

Baked Eggs for Lunch

PROVIDE PLAYGROUNDS "The boy without a playground is father to the man without a job." The boy who is at present giving so much trouble to the police force of St. John. What do the citizens propose to do about it?

In reply to a request made, Miss Mabel Peters received this week from a local engineer an estimate of the cost of preparing plans for a complete playground at the entrance to Rockwood Park, and of draining and leveling the grounds. The plans based on information and suggestions received by Miss Peters from Chicago and New York, would cost about a hundred dollars; and the draining and leveling up of the portion of the fourteen acres needed would cost about fifteen hundred dollars. The field would then be ready for the equipment, which would cost as much or as little as the citizens chose to spend.

Even if the money could not all or nearly all, be raised, there is still another way. When the members of the Every Day Club need work done on their grounds they do it themselves in the evenings. If the citizens at large would resolve themselves into a working force, and give some hundreds of work with teams give a few evenings to the work under competent supervision, they would overcome the necessity of spending much money. And why not? They would be working for the good of the children. Years ago the old Polymorphous Club converted an old wood-yard into the pretty Haymarket Square, with grass plots and trees and walks and fountain. Why should not the citizens unite to make a great playground at the entrance to Rockwood Park? Such a display of public spirit it would infuse new life into the city, and the effect would be seen in a thousand other ways.

The State of Massachusetts has adopted a Playground Act, under which the cities and all towns of 10,000 inhabitants were called upon to vote for or against municipal playgrounds. The result has been an astonishing revelation of public sentiment. Up to March 10th last, twenty-four cities and thirteen towns had accepted the provisions of the act, by an aggregate vote of more than four to one. The city of Boston has appropriated \$185,000 for the further extension of its playgrounds. Newark, New Jersey, has paid \$29,500 for nine and a half acres of land for an athletic field and playground. Sixty public school yards will be opened in Philadelphia this summer as public playgrounds. The grounds will be open from 9 a. m. until 9 p. m., and will be in charge of trained teachers employed by the board of education. The first supervised playground in Detroit was opened in 1901, and equipped and supported by private subscription. In 1903 the board of education granted \$1,200 for the work. This year it asked for \$37,000. In addition to the playgrounds, public baths have been established in that city. The Playground for April contains a very interesting article by Mrs. Clara B. Arthur, telling of the growth of the playground idea in Detroit from the time in 1889 when she addressed the Twentieth Century Club on the subject until today, when there are nine playgrounds and several baths conducted for the benefit of the children.

In St. John this year, instead of a forward there is to be a backward step in the matter of supervised playgrounds. The school board grant the use of only one school yard, the Centennial, and the playground committee of the Women's Council only have about enough funds to conduct this one. The Every Day Club grounds are available, and children will be able to play there, but apparently there will be no money to provide teachers. In other words, the people of St. John take so little interest in a matter of vital importance to the children that while other cities are paying more and more attention

PROVINCIAL NEWS

New Brunswick The steamer Irvington, which has been loading at Nelson and Douglastown, sailed last week with the largest cargo of registered tonnage ever taken out of the Miramichi. The Irvington's tonnage is 1800, and her cargo consisted of 1611 standards, being almost 87 per cent. of her total displacement. The steamer had a little trouble at the mouth of the river.

Nova Scotia A telegram received at Digby from North Sydney conveys the sad news of the death of Capt. Clarence Peters at the hotel where he stayed at Ingonish, N. S., on Saturday. Capt. Peters had been engaged in extensive fish and cold storage business at Ingonish.

It is understood that the government intends making considerable repairs or improvements on the Port Wade pier to accommodate the big shipments of iron ore that are expected to go forward from that port. A number of ladders for the accommodation of the fishermen and others who land there in boats, will be placed on the wharf at once.

The most serious automobile accident that has as yet occurred in Cape Breton, occurred in Sydney on Wednesday. Fortunately no injury to the occupant of the car resulted. While Sandford Shaver was leaving the entrance of his yard and passing through the gateway to the street at the slowest possible speed, his car was struck with great force by a tram car.

Joseph Hines, who was recently arrested and imprisoned under a conviction obtained in a Nova Scotia liquor license case, at Sydney, but was subsequently released through habeas corpus proceedings and by order of Justice Finlayson, is now entering an action against License Inspector Carmichael for \$2,000 for false arrest and false imprisonment.

From the 3rd to the 12th of May the Inverness Railway and Coal Co. shipped fifteen thousand tons from their pier at Port Hastings. Shipping at the Port Hood Coal Co.'s Pier is getting quite brisk. Large steamers for Quebec ports have been loaded. The S. S. John Irwin is making frequent trips to P. E. I. and Halifax, and several schooners have taken coal.

In the last supplementary estimates brought down in parliament there was an item of \$6,000 to pay H. N. Pais, Esq., for land damages in connection with railway extension at Point Tupper. At Rockland, Kings Co., last Saturday a cow mose and two calves came into the yard of John Hanfman.

The store of L. D. O'Leary, White Rock, was destroyed by fire Tuesday forenoon. Fifty men are at work erecting a building for the new steel plant at Londonderry, N. S. A delegation comprising Rev. A. FORM TEMPLE BOYS INTO COMPANIES More than 100 boys were assembled in the Alexandria Temple of Honor last evening to be organized into a Temple of Honor boys' brigade or battalion. LIQUOR CASES ON THE G.T.P.

Eleven Convictions Made for the sale of the Ardent on Construction Line.

Eleven convictions for illegal liquor selling along the line of the G. T. P. was the record of Hon. L. P. Ferris, chief commissioner of the G. T. P. police, this week.

Nine were disposed of at Edmundston on Wednesday last. One case, that against Mary Deane, was dismissed for want of evidence.

Fines of \$50 each were imposed on Joseph X. Labelle, Percy Rottal, John D. Laporte, Felix Cormier, Alphonse Belfleur, A. J. Violot, Geo. Theriault, Joseph Davier and Fred J. Cyr. In all but the first two cases the fines were paid.

At Plaster Rock yesterday, Gideon Bay was tried before the chief commissioner for illegal liquor selling, and two convictions were secured against him. Two fines of \$50 each were struck. One was collected, the other being allowed to stand pending good behaviour.

Chief Commissioner Ferris came to the city on the Boston express last night. He will leave for his home at White's Cove this morning.

SIR ROBERT PERKS AND HARBOR BRIDGE

Canadian Branch of Sir Robert's Firm is Getting All the Data From Engineer Holt

While Sir Robert Perks, during his visit to St. John, was reticent in his opinions, it is understood that his firm will make a thorough investigation of the proposition to build a bridge across the harbor.

G. W. Volkman, general manager of the Canadian branch of the firm, acting under Sir Robert's instructions, is obtaining plans of the bridge and approaches and all data relating to the construction, from F. W. Holt, C. E. It is regarded as probable that, should the proposition be favorably considered, it will materially assist in influencing the dominion and provincial governments to grant the necessary subsidies.

Sir Robert Perks, in his interview with Ald. Scully, is said to have expressed the opinion that the city should build the bridge rather than hand the project over to a commission or private corporation, one of his reasons being that he regarded it of importance to St. John that the approaches to the bridge should not pass out of the control of the city.

The forty hours' devotion, which opened on Friday morning in St. Joachim's church, Silver Falls, will close on Sunday evening. The exercises will begin at 7.30 o'clock.

GENERAL ASSEMBLY TO INQUIRE INTO THE AFFAIRS OF QUEENS

Presbyterian Church Will Retain its Connection With the Famous University—Church's Work in Mission Fields Hampered By Lack of Funds—Some Ministers Retire.

Hamilton, Ont., June 4—Queen's University, which has been denominational since its founding in 1828, will not be granted freedom from the Presbyterian church for another year at least. After wrestling with the problem for eight hours, the Presbyterian General Assembly unanimously decided to appoint a commission to confer with the trustees of the institute, which will bring in a report at the next assembly.

Dr. Bryce, convener of the bills and overtures committee, reported that only two of the seventeen applications for recognition of ministers from other churches were in regular form. The committee recommended that the clerk be instructed to send an official letter, to each delinquent Presbyterian calling attention to the irregularities.

Principal Gandier, Knox College, in presenting the report on systematic giving, stated that when the Laymen's Missionary League issued a challenge, "Small Canada evangelize her share of the world?" the committee felt that the Presbyterian church must measure up to that challenge.

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Hon. W. A. Charlton, chairman of the Presbyterian council of the Laymen's Missionary movement, spoke of the work of the committee, and invited the assembly to endorse it. The business men of the church, he said, were now coming to their own.

Rev. Dr. Bryce moved a resolution declaring that the General Assembly recognized the Laymen's Missionary movement as one of the most remarkable and important religious features of the beginning of the twentieth century.

At the monthly meeting of the board of works yesterday afternoon, the report of the Ashtaburn bridge was awarded. The council was recommended to advertise for all tenders for the work.

OPPOSITION PREPARE FOR FIGHT IN COUNTY
