USE OLD GENERAL AS BASE HOSPITAL

City Council Turn Over Building to the Military Authorities. PASS HYDRO BYLAW

Ask York Township to Refuse Application of Suburban Railway.

Several times during the discussion at yesterday's meeting of the city council, on the board of control's recommendation that the city take over the old General Hospital on Gerrard street, as an annual rental of \$10,000, and turn it over to the military authorities for use as a base hospital, it appeared that endorsement would not be made.

Control's Board had the opposition against the recommendation, and claimed the responsibility in this matter. He did not think that the city should stand for the liability as well as the deficits of the Toronto General Hospital board.

Dead Asset, Said Mayor. Mayor Church members' attention to the fact that the Dominion Government had been besieged with deputations from other towns in Ontario, who offered the free use of their public buildings for military purposes.

W. Badly Managed. Alderman Maguire maintained that the General Hospital Board had been guilty of bad business management. He thought that after the assistance given them in connection with the new hospital, the liberal contributions of the citizens, the grants by the council, the least they could have done would have been to let the old building be sold.

Excellent Recommendation. Alderman Bell referred to the sentimental and business ends of the question. In connection with the former, he said that half the soldiers for military district No. 2 belonged to Toronto, and it was only fair for the city to look after their hospital requirements.

In Temperance Cause. A few members of the council were entertained by Ald. Maguire, Beamish, Graham, Ramsey and McBride, who debated the question, "Are tea-rooms conducive to public welfare?"

would advance the cause of temperance. He pointed out that when prohibition was enforced the demand for tea would increase considerably, and the temptation of the young to drinking was a thing to be encouraged. The whole debate resulted from the introduction of a by-law establishing a tea-room at 288 Bloor street east, and it was finally carried, when Ald. McBride withdrew his objection.

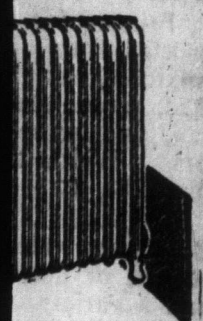

Vegetables as Good as Medicine

The modern tendency seems to be very much against medicines and drugs of all kinds—especially with people who have naturally good constitutions themselves; they go rather too far in their wholesale condemnation of them for those less healthy built.

The time of day when fruit is taken—when needed as a laxative especially—is important. Everyone remembers the old adage about fruit being "golden in the morning, silver in the afternoon and lead at night"; the wise afternoon and lead at night; the wise shall not all necessarily agree with the implied admonition to eschew fruit at the end of the day.

Beans are much more digestible cooked than in their natural condition; this is because of the raw starch they contain. Babies may eat them baked, but ought not to touch them when raw.

Black currants have a great household reputation as a remedy for colds and coughs. When used for this purpose a couple of teaspoonsful of black currant jam are put into a tumblerful of hot water, with a pinch of salt, and drunk hot at bedtime.

Raisins Stave Off Hunger. Raisins, while not in a sense indigestible, may be used even by dyspeptics under certain conditions, as a few of them will stave off hunger in a twinkling and give the stomach a chance to get to work on them.

Fireproof Clothing. To protect children against accidents from fire an excellent plan is to soak their clothing for five minutes in a solution of one pound of ammonium phosphate in a gallon of cold water.

Four Selected Recipes

Tomato Soup. Take two pounds of tomatoes, a quart of weak stock, an ounce of crushed tapioca, two ounces of fat bacon or ham, half an onion, and seasoning. Place the stock in a saucepan, and when it has boiled sprinkle in the crushed tapioca.

Honey Gingerbread. One pound of flour, half a pound of honey, a quarter of an ounce of ammonia, a quarter of a pound of brown sugar, a quarter of a pound of lard, half an ounce of ground ginger, a quarter of an ounce of mixed spice, three ounces of fine cut peel.

Pork Pudding. To make a cheap, but good, take one pound and a half of fresh pork, four onions, one pound of apples, half a pound of suet, one pound of flour, salt and pepper.

Potato Croquettes. These take more trouble than ordinary boiled potatoes, but the result is worth it, especially as they may be kept hot a long time without spoiling, which is not the case with ordinary potatoes.
