



Fredericton, N. B., Jan. 8-"A rapidly growing demand for large blocks of power for use in connection with the pulp and paper industry," is given as the reason why the Grand Falls on the St. John river, "may be taken over by the government" and developed by the New Brunswick Electric Power Commission "in the near future" in a letter which C. O. Foss, chief engineer of the commission, has written to Alderman Joseph A. Cain, president of the Fredericton Board of Trade.

This statement, the Gleaner says, fully confirms the report to the effect that an important change in the policy for hydro electric development in this province is under consideration and that the early development of the Grand Falls power is embraced in the new plant. "Following the development of this power (Grand Falls), a net-work of transmission lines will undoubtedly be constructed covering the whole province," also wrote Mr. Foss.
