Men and women living within the jurisdiction of law avail themselves of its protection, and for this reason they are bound to obedience. The Suffragettes of England appeal to the police for protection from the mobs that disturb their out-door meetings, but they themselves utterly ignore the law that has guided England in the past and that alone can guide it in the future, and plant in its utterly ignore the law that has guided England in the past and that alone can guide it in the future, and plant in its stead a "higher law" which each one for herself may adjudge and administer. 




