blair, Hon. E. S. Hughes, Messrs. Albert J. Brown, K. C., Robert C. Smith, K. C. and C. S. Campbell, K. C., and have set aside the sum of \$50,000 for court costs and counsel fees. If, however, Messrs. Mackenzie, Mann & Company will agree to an immediate arbitration, I will donate this sum of \$50,000 to the Montreal General Hospital. I would be willing to accept any three of the following gentlemen as arbitrators: E. E. Johnson, E. S. Clouston, Sir George A. Drummond, Chas. M. Hays, H. S. Holt, Chas. R. Hosmer, Hon. Robert Mackay, Sir Wm. C. McDonald, Robert McPherson, E. Sikeman, Sir Wm. C. Van Horne."

A mail bag containing important mail, including one registered letter, was destroyed. The cause of the fire is as yet unknown.

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

Closing Rally Witnessed at New York—Weakness Exhibited in Domestic Issues.

TO CLEAR CONTRACT TANGLE COUNCIL TO MEET AUG. 22

Mayor Goes to Halifax to Attend Municipal Union—Matters at the City Hall.

The special meeting of the city council to deal chiefly with the tangle over the tenders for water mains belonging to the pressure system will be held on Aug. 22 or 23, not on Aug. 20, as had been announced. The mayor, who, with Controller Ward and the city engineer, will leave for Halifax to-day to attend the convention of the Canadian Municipal Association, expects to return on the 20th inst., but he said last night that it would be necessary to hold a meeting of the board of control before council was called together. Several other matters will come up at this meeting, including the terms of agreement for the extension of the Avenue Road line by the street railway, which were to have been submitted yesterday, but were delayed.

Mayor Longworth expresses regret at being called away from the city at a time when an important issue has sprung up between the carpenters of the city and their employers.

Will Sue the Railway.
It was definitely decided by the board of control yesterday to sue the street railway company for damages done water mains by electrolysis, and to order measures taken to prevent further damage. General Manager Fleming says the company will take reasonable steps to stop the damage if found to be caused by the railways wires.

Kissed Mayor's Hand.
Somehow emotional scenes attended the waiting upon the board of control yesterday of a deputation of 150 Jewish junk pedlars to protest against the cutting off of a license for the storage of rags at 108-110 PEARL-STREET. There were present also a number of wholesale rag dealers, and a heated discussion took place, the pedlars asserting with many gesticulations that the wholesalers were trying to force the independent storage out of business in order to control the market for themselves.

A joyous tumult followed the assent of the mayor that the case of the pedlars would be treated on its merits, his worship's hand being seized and fervently kissed by one of the spokesmen in a transport of feeling.

\$15,000 for Roadways.
An additional appropriation of \$15,000 for roadways has been asked of the board of control by the acting city engineer, who will supply a statement of the number of roadways requiring repairs, with the cost in each case.

The Zoo at Riverdale Park has been added to by five baby raccoons, the litter being discovered by Charles Carter yesterday morning.

Commissioner of Industries Joseph Thompson will have as his headquarters the offices on the city hall main floor, east side, formerly occupied by the property department.

To Ask Power Commission.
The Ontario power commission will be asked to give prices for power on the basis of the city's taking 30,000 horse-power, the city engineer's recommendation being yesterday adopted by the board of control.

The city architect and Ald. Fleming, chairman of the grounds committee of the exhibition association, will go to St. Louis to inspect an iron building, 700 feet long by 170 feet wide, with a view to having it transported to Toronto if found worth while for use as an arena. The structure is one of the exposition buildings, and can be had for scrap iron prices.

In redecorating the mayor's office \$1500 will be spent, Elliott & Sons having been granted the contract at that figure.

HE NEVER TALKED BUSINESS, YE CAUSED CATAWBA BOOM IN LONDON.

Nicholas Longworth has shown us that a man may be both an ideal husband and a most excellent man of business. The woman all were charmed with the self-effacing devotion he displayed for "Princess Alice," being seemingly quite content with the obsequious adulation piled full upon the president's daughter.

And now it is the men's turn to confess their admiration for the skill and ingenuity he has shown. Everybody in America knows that he is a large owner of Catwaba wine. That is a variety of the grape product which has been practically unknown here. But for the fact that he declined to remain in ignorance of it, how he managed it is his own secret, but it is certain that soon after the King met him his majesty ordered several cases of the Longworth brand of sparkling Catwaba. The King's physician, Dr. Francis and Fleming, pronounced a highly scientific benediction upon it. That counts for a great deal, about the same time, in some mysterious fashion, the managers of several of the big London hotels awakened to the discovery that they had been grossly negligent in failing to place Catwaba on their wine lists. Sir Thomas Lipton has been made positively great deal of comment, and every one is asking, "What has brought them?" They are there solely on business which the Duchess is arranging. There never has been known among duchesses such a business woman as her grace. It must be an inheritance from her Christiania family. Her powers of persuasion, her diplomacy and her tact, prove irresistible with everyone she touches.

The house the duke and duchess are living in is in unfashionable South Kensington, a commodious mansion enough, and Queen's-gate. They decided to take a large house, as the duchess would have all her children with her, but they have no intention of entertaining for Constance, Duchess of Manchester, has put her foot down, as she can do, and says "King," who is the duke, is to pay every penny of his debts before he spends any more money. This is a sentiment in which the young duchess quite concurs.

The Manchesters' town house used to be in Great Stanhope-street, which runs off the Piccadilly end of Park Lane, a perfect position, the residence was an ordinary one enclosed by a garden. The Duchess of Chester, called it "a miserable little hole," and refused to live in it. It was sold some years ago and says "King," who is the duke, has had no town house.

Astor's Costly Concert.
William Waldorf Astor's two private concerts this season at his magnificent town residence in Carlton-terrace surpassed all his previous efforts in his per form of entertainment. It is a fact that he paid Paderewski \$10,000 for his services. In the first instance the pianist charged \$5,000, and a second offer of \$7,500 he also rejected, but a raise of another \$2,500 convinced the American composer, who told me the story expressed it. As an additional inducement a suite of apartments was offered to him.

But, despite the great consideration shown him, the chrysanthemum haired professor declined to mingle with the guests, and retired to his rooms after playing. Princess Louise, the only member of royalty who is on anything like the same terms with the ex-American multi-millionaire, was exceedingly anxious to make Paderewski's acquaintance, but it was a case of Mohammed going to the mountain. She had to go upstairs to meet him after the second concert. It was an almost unheard-of concession on the part of a princess of the blood royal, but in these days genius can exact homage even from the most exalted rank.

Cannot Understand Object.
The host, who was wretched health, received his guests seated in a chair at the entrance of the great ball room, where the entertainment was to be held. The ple wondered why on earth he should go to the trouble of giving two such costly entertainments to a lot of people for whom he cared nothing, and who certainly have no liking for him, when anyone could see with half an eye he was unacceptably bored himself. But he appears to regard it as a sacred duty each June or July to give his London palace for two nights with a host of swell folk whom he scarcely ever sees on these occasions.

The invitations to both concerts are invariably issued on the one card, and, year in and year out the same persons come. Contrary to the usual custom, the names of the distinguished performers are never included in the invitations. But his guests know that they will be treated to the best the market affords. Each concert cost him some \$10,000. The duke and duchess, two finish up Mr. Astor's entertaining for the year. His duty to society he regards as fulfilled. And society, for its part, is well content to leave him severely alone.

A REAL RAFFLES.

A young, sprucely-attired, and well-educated man, who was recently sentenced to the Clerkenwell sessions to two years hard labor in the name of Henry Lewis, is one of the most remarkable criminals who have come under the notice of the English police in recent years.

Barely 25 years old, he has, single-handed, caused more burglary scares than many hardened thieves twice his age.

On a previous occasion—in October, 1904—this young fellow was ordered a year's imprisonment in the name of Monks. His real name is neither Monks nor Lewis, but that of a well-known and highly-respected inhabitant of Kilburn, by whom he was given a good college education, and who subsequently secured for him an excellent situation in an accountant's office. The young man's first conviction was in connection with a number of mysterious burglaries in Hampstead, Kilburn, and the Westbourne Park district. For months the detectives were baffled, the reason being that "Lewis" invariably worked at night, selected only the most valuable and easily portable goods, and disposed of them immediately in the pawnbrokers' establishments opened on the following morning, and before the police had been notified of the robberies. Moreover, during the whole of the time the mysterious robberies were going on he was working assiduously during the daytime in his office.
