





ry were determined to prevent the sale, if possible.

Some 2,000 people with a band assembled, most of them armed with heavy sticks and displaying a threatening demeanor towards the police and bailiffs. After a good deal of cheering and booing the sheriff's officer offered the cattle for sale, but as might be expected under the circumstances no bid was forthcoming. After waiting some time the bailiff announced that he had a private bid on behalf of the Marquis of Sligo, the amount in each case being sufficient to meet the amount of the decrees, about \$175. This announcement was received with angry shouts and protests.

Mr. Walsh, chairman of the district council, made a speech denouncing the confiscation of \$350 worth of cattle for \$175. The crowd became threatening and excited, and a rush was made to rescue the cattle from the pound, whereupon the police drew their batons and drove the crowd into a field, many wounds being inflicted in the process. Subsequently the tenants whose cattle were sold at what was regarded as much beneath their full value were handed out of a defence fund checks for \$150 and \$80 respectively to recompense them for their loss.






