WOMAN'S WORLD BY KATHERINE LESLIE

Have you ever noticed the perfect genius some people have for making parcels? The article large or small that has to be "done up," such folk make a parcel that is a work of art and the despair of those who are constitutionally unable to go and do like wise. These are the people who always keep the laundry paper and string neatly folded away, and when a bit of presentable wrapping paper is wanted, behold it ready for use the very thing! How satisfactorily they set to work! How all the little ends and corners are tucked neatly away out of sight, how carefully the string adjusted—how shapely and presentable the parcel! But our parcels, bless you! what horrors they are! Any old thing in the shape of a newspaper does for our bundles, and a reel of cotton, or a yard or two from the darned ball, will serve as string. I have seen a woman, who was noted for her neatness, actually break into beads of horrified perspiration as I handed her some article painfully parcelled up by my own hands for her to carry home with her. Her eyes flashed and she refused the article in question, but well I knew that, once out of my sight, she was busy engaged in making it into a parcel of beauty. This defiance and neatness in making parcels is a gift—it runs in families; in short, the parcel maker is born, not made. The infantile member of a family I know shows the same instinctive knack, making up a tiny parcel as her parents, while I have made it a life study and yet find myself utterly incapable of making a presentable bundle. If I have to carry a thing into town, I have to pick it up a dozen times by the way, because it simply refuses to remain enclosed in the paper! My papers always burst at inopportune moments, or the string—unless I use yards of it—loosens and slips off, so that all the world knows that I am taking gloves to be cleaned or shoes to the cobblers. It is very vexatious.

Some there are who, all unwitting, not only parcel badly, but they enhance their efforts by the quantity of string they use necessary to hold the thing together. Only this summer I watched a man do up an overcoat for the post, and I perceived that, he could paint the most ravishing picture, he was to me a brother in stupidity. He folded the coat in a fashion to raise in horror the hair of the owner, then proceeded to wind it about with papers of all shades and colors. The thing began to bulge and burst at first a pink evening edition paper was partially covered with some common brown stuff; then some light yellow was employed to cover an end, and finally a monster whiter-brown covered all. He then proceeded to search the studio for string, and, after strange mutterings in Italian and French, with an occasional monosyllabic English expletive, interlocked between whites, he succeeded in finding some of the pulley ropes that had been attached to the roof blinds. These he knotted together and proceeded to tie about the overcoat. His design was evidently to secure the overcoat so that it might not escape thru any efforts of its own! Yard after yard was wound around, across, up and down, and from corner to corner, until the thing was so tight that the string crossed in the center, till the parcel began to assume the appearance of a monster star fish. I watched the thing, fascinated, marvelling at the appearance of the overcoat when its owner had succeeded in unwinding the miles of rope the artist was using. Let me explain, in parenthesis, that it was an ultra-sterile friend had lent him to come up to town in the late of night, and he was returning. It was to be sent back by the return boat, hence the speed, the coat was working! Well, the rope-winding went on, deep dimes were made all round by the tightness of the winding, and the bulging parts rapidly became points, till, as I said, the miser soon became transformed into a great fat star fish. At the moment of completion, when the artist had tied a knot that would have held a lake steamer at its moorings, his wife entered, and, after gazing perplexedly at the bundle, naturally asked: "What is that dreadful looking thing?" To which the man replied promptly, "It's—'s overcoat." "Good Heavens!" was all the lady said, but in a trice she had the ropes cut away, the papers consigned to the ash heap, the overcoat carefully smoothed out and properly folded, and the brown paper carefully wrapped about it, and exactly two yards of thin cord tied together. We, the artist and I watched her deft little white hands at work, he from the kindlier shelter of clouds of tobacco smoke. I in admiring silence, till an oblong parcel of perfect smoothness and neatness was evolved out of the more picturesque state-to-the-overcoat. She then turned to me, and my admiration was with the lady; my sympathies were with the artist, for I could not have made even a starfish out of so bulky a bundle! Was he not a brother in stupidity?
