GREAT BATTLE BELIEVED IN PROGRESS BUT NO

complete silence is maintained as to the fortunes of war in the big fight understood to be in progress somewhere along a line extending through Belgium and Luxemburg. Despatches give evidence of the presence of masses of German troops pushing their way to the front, behind an impenetrable screen of cavalry, whose dashes in search of information as to the whereabouts of the allies' troops have resulted in sharp clashes and heavy casualties.

The commanders of the allied forces of France, Britain and Belgian will not

The commanders of the allied forces of France, Britain and Belgian will not permit anything about their positions to be made public, and since the official note made known the presence of a large British expeditionary force on the continent its movements have been hidden from the outside world.

At Brussels, it is said the position has not changed since yesterday, when it was reported from Brussels to be excellent for the allies.

In Alsace-Lorraine, the French turning movement through southern Alsace appears, from French reports, to be progressing favorably for the French, and seems to receive confirmation in a despatch sent out by the Wolf bureau, the German official news agency, saying that two batteries of guns were taken by the French, who continued their forward march.

All these reports, however, refer to the preliminary meetings of sopposing podies of troops, leading up to the great battle which may already have begun.

Even prominent Frenchmen take occasion to point out to their countrymen that placed on reports of demoralization among the German troops. On the sea it is reported that a naval encounter has occurred in the North

Sea, but this is without official confirmation.

There is to be no scarcity of skirt models among the early autumn modes, for each week brings out something new. Reminiscent of the styles of many years ago is this new French model cut in two pieces and having the inevitable high waist-line. It is lengthened by a one-piece circular flounce, which, in tura, may be finished with a two-piece circular ruffle. The model loses nothing of its smartness, however, if the ruffle is omitted.

Serge, cloth, duvetyn, silk and wool ratine or novelty suiting may be used to make the skirt, which closes at one side. The average size requires two yards of 54-inch material.

A wide material is necessary if the pattern is to be laid out to advantage. Among the lengthwise fold is arranged the flounce (C) and front gore (A), both of which are marked by triple "TTT" perforations. The ruffle, piecing for flounce and back are arranged on a lengthwise thread of the material. If the skirt is desired shorter than regulation length the lower edge of the flounce may be cut off along small "o" perforations.







INTERESTING WORK

Many interested spectators have watched during the last few days the hauling of logs out of the river at the Partington Pulp & Paper Company's plant at Indiantown. The logs are being piled on the banks for drying, an endless chain being used to lift them from the water. They are placed in piles from sixty to seventy feet high and eight or nine hundred feet long. They are hauled out in loads of from twelve to fifteen and at the rate of about five a minute. The piling is in charge of F. W. Parsons, of Bangor, who has been commended for his excellent work. The reason for the drying process is that it requires less labor and material to complete the pulp manufacture when the wood is dry.
