Ottawa, Nov. 23.—(Special.)—Little present appearance there is little prospect of the Postmaster-General according to the request of the Montreal and other Boards of Trade for a reduction of the internal postage rate to two cents. Officers of the department have come to the conclusion that if penny postage were instituted it would swell the deficits of the department by about three-quarters of a million, or a million and a half at the most, for the year when the United States Government adopted the two cent rate to a deficit amounting last year to over \$9,000,000. The United States Government officials thought a reduction in the cost of postage would be met by a corresponding increase in correspondence, but it seems that they were mistaken in this calculation. Even if the country had not reached the maximum amount of letter writing, because people could send three letters at the former cost of two, it has not followed that three letters have been written. There has been no corresponding increase in the amount of letter writing thus.
