

CONSTITUTION.

HIS congregation shall be known by the name of the First Presbyterian Church, Park Avenue.

The Board of Managers shall be chosen by ballot by the congregation, from among the members of the church in full communion, at the annual meeting of the congregation, or at a meeting duly called for that purpose.

The Board of Managers shall consist of twelve members, one-half of whom shall retire annually by rotation; and their places, as also the places of any who may die or vacate their office during the year, shall be filled at the annual meeting of the congregation. The retiring Managers may be re-elected.

If any Manager be cut off from church privileges by process of discipline, or leave the congregation, he shall forthwith cease to act as Manager, and another shall, as soon as convenient, be appointed in his place.

The duty of the Managers shall be attend to the temporal and financial affairs of the congregation. More particularly it shall be their duty to obtain from the people contributions for the sustentation of the ministry; to take care of the property of the congregation; to provide for the payment of the minister's and other salaries; and generally to administer all matters committed to their charge, as the congregation may from time to time direct.

Meetings of the Board shall he held on the last Friday of each month for the transaction of business; but a meeting may be held at any time on the call of the chairman, by notice from the pulpit, or addressed personally to the members of the Board.

Five members present shall constitute a quorum. Every meeting should be opened and closed with prayer.

The Treasurer shall be appointed at the annual meeting of the congregation from the members of the Board of Managers. His duties shall be to keep the accounts of the congregation and to receive and disburse all moneys, subject to the direction and control of the Board of Managers.

The Chairman and Secretary shall be appointed by the Board of Managers at the first meeting of the Board held after the annual meeting of the congregation.

The Chairman's duties shall be to preside at the meetings of the Board of Managers, and to sign all accounts which have passed the Board. In his absence any member may be chosen to act as chairman *pro tem*. The Chairman has only a casting vote.

The Secretary's duties shall be to keep a correct record of the proceedings of the Board of Managers and to act as clerk of the congregation at congregational meetings.

All cases not herein provided for shall be governed by the rules and forms of the procedure laid down by the church courts of the Presbyterian Church in Canada. closed cess. to reverse report deple for sittion, removall-head John

SESSION STATEMENT.

One thousand eight hundred and ninety-nine has closed with its unwritten record of failure and success. It is for us, as far as a general statement may, to review the affairs of the congregation since the last report was issued. The ranks of the Session have been depleted during the year. Mr. Adam Murray, who has for sixty-three years been a member of the congregation, and an Elder for a large number of years, has removed from the city, as has also Mr. John Levie. Dr. Arnott has been unable to serve through continued ill-health; while both Mr. Andrew Greenlees and Mr. John Mills were laid aside for a period.

There have been thirteen deaths among the families of the congregation, and the ages of those who have been called away vary from 10 years of age to 95; five of these—Dr. J. H. Wilson, Mr. George Marshall, Mrs. Janet Hanson, Mr. David Chambers and Mrs. John Craig—having been for many years members of this congregation. "One generation goeth and another cometh." Thirty-three have been granted certificates of disjunction, and six have been regretfully dropped from the list of members; eleven infants and two adults have been baptised during the year.

SABBATH SCHOOL.

The teachers and officers beg to submit their Annual Report for the consideration of the congregation. By the tables which are attached to this statement it is evident that the total number of scholars is slightly less than at the beginning of last year. The average attendance is also slightly less than that of the preceding year, but this is due to the fact that the school sustained a number of losses more fully shown in detail further on. The highest attendance during the year was 194, and the lowest 72.

The changes in the teaching staff have not been as numerous as usual, but we regret to have lost the services of Mr. Campbell in the library, and of Miss Hodge and Mr. John M. Robb, most excellent teachers. In the removal of Mr. H. M. Lay during the present month we have lost not only a most efficient teacher but our Assistant Superintendent. We have been fortunate, however, in securing Miss Muriel Henrick and Miss McDougall for junior classes, and in welcoming back Mr. Harry Bapty and Mr. John Anderson, under whose efficient aid we expect our school to prosper yet more during the last year of the century

There were added to the roll during the year 36 scholars, and 45 were removed, making a total loss of 9. Of these 45, 17 left the city, 9 went to the German Sabbath School recently started, 11 to other Sabbath Schools, four thought themselves too big to come, two were removed by death, and two left for causes unknown.

We mourn the death of two of our brightest scholars—Louie Craig, after a long and distressing illness, and Gordon Andrus, who was drowned at Southampton, where the family were spending the holidays. We rejoice in the hope and belief that they have entered into the blessed rest of their Master, whom they tried to serve.

We again urge on the parents the duty of assisting us by seeing that the children attend regularly and punctually, study their lessons and do not destroy the literature provided by the school, and contribute regularly to the spread of the Gospel by the support of Missions.

The Superintendent will be glad to be informed of any children of the congregation or others who do not attend Sabbath School that they may be added to our numbers.

We desire to express our gratitude to our kind and merciful Father for the favor that he has shown us in all times past, and we humbly pray that he will continue to bless our efforts for our own good and for that of many others.

In presenting the report of our society for 1899, would say that whilst our attendance was not quite as large as it has been in preceding years, still the meetings have been as instructive and beneficial as ever.

One of the reasons for the decrease in attendance has been the removal from the city of several of our members. Two of those who we miss most are Mr. S Silcox, who was our vice-president and a very active worker, and Mr. Robert Kippen, who has very kindly acted as organist for the past two or three years. Whilst regretting their departure, we are pleased to know they are doing well elsewhere.

Our membership is now 70, and during 1899 we had 43 Sunday afternoon meetings and two social. evenings which were very enjoyable and hopeful.

We are still using the course of studies prescribed by the General Assembly, which for the year 1900 is based on the Parables of Christ.

Of the moneys collected the Y. M. C. A. and Y. W. C. A. have each received \$5.00, the balance of a subscription made to them in 1898. We also made our annual payments, \$25 to the Building Fund, and \$15 to the Knox Missionary Society.

The Young People's Presbyterial Society of this Presbytery are contributing to the support of the Rev. John Pringle, of Atlin Lake, and we have subscribed \$18 to this purpose.

We would again call the attention of the young

people of the congregation to our society and the benefit derived from our meetings, and any who are not otherwise engaged on Sunday afternoons we would be pleased to have make us a visit. We assure them of a pleasant and well spent hour.

MISSIONARY COMMITTEE.

Your Committee beg to report that the amount collected for missions during the year 1899 was \$1,028.75, as against \$948.50 in 1898. This shows an apparent increase of \$80.25, but as we received during the year a legacy of \$200 from the late George Marshall (\$100 each for Home and Foreign Missions), the sum raised by the congregation was really \$119.25 less than last year. The number of contributors, too, has fallen from 201 to 155, which has raised the average contribution from \$4.72 to \$5.33.

We cannot but regret this falling off in the missionary contributions, while the ordinary congregational revenue appears to have been fully maintained. It would seem to indicate a lack of interest in the work of the church at large, which must arise largely from want of information. Your committee hopes, however, that better things are in store. The efforts that are being made in connection with the Century Fund will no doubt have the effect of educating the people up to a higher appreciation of the work that is being carried on by the Presbyterian Church of Canada, and a fuller realization of our duty in regard to it. May we not therefore hope that while liberally providing for the support of ordinances amongst ourselves we may not forget those who are not so favorably situated, and find in our experience the truth of the words of the Master, "It is more blessed to give than to receive."

AUXILIARY W. F. M. SOCIETY.

The work of the auxiliary for the year which has just closed has resulted in a slight increase in membership, attendance and contributions. For this we are thankful to Him who has led us all the way, and we look forward to another year of still better results, trusting in God for a blessing on our efforts.

Our auxiliary membership is now 63, which includes 16 "Scattered Helpers." Ten meetings were held durings the year with an average attendance of 39. A number of papers were read at the meetings, being on mission or Christian work in general, which showed careful preparation, and contained many practical and hopeful hints. The meetings were also very pleasant in a social way for which, in a great measure, we are indebted to the Ladies' Aid Society.

In October Miss Duncan, who was at home on furlough from India, gave an address to the union meeting of the Mission Bands and Auxiliaries of the city. The Thank-offering meeting in November was very interesting and well attended, 118 being present. Our pastor, Mr. Clark, gave an address on "Why we should be interested in mission work." The latter part of the evening was of a pleasant social nature, refreshments being served by the Ladies' Aid Society. The offering was the largest in the history of the society, being \$99.63.

The "Scattered Helpers" Association has during the year contributed financially to the auxiliary. The membership is the same as last year, viz.: 16. The work has been well looked after by Miss McGuffin, the secretary, who has visited the members faithfully.
