

INVESTIGATING THE FIRE

Committee at the City Hall Com- menced an Inquiry Yesterday Afternoon.

CHARGES AGAINST THE BRIGADE

Mayor Shaw Tells What He Saw at the Bay-street Fire—Inefficiency Alleged.

The principal business at the City Hall yesterday was a discussion that lasted two hours and a half on the organization or rather disorganization of the Toronto Fire Brigade. The topic arose out of the recent fire on Bay-street, at which, owing to the absence of a 65-foot ladder, a woman had to jump from a third story window and sustained serious injuries.

There were present: Ald. Frankland, chairman; the Mayor, Ald. Hubbard, Sheppard, Dunn, Lynd, Davies, the Assessment Commissioner, the Chief of Fire, Ald. Lennox, Ald. Spence, Chief Graham and a number of interested citizens.

To Keep Up Its Prestige. It was first agreed that the Fire Brigade shall, as in former years, take part in the Labor Day parade. The necessary expenditure for decoration and music will be provided. Due provision will also be made for the Provincial Volunteer Firemen's Association, which meets in this city Aug. 30 and 31.

Complaints of Inefficiency. Chairman Frankland said he understood that the Mayor wished to make a statement in the public interest as to the inefficient conduct of the brigade at the recent Bay-street fire.

The chairman: Is this the first time you have heard complaints on this line? The Mayor: I have heard many complaints. Now is the time for the committee to deal with the matter.

His Worship's Statement. The Mayor then, in almost judicial tones, told what he saw of the Bay-street fire. Instead of system and order, there was confusion. It was more like a refracting army than an attacking force. There was delay in getting to work. There was no ladder of sufficient length to reach the woman who was in danger of being burned to death. Another Eye Witness. W. Wood of the Canadian Loan Agency wrote that two essential points had been neglected by the brigade: There were no ladders over 30 feet, and no nets for saving life. This seemed outrageous for a supposedly well-equipped brigade. But for a borrowed mattress, the young woman, cut off by the flames, would have lost her life.

Something Radically Wrong. Ald. Lynd, who read the above letter, commended His Worship for bringing the matter before the committee. "Apart from what has appeared in all the papers," said the alderman, "I have myself repeatedly heard complaints of the same nature." This is unfortunate alike for the brigade and the citizens. There must be something radically wrong with the management. If it is the fault of the chief, he should send in his resignation.

The Principle Defective. Ald. Sheppard said that when he was chairman of the brigade he had advised the purchase of 65-foot ladders; but the Board of Control in its economy struck out the item. The whole principle of the brigade is wrong, and the force should be reorganized. The brigade should be governed by a fire marshal, who should be a person of high character, and who is subject to the same influences as every other official. Still he would prefer the chairman to have full power for the committee was subject to outside influences. There have been cases where men have been retained in the brigade whose services would have been dispensed with but for this outside pressure.

Injurious Factions. There are, continued the alderman, factions in the fire brigade which militate against its efficiency. The only cure is to have an independent head, and this should be done once if its efficiency is to be secured. The spirit of faction should be suppressed.

Ald. Dunn concurred. He told of the lack of system and discipline. "There certainly was a deficiency of duty in not having sufficient life-saving appliances at the scene of the fire in two minutes. The authorities were to blame in not seeing that worksheds and large buildings had adequate fire escapes.

The Fireman's Statement. Mr. Sweetman of the Bay-street section, who had charge of the fire, told how the brigade were hampered by the crowd. He told of the rescue of the women in preference to fighting the fire, and maintained that nothing was left undone as far as the fireman's opportunities and appliances were concerned.

Ald. Dunn said the aerial truck from Lombard-street ought to have been on the scene of the fire in two minutes. The aerial truck, too, were to blame in not seeing that worksheds and large buildings had adequate fire escapes.

The electrician here explained that it was a bell alarm followed by telephone message, and not a general alarm that was sent to the firemen. The chief of the brigade should have more information before coming to a decision.

Recommendations Disregarded. Ald. Sheppard: The chief has time and again recommended a light aerial truck which would have been the very thing wanted at this fire.

The Mayor: The city has given freely of its money for the brigade. The chief should lose no more time, but again apply for a light aerial truck or ladders of suitable length.

Ald. Davies said the committee needed more evidence.

Hook and Ladder Trucks No Use. The chairman said Deputy Chief Thompson was in charge at this fire. He told the chairman that if any one said the fire was not properly handled it was telling an untruth.
