



## ANNUAL MEETING.

The Twentieth Annual General Meeting of the Diocesan Church Society was held in St. Paul's Schoolroom Charlottetown, on Wednesday evening the 27th January. His Excellency the Lieut. Governor, Patron, in the Chair.

Proceedings commenced by the singing of a hymn, after which the Rev. D. FitzGerald offered up prayer.

His Excellency then, with much earnestness, addressed the meeting to the following effect :---

LADIES AND GENTLEMEN, —It is, I can assure you, with no small pleasure that I again find myself opening the proceedings of this, the Annual Meeting of the Diocesan Church Society, and being able to review so satisfactorily the past year in connection with this most useful and Christian Association—one which commends itself to our warmest sympathies and our most earnest support.

And this not the less so, as I observe from the report which will presently be read to you, that assistance from those Christian Societies at home, which have heretofore done so much to foster the infant churches in the Colonies, can no longer with certainty be relied on. Nor need this be a matter of surprise or regret. The Dependencies of Great Britain are, with but two exceptions, so steadily advancing in population, in material prosperity, and in wealth, that our friends in England can hardly regard us as requiring pecuniary assistance—very acceptable to a small settlement in its first and early struggles, but scarcely so compatible with the more advanced growth and the self reliance of a vigorous and healthy community.

In this respect, indeed, we have reason to feel deep thankfulness to the Giver of all good for the prosperity with which He has been pleased, during the last twelve months, to bless this Island. A most bountiful harvest has been voucheafed to us, which we have been permitted to gather in in safety. While a desolating war is raging at no great distance from us, we are mercifully spared the horrors, the misery, the privations from which a kindred race is sufficient. Here, the farmer can pursue his avocations, and the metchant prosecute his enterprises. alike fearless of interruption, safe from conscription, safe from the desolating waste of hostile armies, safe from those terrible scenes of bloodshed which have, in too many instances, converted the happy homesteads of America into a dreary wilderness. These are, indeed, priceless blessings to us; blessings for which we cannot be sufficiently grateful to the Almighty Hand which bestows them.

At our last Annual Meeting here, there was a subject discussed which, though I shall say but a few words regarding it, I am yet unwilling to pass over in silence. The subject to which I allude was the proposition that Prince Edward Island be crected into an Episcopate. During the course of last summer we had the advantage and privilege of a visit among us from the Chief Pastor of our Churchour excellent and worthy Bishop Dr Binney-whose opinica on this matter was of much importance. At a meeting where he presided, the difficulties which offered to the formation of this Colony into a separate Diocese appeared too formidable to be at present overcome ; and I think, therefore, I am correct in saying that in the meantime at least, the project is abandoned. I think, however, that the impression prevailed, nor was it discountenanced by His Lordship, that it rested with ourselves to secure, what was next best to a Bishop of Prince Edward Island, visits more frequent than once in three years from the Bishop of Nova Scotia. You are aware that the salary of His Lordship is very small; it is altogether inadequate to the calls upon him, and were he not in a manner independent of his salary, his usefulness would be greatly circumscribed, and these visits trench greatly on his means. I may add they encroach not a little, also, on the too narrow incomes of men whose active usefulness and whose unwearying labors deserve a better return than they receive. Thecase, therefore, is a very simple one. If you desire to see the Bishop more frequently, you must bear a share of the burden, and at least shield him from pecuniary loss. Speaking for Mrs Dundas and myself, I can assure you we shall cheerfully contribute our share; and moreover, I need scarcely add, that, so long as I am spared to fill among you the honorable position I enjoy, my house will be the Bishop's home in the Island, and a hearty welcome will ever await him. You will, I am sure, listen with much satisfaction to the report which is about to be read to you. You will gather from its interesting narrative renewed confidence in the efforts of those self-denying men whose labors are there recorded, and who, amid many struggles, much privation, and frequent discouragement, are still beckoned onward and supported by the example of that glorious Master in whose footsteps they are treading, and by the remembrance of the noble cause in which they are engaged.

The Rev. Secretary then read a more than usually interesting report, and the financial statement made by the Treasurer showed considerable increase over the ordinary receipts of other years.

The following resolutions were then passed *nem. con*, after having been first earnestly and eloquently spoken to by the proposers and seconders :—

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Moved by the Ven. Archdeacon Read, seconded by the Rev. R. T. Roach :----

Resolved, That the report now read be adopted and printed under the direction of the Committee.

Moved by the Rev. D. FitzGerald, seconded by the Hon. Joseph Hensley :--

Resolved, That this meeting gratefully recognizes the mercies vouchsafed to this Island in the peace and prosperity which it has enjoyed, and the abundant harvest with which it has been blessed.

Moved by the Rev. J. A. Richey, seconded by E. J. Hodgson, Esquire :----

**Resolved**, That the long continued and efficient aid rendered to the Church in this Island, by the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, and the Colonial and Continental Church Societies, demands the lively gratitude of all her members, and that the possible withdrawal of the grants hitherto made, must necessitate a prompt and decisive course of action, on our part, to supply the deficiency.

Moved by Charles Palmer, Esq., seconded by F. Brecker, Esq.:-

Resolved, That the thanks of this meeting be tendered to the Ladies for their efficient help in collecting for the Society, and that the following gentlemen do constitute the Executive Committee:--[See Executive Committee, 1st page]; and that Theophilus DesBrisay, Esq., be the Treasurer, and that the Rev. D. B. Parnther and Mr H. J. Cundall be the Secretaries for the ensuing year.

Moved by the Ven. Archdeacon Read, seconded by the Rev. R. T. Roach :---

**Resolved**, That the publications of the Society for promoting Christian knowledge be introduced into this Island, that a depot be formed. and that a Committee be annually appointed to select the Tracts.

The Archdeacon, the Rector of Charlottetown, the Rev D. B. Parnther, the Hon. Joseph Hensley, and W. Cundall, Esq., were then appointed a Committee to carry into effect the above Resolution.

Moved by the Rev. D. B. Parnther, seconded by the Hon. Joseph Hensley:-

Resolved, That should any Legislative enactment be made, respecting the Hilary Term of the Supreme Court, that the Committee have

power to change the day of the Annual Meeting to any Wednesday in January or February which shall not interfere with the sittings of the Supreme Court.

The Archdeacon, in his closing remarks, regretted the absence from the Island of Captains Orlebar and Hancock, who had always taken such a deep interest and active participation in the affairs of the Society, and whose voices, as he then spoke, appeared to him to echo from the walls around. He also, on behalf of the meeting, tendered its thanks to His Excellency for his presence on this occasion.

A liberal collection was made, and the meeting dismissed with the usual benediction.

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# REPORT.

The Committee of the Diocesan Church Society, to which the duty of preparing the Annual Report of your Society has been entrusted, would enter on the work assigned them, in the spirit of thankfulness to the Giver of all good things, for the rich and varied mercies with which He has crowned the year; whether we regard the superabundant harvest with which the labors of the husbandman has been blessed, or the peace and prosperity in which our Island has been preserved, affording a grateful contrast to the desolation with which a neighboring land has been afflicted. The Committee would recognize in these things, many and undeserved mercies, and would with gratitude acknowledge the Hand from whence they come.

The reports from the various clergymen and missionaries throughout the Island, are replete with causes for thankfulness and encouragement. Actuated by the Spirit of the Divine Master, whose "meat and drink it was to do the will of His Father," they have steadily pursued their way amid those discouragements and disappointments which will occasionally arise in the mission field, and have thus brought to bear upon the hearts and consciences of their people, those truths by which alone they can be made wise unto salvation.

The various congregations throughout the Island have (with one exception) steadily maintained their numbers, and as the usual services have been punctually held, the Sacraments periodically administered, and the Divine Word fully and faithfully preached, the Committee, relying upon the promise "My word shall not return unto me void, but shall accomplish that whereunto I sent it," would humbly trust that many have grown in grace and in the knowledge of the Lord.

During the past year our Church has been gladdened by the presence of her chief Pastor, who visited all the missions, preached at many of the churches, and held confirmations in various parts of the Island; thus sustaining the hands of our clergymen, and strengthening that attachment, which, as her members, we have ever entertained towards our holy and apostolic Church.

For some years past the sentiment had been entertained that the appointment "of an active godly clergyman as Bishop of Prince Edward Island would do much to build up the walls of our Zion and heal the breaches made in her battlements." The Bishop of Nova Scotia had been consulted, and had given his sanction to the measure; and the friends of the Church had promised to use their influence, here and in England, to give effect to a proposition, which, if realized, it was hoped would prove a benefit and a blessing to all. Accordingly, at the desire of the Bishop, the clergy and delegates from the different parishes of the Island were assembled at the Schoolroom of St. Paul's Church, on 15th July, his Lordship kindly presiding.

The object of the meeting having been stated, viz., "to ascertain the sense of the Church as to the erection of the Island into a separate Diocese, Mr E. Hodgson, as Secretary of a Committee appointed at the last Diocesan Annual Meeting, explained, at the desire of the chairman, the steps that had been taken towards its accomplishment. The meeting was then addressed by the Bishop, several of the clergy and delegates, and others, and after the sentiments of the several speakers had been fully expressed the meeting adjourned, without coming to any definite conclusion. His Lordship also took the opportunity to address the meeting on the subject of the Diocesan Synod of Nova Scotia, and read the enactment of the Provincial Parliament incorporating it; he also explained the measures lately adopted in that Province, for the relief of aged ministers, and also of the widows and orphans of the clergy,

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and recommended their introduction into this Island. also proposed that the publications of the S.P.C.K. should He be introduced; and lastly, kindly expressed his willingness, under certain conditions, to make more frequent visits to the Island than hitherto he had done, with the view of gratifying the wishes of the members of the Church for a more frequent oversight of their interests, and a more sustained intercourse between them.

While the Committee cannot but regret that the departure of the Rev. J. S. Smith from the Island has left the important mission of Milton unoccupied, except so far as the occasional services performed by the ministers of Charlottetown can supply the deficiency, they are thankful to record the ordination of Mr Jas. A. Richey to the office of Deacon, by the Bishop of Nova Scotia, during his Lordship's last visit to the Island. This truly scriptural and apostolic Rite was solemnized in the parish church of New London, on Sunday, 2d August, when a concourse of persons (many of whom had travelled miles to be present on the occasion) were witnesses of that solemn form, viz., the imposition of the hands of the Chief Pastor of the Church, by which the Church recognizes those as her ministers, whom Christ Himself has called, and on whom she thus confers authority to do the work of Evangelists in the house of God.

The Committee again would urge on churchmen, and all well wishers to our Zion, the absolute necessity of at once devising some mode by which the exigencies of the Church may hereafter be provided for. Year after year the note of warning is sounded by the Venerable Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, that the help that it has so long and so generously afforded, must be gradually withdrawn, till having retreated from the field altogether, the Church in this Island will be left entirely to its own resources, so far, at least, as to any aid to be derived from it; and thus must its missionaries be thrown altogether on the liberality of those who are members of her communion. Nor have the Committee any reason to suppose that the Colonial Church Society will do other than adopt the

course pursued by the older Society, for, though it has not as yet signified its intention to withdraw its support from the Church in the Island, there is a growing opinion among the members of the two Societies at home, that the Colonies have so far progressed, as no longer to need the fostering care which new settlements require, and whether support afforded under such altered circumstances may not be rather prejudicial than beneficial to the true interests of the Church, by repressing that spirit which self-dependence would naturally evoke.

The language of the nobleman who attended the last Annual Meeting of the Berkshire Auxiliary to the S.P.G., cannot be mistaken. He said that he was one of those who wished to reduce the grants for the sake of the Church itself; that it was the duty of the Society to reduce existing grants, and as the sum of  $\pounds 16,000$  would fall in this year in the way of grants, he felt that there should be a formal notice sent to the Colony, that it would be done away with or greatly reduced. "There is no possibility of mistaking this language, the Society has resolved to withdraw its aid from the Colonies." The question which now must force itself on us is, how this loss is to be met? what provision to be made? and how can it be effected ?

The Committee do not feel that they are called on to make any suggestions in reference to this important point, but would again urge on the attention of all who are members of our Communion that something *must be done*, and that the sooner some scheme is proposed to meet the exigency, not far distant, and certain to arise, the better it will be for the interests of the Church.

The intelligence received through the columns of the *Church Record* of the ordination of Mr Wilkins, and his appointment to the mission of Crapaud, is a matter of sincere satisfaction.

The receipts from the several parishes and missionary stations, &c., amount to  $\pounds 144$  2s. 6d., and exceed those of the previous year by nearly  $\pounds 15$ .

The Committee would now present the reports received from the clergy throughout the Island.

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#### CHARLOTTETOWN.

The clergymen of the parish report that within the past year there have been 44 Baptisms, 45 Persons Confirmed, 20 Marriages, and 34 Burials, 400 Religious Services have been held, and 1200 Pastoral and other visits paid.

The LIBRARY contains 1335 volumes, being an increase of 50 during the past year. The number of scholars attending the morning and afternoon Sunday-school is not behind that of other years, and reward books to the number of 170 have been given to those who were diligent in learning and manifested general good conduct.

A BIBLE CLASS for young men has lately been commenced, which, it is hoped, will form no unimportant branch of religious instruction for the younger teachers, as well as those who are rather advanced in the Sundayschool, and for whose benefit it has principally been estab-

The OFFERTORY (commenced a few years ago to supplement the ministers' salary), has steadily increased. Additional communicants have been added to the list, and the monthly Sacramental collections for the poor are good, and often larger than those taken up at similar periods in former years. The general appearance of the church. both externally and internally, has never been better, and some of its interior fittings and other improvements have been effected through the voluntary and praiseworthy exertions of some of the young men of the congregation, whose example, if followed, would soon cause the church to be out of debt, and all her liabilities discharged. Upwards of £74 have been collected by some of the Ladies, who are ever foremost in every good work, and paid into the Treasury, for the purchase of those pews which formerly . belonged to the Government, but are now the property of the Church, and producing, as they do, a rental of £28 a year, form the first efforts towards an annual endowment.

The HOUSE lately purchased for a Rectory, and partly paid for, has, by the demise of its late resident, come into the hands of the Church, and efforts ought now be made,

by gathering in the outstanding subscriptions, to free it from debt, as well as put it into an efficient state of repair, and thus save the payment of a double rent.

The GRAVEYARD, through the active exertions of one of the Wardens, has had the sum of £16 expended upon it, towards its general improvement.

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#### ST. ELEANOR'S.

The Venerable the Archdeacon reports that it is his privilege to inform the D.C.S. that the prospects of the Church in his parish are more encouraging this year than at any former period of his ministering. The increase of communicants, and of members admitted to full communion, some of whom formerly belonged to other denominations, together with the continued serious attention, and the regular attendance of our congregations, call for devoted thanksgiving to God.

The Bishop's visit in the Summer was attended with more than ordinary interest; 85 persons were confirmed, and the new churches, St. Mark's, Kensington, and St. Mary's, Summerside, to which our society has contributed liberally, were consecrated. The churches were filled to overflowing, and all appeared to be devoutly engaged in the solemn services of the day. We have now three churches in the mission, where in 1860 there was but one.

The weekly Offertory has proved a decided success. It is preferable to the former mode of collecting the clergyman's stipend, and also more scriptural.

As the duty of contributing to the support of the Church becomes more generally recognized, there is reason to hope, that they who have neglected this part of their bounden duty, will be impressed with a sense of their christian obligation to Almighty God, who has a claim on our worldly gains, and has promised to reward the liberal and cheerful giver.

It is with much satisfaction he has to report an addition to our clerical staff this year, and there is an immediate prospect of the Crapaud and Springfield missions being regularly supplied by a resident clergyman, recently ordained. For any measure of success that may accompany our efforts in the vineyard of the Lord, to God's hallowed name be ascribed all the glory and the praise.

#### GEORGETOWN.

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The Rev. Mr Roach, of Georgetown, reports satisfactorily of the state of his mission. During the past year he has been enabled by the blessing of Almighty God to maintain the usual celebration of Divine Worship at his various stations, (with the exception of some few interruptions consequent on sickness, and absence for a short time in Nova Scotia). He is happy in recording a steadiness and decorum in the religious and daily habits of his flock—and blessed be God for it—as the best evidence of the elevating and pious influence of the profession of our most Holy Faith.

At Georgetown, the congregation has ceased to fluctuate between two opinions, and is more closely knit together "in doctrine and fellowship, and in breaking of bread and

At St. Alban's, Mount Stewart, the church approaches completion, and is even now very comfortable for Service; it is wainscotted, double-floored and ready for plastering, which latter work will be but a trifling matter, as from the plate to ridge, the roof is ceiled, to show the timbering; the sittings are all to be open benches, and free to all worshippers.

At Harts Settlement, the little school-chapel remains unfinished, owing to the extreme poverty of the people. **£10** would enable the missionary to complete it, and then it might be made a blessing to one of the most religiously destitute settlements in P.E.1. A sunday school of 30 or 40 children could be easily gathered, and the nucleus of a good congregation formed, as soon as the building was put in a condition to receive them. Will any benevolent Christian help these needy people? In this cure there have been 10 Marriages, 47 Infant and 3 Adult Baptisms, 16 Confirmed, 7 Burials, 14 Administrations of the Holy Communion, 26 Catechetical and 216 ordinary celebrations of Divine Service, since my last report to the Society.

The contributions have been much above the average of former years, and for a weak parish, most commendable; they are entirely confined to Georgetown, with the exception of a collection made by Mr Ed. Alleyne, of St. Alban's, 36s. 9d., towards the funds of the D.C.S., and the handsome sum raised by his fellow-parishioners at a church tea last summer.

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making £135 9 6 now put out at interest, and when we have brought it up to the neighborhood of £200, we shall begin to make the repairs and additions to Trinity church, which it so greatly requires, and may our Almighty Helper give us grateful hearts for the present, and hopeful hearts for the future, and helpful hands and generous hearts to carry on the pious work of rebuilding the house of the Lord, and enable us to make "the places of His rest glorious," and give us all grace "to worship Him in the beauty of holiness."

#### NEW LONDON.

In presenting to the Diocesan Church Society his first annual report, the Rev. J. A. Richey, the missionary, experiences all the inconvenience of having only *lately* entered on his interesting and important work. He rejoices, however, that since he came to the Island in February last, he has been enabled in some degree to minister to the spiritual wants of the two parishes, Crapaud and New London, which were last year reported as then still vacant. Four churches in this Island had been for some time closed, and the missionary cannot adequately express the gratitude which he feels to his Bishop, and the Society by which he is employed, and above all to God, for having and proclaiming to attentive and appreciative congregations, "the unsearchable riches of Christ."

In New London generally, and in Irishtown always, the congregations have been large and devout. Several of the members have treated him with consideration and kindness,

to which he desires to bear this simple testimony. A blessing has seemed to attend his ministrations at the bed of sickness. The parsonage has been newly painted, and in New London the parishioners hope to be assisted in the erection of a new church, as the old one, St. Thomas', is rapidly falling into decay, while the building of a school house is also contemplated.

The missionary would report that in Crapaud his congregations have constantly and encouragingly increased, and so much so that the church there is, at times, quite small enough for their accommodation. The Springfield church likewise, is giving evidence of good, and some there are still continuing to evince by their daily walk that they have not received the grace of God in vain.

The sum subscribed in New London for the D.C.S., is £9 16s. 8d., at Crapaud, £2 7s. 3d., at Springfield, £5 11s. 3d., and the amount raised in this Mission by offertory collections is £33 6s. 4d.

The whole amount, exclusive of Pew Rents, is £51 Painting Parsonage,

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#### PORT HILL.

The Rev. H. B. Swabey would indulge the hope that, as regards his own mission, some little progress has been made during the past year. The Bishop visited his parish church, during August last, and confirmed 18 young persons, and since that period some of them have become communicants of the church. There is an increase in the number of communicants at Lot 11. The interior of the church at Port Hill has been neatly painted during the past summer. The glebe school house at New Bideford is now finished, with the exception of a little painting externally. Its open seats, and general adaptation to the requirements of the adjacent settlements, commanded the approval of the Bishop, when he addressed a congregation which had for the first time assembled within its walls. Our chancel-like vestry at Lot 11 is nigh well completed ;

and the people in this distant part of the parish (though many of them are living a long way from the church) manifest commendable diligence in attending the means

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## CASCUMPEC, &C.

The missionary, the Rev. R. W. Dyer, says, that in gathering up a few reminiscences, relative to the working and progress of the mission, there is not much more of interest to recount, than the regular and ordinary duties connected with the church; bnt calmly reflecting on the way in which the Lord has been pleased to lead him, in the discharge of his sacred office, he cannot but believe that His word and promise have been with him, and enabled him faithfully to discharge his duties to Him and the Church. He is thankful to find that he is not left without some tokens of encouragement in the mission of Cascumpec, Kildare, and Tignish. Each of the six stations under his charge has been, with a few exceptions, regularly attended. Divine Service has been performed twice a month in each place, and the holy communion celebrated every six weeks in the church at Kildare Capes. Some who formerly did not belong to our Church have, during the past year, joined our communion. He is thankful to say that the Church mission in these parts is favorably progressing, although for the two past years, the people's circumstances have been very trying. midst of their difficulties, however, it astonishes their neighbors and themselves to see the progress that has been made. Since his entrance on this mission they have managed to build a church at Kildare Capes, with some assistance from the D.C.S., so far as to allow the congregation to assemble for Divine Service; and next summer it is purposed to raise a fund which, with the sum of £15 kindly promised by the Bishop of Nova Scotia, at his last visitation, will complete it. This church will be ready for consecration when his Lordship again visits the Island. It

has a graveyard adjoining, which was consecrated in August last. Connected with this is a Sabbath School, conducted by the members who live in the vicinity, and is well attended. At Cascumpec they have, with the assistance of their friends in town and country, a commodious parsonage house, which the Bishop pronounces to be the best in the Island, with stable, barn, and coach house. With the laudable desire to have the ministration of the word within a reasonable distance, the people at Cascumpec have begun a new church there, 40x28; chancel 11x13; tower 10x10; total length, 61 feet. The frame was raised in July, and made secure. The Bishop expressed his satisfaction at the work, and now the roof and chancel are shingled, and they expect to contract for the windows, &c., during the present The personal friends of the missionary at Bristol, winter. in England, have promised him £20, and with £10 from the Bishop, and the little assistance he hopes to have from the D.C.S., they hope to make such progress with the work as to have it fit for Divine Service during the summer of the present year. 
The church at Brookland is making some progress towards completion, and through the kind assistance of the Rev. Mr. Roach, who for some time preached once a month at this place, a good deal of interest has been kept up, and it is already manifest that good is resulting from these united efforts. He hopes that the church will be finished early in the spring. Mr Stewart would also acknowledge the kind assistance rendered by Mr. Hales, and occasionally by Messrs. H. Haszard and C. DesBrisay, by whom services have been conducted at Southport church, when his duties required his attendance in other parts of his mission.

The missionary thankfully acknowledges the present of a sleigh and silk gown from his parishioners. The total amount raised for church purposes in his mission, including D.C.S. collection is,  $\pounds 71$  10s.

#### MILTON.

The parish of Milton is now vacant, the late missionary, Rev. J. S. Smith, having accepted an appointment in the county of Halifax. The members of the church, however, have not been unmindful of the wants of their brethren in other places, and have responded to the call of two ladies, who personally waited on them, and have sent up to the treasurer the sum of  $\pm 10$ , as the annual subscription to the D.C.S.

In CONCLUSION, your Committee see much reason to offer their heartiest thanks to Almighty God for the measure of success with which it has pleased Him to reward the labor of His Holy Church; but still your Committee feel that they cannot resign into your hands the duties with which you have entrusted them, without again urging upon churchmen, especially in Charlottetown, the necessity of placing more liberal means at the disposal of the Society, which may enable them to extend the ministry of the Word and Sacraments more fully than heretofore. They also trust that churchmen generally may see the necessity of united action in everything relating to the welfare and advancement of our Church, and that while taking encouragement from the blessed promise that the gates of hell shall not prevail against her, yet that we may never r 'ax our efforts until, by God's blessing, we have placed he in that position which He Himself intended her to occupy-the common Mother of us all.
