

WHY POPCORN POPS.

KEEP LUMBER AT HOME. Oriental Countries Exhausting Ameri-

"Home owing has always been an American ideal. One reason so many Americans have been able to realize that ideal has been the abundance of and cheapness of building material. Houses built of costly material must belong to the few who have wealth or to the landlords.

"From 18:0 to 1900 Michigan was producing more lumber than any other state. Cheap lumber and low freight rates made Michigan a state of home owners. But the policy of slashing timber and not replacing it chased the lumber producing area across the continent, and today Michigan is paying more for freight on lumber than the lumber costs where it is cut.

"Meanwhile the last great timber stand in the United States is on the Pacific Coast. But the experience of rising prices of lumber and declining number of home owners seems to teach us nothing. We still proceed upon the theory that the trees grew because Providence wanted certain lumbermen to make a fortune. Accordingly it is perfectly proper for said lumbermen to cut the trees and market the lumber in the way best intended to make their fortunes quickly.

"Just now the Japanese seem to be the instruments adapted to carry out this purpose. They like lumber and they are buying the best American grades. Statistics furnished by the National Lumber Manufacturers' Association Information Bureau say: 'During the first three months of 1922, the Japanese took 119,000,000 feet of lumber from the State of Oregon, and 54,271,000 feet from Oregon. China also is coming to the front as a buyer of American lumber.'

"There is much talk of a forestry policy. In the immediate interests of home building we need much more a lumber policy which will keep for the use of the American people the rapidly failing supply of timber. It is time to forbid sending the best of our lumber to Asia while our people are compelled to pay exorbitant prices for the culls."

TALE OF TWO FLAGS.

Starch and Moisture at Bottom of the Mystery.

What do you suppose puts the "pop" in popcorn? Scientists, who have made many experiments, tell us that the pop is due to the explosion of the starch grains, and that the moisture content is not a controlling factor except in the extremes of wetness and dryness. Neither does a high or low protein content effect the percentage of pop. But the time consumed in popping is very important.

important.

Well, why does popcorn pop? The knowledge won't make the popcorn taste any better, but there is a certain comfort in knowing why things are, especially as in the present case one may sit and watch popcorn pop for hours without solving the mystery.

J. J. Whiamson of the Minnesota Agricultural Experiment Station, has supplied some figures on popcorn. He says that if the moisture content is below 6 per cent. or above 20 per cent.

we cannot expect to have more than half of the kernals popped. There is much variation in this, however, and we can safely depend upon a sample with a water content of anywhere from 9 to 17 per cent. giving a good pop. And, sine all ordinary storage conditions would give corn a composition within this range, we don't have to worry much about this factor.

Of much more importance is the time consumed in popping, according to Mr. Williamson. The same volume of corn was popped with different degrees of heat applied, so as to require different lengths of time to pop. Apparently, from three to four minutes gives the maximum volume of pop. If too short it time is given, the layers of the kernals get heated to the popping temperature (340 to 400 degrees F.) before the inner layers, and the kernal merely cracks open without exploding. If too long a time at a lower temperature is given the kernals dry out too much and can't pop.

Experiments have shown that there is little relation between the protein content of pop and the percentage of pop. The amount of protein seemed to have nothing to do with the ability of the perpetrators and their motive.

Minards Liniment Lumberman's Friend, OLEO IN STORAGE SHOWS A DECREASE

A total of 23,959,282 pounds of butter were stored in Canadian cold storage warehouses on September 1, last, according to the monthly report issued by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics. Of this quantity 23,615,426 pounds dearly. Comparative figures show that the quantity of creamery butter in storage was fourteen per cent. larger than on September 1, 1921, and twenty-eight per cent. larger than on August 1 of the present year.

The stock of oleomargarine in storage on September 1 was only 113,887 pounds or a decrease of sixty-two per cent. from the holdings on the same date last year and of seven per cent. from August 1, 1922. Eggs in cold storage on September 1 totalled 16,393,376 dozen, which is an increase of forty-six per cent. from last year. Cheese in storage amounted to 21,169,148 pounds, an increase of two per cent. over last year.

Beef stocks amounted to 6,677,700 pounds of fresh frozen and 8,310,531 pounds of fresh not frozen as well as arge quantities of cured or in process of cure. Fresh frozen pork in storage amounted to 4,001,026 pounds, and not frozen to 2,292,448 pounds.

German Timber Suggested as Part Payment of War Debts. The offer of the German government to pay part of its war debts with timber and forest products is the most convincing evidence so far presented of the value of forests as a national asset, in the opinion of Charles Lathrop Pack, president of the American Forestry Association. In commenting on this offer and the general condition of forests in Europe, Mr. Pack points out that while the German forests have actually increased during the war period, France lost much of her timber during the German invasion. "In the discussion over war indemnities to be paid by Germany we find Germany saying she cannot pay all an money, but will pay some in timber and forest products," said Mr. Pack. POINTS TO REMEMBER.

FIFTEEN MINUTES

Windings for tuning coils and loose couplers should not be heavily coated with shellac or varnish, since this practice increases the distributed capacity of the coil, thereby reducing the efficiency of the receiver. A very thin layer only should be used, which will be sufficient to hold the wires in place.

The distributed capacity of coils for receiving purposes can be reduced by winding a thread between the turns at the same time that the wire is wound on the tubing. This spaces the turns and is well worth the extra work involved in construction since the circuit will tune sharper.

Poor connections in receiving circuits are the cause of much "rattling" and other annoying noises in the telephone receivers. All connections should be either soldered or made secure under screws or binding posts.

If no signals are heard, when everything is apparently in shape, touch the tips of the telephone cord across a single dry cell. If no click is heard there is an open circuit in the cord or telephones, the trouble sometimes occurring at the connections to the receivers themselves. After considerable use the cord also frequently breaks inside the outer covering, a condition which is not apparent from the outside and can be determined only by testing in the manner described.

A common source of trouble in home-made receiving sets is in the fixed condenser where the terminal wires connect with the tinfoil. If care is not exercised in making these connections, an open circuit will probably result at some future time, especially in condensers which are saturated with

The sensitivity of some detector crystals is greatly reduced by being subjected to the heat necessary to secure them in cups with any of the various alloys for that purpose. Such crystals should be held in clips or cups fitted with set screws which grip and hold the crystal firmly.

Since the various detector tubes work most efficiently with grid leak adjusted to the individual tube, it is necessary to provide some simple method of changing the resistance of the grid leak. This can be done by having a number of leaks which snap into clips or by making a pencil line between two binding posts on a piece of bakelite or other similar material. The resistance may be varied by erasing or adding to the pencil mark.

Dead-end losses in a receiving set may be greatly reduced by splitting the various inductance coils into sections so that (by means of a switch) the portions of the coil not actually in use are entirely disconnected and not unilaterally connected to the circuit.

DECREASE IN GERMAN COAL

ion, which has been going on steadily tion, which has been going on steadily since last March, is due primarily to the increasing importation of English fuel into Germany, says Nathaniel P. Davis, American Vice Consul in Berlin. "German influstrial circles are much concerned over the constantly rising cost of German coal as compared with English. Anthracite from the Ruhr district now costs, 1,671 marks per metric ton c.i.f. Hamburg, including taxes, whereas the English fuel is offered there for 1,595 marks," continues Mr. Davis. "Further advances in the prices for German coal, which are expected in the near future, will place a still greater premium on the English product. "Statistical reports show fuel exports from Germany to be greater than before the war, and the suggestion has been made, both in the Reichstag and in the press, that all exports of coal be forbidden in order that the needs of German industry may be met without resort to imported fuel. The total export of coal from Germany in 1921 was about 26,500,000 metric tons, including 18,000,000 tons delivered to the Entente as reparations. About 6,000,000 metric tons went to former German territory alienated by the peace treaty but still dependent on Germany for coal, such as Poland, Austria and Hungary. Of the remaining 2,500,000 metric tons exported, deliveries to the Netherlands under the terms of the treaty of 1920 amounted to more than 1,000,000 tons and shipments to Czechoslovakia in return for Bohemian lignite to some 1,000,000 tons.

FIRST HUNTING FATALITY FOR THE SEASON OF 1922

The first shooting fatality in the province this season occurred at Grand Bay yesterday afternoon, when Samuel Burton Johnston, aged eighteen years, was killed by his cousin and pal, Kenneth Calvin, as he stepped from behind a bush in front of Calvin's gun just as it was discharged at a part-

The accident occurred in the backlands about two miles from Grand The accident occurred in the backlands about two miles from Grand Bay, where the two boys had gone last Thursday for a short camping trip. It seems that Kennetif Calvin was taking aim at a partridge and just as he fired his cousin, Burton Johnston, stepped out from behind a bush about two feet from the mussle of the gun, and received the discharge in the left temple, causing a fracture of the skull. The accident happened shortly before 3 o'clock in the afternoon, and he died about 6 o'clock. Immediately after the shooting Calvin started for Grand Bay to get help. Harry Hamm, a farment, drove out to the backlands with Galvin and brought in the wounded who was unconscious from the time he was shot, to the sum of his parents at Grand Bay. Paris went on the stand at 4.50 on Thursday afternoon and was subjected to an exhaustive cross-examination by Hon. J. P. Byrne, the attorney-general, who devoted much time to the detection of discrepancies between present and previous evidence given by the defendant. Following Dr. McCurdy as a witness was George Hill, a young farmer of Onslow, three miles from Truro. Mr. Hill said that Paris was on his marsh on Aug. 3, 1921, and spoke to him about a place to pick mushrooms.

Sarnia, Sept. 30—The jury returned with an acquittal for John George Yohn, the last of the four men charged with robbery of the Bank of Toronto at Wyoming last fall, after the other three men placed on trial for the robbery had been convicted.

In defense of Ayers the same alibi was brought forward by defense as that used today in freeing Yohn, and the circumstances was stated tonight by Mr. Meredith to be fraught with possibilities. He would make no definite statement, however, when questioned.

after 5 o'clock yesterday afternoon while enroute from Digby to this city. She had seventy-three passengers on board, mostly women and children, and they were taken off the steamer and brought here by the tug Neptune.

The accident occurred while the steamer was proceeding along in a dense forg. Quite a sea was running at the time and the first intimation of danger was when the bank of fog lifted sufficiently to show a ledge of rock a short distance in front of the steamer. The engines were reversed, but she had so much headway that she struck before her progress could be retarded. There was a general rush to the deck as the steamer began to settle, but there was running of the whistle, but when this failed a boat was launched, manned by Quarter master McGrath and seamen Wilfred Kendall, Gerald Cooper and Guy Mussells and they started on their long row for help. They arrived at Reid's wharf at 7.15 o'clock and when C. P. R. officials were notified arrangements were mad: to send the tug Neptune to the scene. She got away about an hour later and was standing by the Empress. The passengers were taken in boats to the tug and brought safely to the city arriving at 10.55. After the steamer struck every person on board were fitted with life belts. They were all told that there was no grave danger and that the shore was only a short

The crew and officers all remained on the vessel while the tugs Margaret A. Hackett and Wasson and later the Neptune stood by. She is said to be lying in a precarious position and is about half way on a ledge and was taking water quite fast.

The Empress was converted into an oil burner last May. She was built in 1906 at Newcastle-on-the-Tyne and for some time operated on the Point du Chene-Charlottetown route. In 1916 she was purchased by the C. P. R. and has since been on the Bay service. The steamer was in command of Captain MacDonald who established an enviable record while on this run.

MUCH GOLD TAKEN FROM LOST LINER

Laurentic, Torpedoed During the War, Yields Her Sunken Treasure to Divers

Torn by tremendous Atlantic gales to such an extent that her boilers are burst from their fixings and smashed their way through the ship's side, the noted White Star-Dominion liner Laurentic, which was torpedoed off the north coast of Ireland in 1917 while in the naval service, lies at the bottom of the ocean completely shattered, according to official reports just received at the local offices of the White Star-Dominion line.

Diving operations were carried on during the summers of 1917, 1919 and 1920, and during this time over a million and a half sterling in gold bullion is said to have been salved from the wreck. During 1921 and the present summer an additional two and a half million pounds' worth of gold have been recovered after strenuous efforts.

WAR MEMORIAL **COMMITTEE WILL** CONTINUE WORK

Authority to spend \$500, if necessary, in securing a suitable design for the proposed civic monument to those who fell in the great war, was given the sub-committee or design and location at the meeting called last night to hear the sub-committee or the main committee, R. T. Hayes, M. P. P., presiding, but was not largely attended, and neither of the two designs which the sub-committee submitted was unanimously approved of. The b-ommittee was thanked for its crapavor and asked to continue its efforts and to report at a later meeting.

Mr. Hayes recounted the steps taken in the matter of deciding to erect a monument in memory of those from St. John who gave their lives in the great war. The suggestion had first been made by the Municipal Chapter of the I. O. D. E., and the committee appointed to consider the matter had commissioned a sub-committee to decide upon the form of the memorial and the most suitable site.

Miss F. Alward, the secretary, was asked to read the sub-committee's report. The report recommended that the monument to be erected cost not more than \$20,000, and that it take the form of a cross of sacrifice, thirty-one feet six inches high, costing \$6,000, set in a suitable semi-circular enclosure, the whole to cost about \$10,000, or that it take the form of a shaft with bronze figures according to a design submitted by Hamilton McCarthy, of Ottawa, costing about \$20,000, and also

Colonel Sturdee made the motion that the cross of sacrifice, thirty-one and a half feet high, be erected. R. E. Armstrong seconded the motion.

Canon Armstrong asked why the second largest size was chosen if the site was the finest in the dominion. The largest cross of sacrifice was thirty-seven and a half feet high and cost \$9,000 as compared with the \$6,000 for the second largest.

R. E. Armstrong said action must be taken soon or public interest would die.







Stiff Buying Marks.

The chairman of one of the big banks, I hear, estimates that 600,000,000 marks have been sold in England alone, and if the estimate is even remotely accurate it would be interesting to know where this enormous number is to be found. It is quite certain that the big firms and the banks that were holding marks have been heavy sellers, but in spite of this there is still a shortage of marks in London, proving that there must be many people still with a belief in the ultimate recovery of the German exchange. So long as this state of things continues Germany will be able to sell more and more marks abroad, because it is only when there is a stampede of sellers that the bottom falls out of the market.

Vienna Economics.

I was talking to a man just returned from Vienna and he confirmed in full the opinion from another observer that the future of Austria lies in the hands of the Vienna Municipality. That body is the one bright spot in a welter of fantastic and ruinous public administrations, and it is dominated by the so-called Christian Socialists, a curious party without parallel in this or any other European country. Its principles approximate to those of our oldtime Radical party, but they are put into application by really capable and business-like men. Consequently it is the rallying point for all the same elements in the country, and its determination to make the city pay its way amounts almost to a war-cry for the middle classes.

As an illustration of the difference between the regime of the Municipality of Vienna and the Austrian State Government, my informant cited the economic positions of two men, one a tram conductor and the other a university professor. The first, an employe of the municipality, draws rather less than double the salary of the professor, and his wages fluctuat according to the cost of living. The professor gets his pre-war salary and his services are charged for on the same basis. Nevertheless the tramways are paying, while the university is bankrupt.


